SCORES OF THOUSANDS EXPRESS GENERAL COMMENDATION

Disappointing Weather Does Not Mar Excellence of Show--Vegetable and Live Stock Entries Largest Yet--Big Midway of Fun, Frolic and Merriment

RACING PROGRAM ONE OF MANY BIG FEATURES

Twenty Thousand Persons Witness Thrilling Free-For-All On Second Day of Big Fair

With the weather all that could be desired, a big crowd and a line of exhibits and amusements that can only be equalled by the larger shows of the continent, the Woodstock fair got away Tuesday according to schedule. The arrangements were practically all completed and the judging commenced Wednesday.

The advance sale of tickets is the largest in the history of exhibitions held here, and does not include the big sale covering Wednesday's big racing event. The formal opening took place Tuesday evening in the large exhibition building before an immense crowd.

Lieut. Colonel F. H. J. Dibble called for order and introduced Mayor E. W. Mair, who in extending felicitations to Hon. D. W. Mersereau, minister of agriculture, said it was fitting that he was here, although he understood the minister came at some personal inconvenience. Mr. Mersereau was a warm friend of Carleton County, and a booster of its enterprises. Some eighty years ago the C. C. Agricultural Society commenced doing business and has "carried on" continuously since, which is a record that can scarcely be equalled in all Canada. His worship said he had much pleasure in introducing Hon. Mr. Mersereau.

"It is a pleasure to open this magnificent show in this magnificent county of Carleton, the best place in Canada," said Hon. Mr. Mersereau, in his opening remarks.

"I have a deep feeling of interest in Carleton county for several reasons, continued the speaker, and anything I can do to advance its interests I will be found in the front line.

County Will Not Suffer

"Although the county is not a consistent supporter of the government it will not suffer at my hands, for this reason, and my earnest hope and efforts will be to make a success in every way of the largest and most representative show in New Brunswick. We extend a warm greeting to our American friends, many of whom I met a few days ago at the opening of the great international bridge at Madawaska, and as we clasped hands on that occasion I felt that nothing could mar the friendship existing between the peoples on the border. "And now," said Mr. Mersereau, "it affords me much pleasure to extend a cordial welcome to our American friends and visitors and on behalf of the Carleton County Agricultural Society, I now declare this exhibition formally opened."

Decided Increase

A trip through the building and grounds reveals a display of vegetables and seeds exceeding that of all previous years. The live stock entries show a decided increase and an exceptionally fine quality.

The Best Yet

A heavy downpour of rain Tuesday night made it uncomfortable for those living on the grounds, but the weather cleared and Wednesday's crowd was a record breaker, and set a new standard in attendance figures. The exhibits and attractions are probably the best ever assembled in the Maritime Provinces.

Good Accommodations

It is notable that in planning their facilities the Agricultural Society have arranged everything so that no matter how large the crowd it can be comfortably taken care of. Both nature and man have designed the Island for just such emergencies. There is always something new and a trip through every department cannot help but be of interest. The industrial section is of merit and exceptional display. It is an education to look over the live stock. There are many excellent animals of all classes to be seen. The cattle feature is of the highest standard and a pleasing feature is the showing made by our farmers in this department. In the swine department some of the finest hogs bred are shown.

"Orators and Hot Dogs"

There are representative exhibits of poultry and sheep. The horses are there in every class. Altogether the whole bill of fare is most attractive

and no visitor need spend an idle minute. The midway has an abundance of "orators" and as the crowd moves restlessly through the "street" the brilliant lights give the whole section a brightness and animation that attracts.

There are the usual swings, wheels, merry-go-round and other thrilling features of enjoyment.

There is an endless opportunity to "take a chance" on anything from a doll to hitting a man in the head and winning a five cent cigar. No need of being dry, everything to quench the thirst is sold, but not over two per cent--of course.

High Up

The aeroplane has afforded an opportunity to the "brave" to show their courage by trip to the clouds and to the "timid" to look on and ponder whether their friends were courageous or giddy.

The Decorations

The decorations of the main building, done on an extensive scale, are most attractive and nothing but praise and admiration can be heard from the thousands of visitors.

Thrill Work

There are many elaborate booths all showing much skill and originality in preparation. One department that always has visitors is the exhibit of the Women's Institute, showing articles made from old clothing and cast away articles. It is certainly a most creditable exhibit of woman's thrift and industry. The exhibition of fancy goods and needlework is quite up to previous years.

BENNIE SWIM EXECUTION POSTPONED UNTIL OCTOBER 6TH

St. John, N. B., Sept. 14--Hon. W. P. Jones, K. C., arrived here from Woodstock at noon today and at 2.30 this afternoon appeared before Chief Justice McKeown and made application for a reprieve until October 6th for Bennie Swim, condemned to be hanged at Woodstock tomorrow for the murder of Harvey Trenholme and his wife, Olive, at Benton Ridge on March 27th last.

The fundamental reason for the application, as presented by Hon. Mr. Jones this afternoon, was that the sentence of the court might not be carried out successfully unless the execution, which had been set for tomorrow morning, is postponed. The application pointed out that the executioner engaged by the Sheriff had failed to arrive because of an accident when about to leave for Woodstock and that efforts to obtain the services of other experienced executioners had failed. It was then stated that the Sheriff would be unable to carry out the sentence because of his highly nervous condition as a result of the postponements in this case and having had recently to act in another double murder case in Carleton County in connection with which a woman is now awaiting trial at the jail at Woodstock.

The Chief Justice was asked to act under a selection of the Criminal Code which gives a competent judge authority to order a reprieve of a prisoner condemned to be hanged if sufficient reason is shown as to why the death sentence may not be successfully carried out. Hon. Mr. Jones in his application claimed that there was good reason to believe that the execution if left to an inexperienced person, as must be the case unless a delay was granted, might not be properly carried out.

The case is said to be novel in the criminal annals of Canada and this is said to be the first time an application on such grounds has ever been made in the Dominion for the reprieve of a prisoner condemned to be executed.

St. John, N. B., Sept. 14--Chief Justice McKeown gave an order this afternoon postponing the execution of Bennie Swim at Woodstock until Friday, October 6th.

Sheriff Foster told the condemned man last evening of the reprieve and he exclaimed "God bless you boys, life is a great thing, and while there's life there's hope." He is in excellent spirits and the sudden turn in events is evidently a great relief.

Dunbar's have a very interesting machinery exhibit. This well known concern produces the finest class of mill and farm machinery and their display indicates plainly the possibilities of turning out the best work.

Music and Flowers

The Creighton Musical Instrument Co., in the centre of the main floor have an attractive lot of musical instruments. Prof. McCallum, the blind pianist, plays piano selections in an artistic manner that always draws an audience.

The flower display is beautiful and elicits the warmest admiration. Hon. D. W. Mersereau was so impressed by this exhibit that he gave a special prize of \$10 and also warmly praised the display made.

Sweets

Robt. Hay supplies candy made "while you wait." His booth is liberally patronized for sweets and peanuts.

Women's Institute

"Tired Mothers" are bestowing blessings on the Women's Institute for their splendid effort to make a visit possible to the exhibition. The babies are left there and tenderly cared for while the mothers enjoy a few hours of recreation. The "Rest Room" is undoubtedly one big, special feature of the fair.

G. W. V. A.

The G. W. V. A. have an information booth in a praiseworthy effort to assist ex-soldiers. They are distributing a little book of great interest to returned men and the public generally.
