CHARGED WITH THE MURDERING

Tragedy in the St. Croix Valley---Arthur Crowell of Robbinston, Me., Has Been Arrested on a Serious Charge.

There was a murder on Thursday! at Robbinston, on the St Croix river, opposite St. Andrews. Arthur Crow ell, an employe of a sardine factory in Robbinston is in Machias jail charged with murdering his wife, Mar-

Crowell by a previous marriage, the son is a cripple and not able to work much, but the husband thought he could do something or else be otherwise provided for. About four oclock yesterday afternoon there was ano ther quarrel and Crowell, getting in to a violent state of mind procured a thirty two calibre revolver, according to the evidence and shot the woman through the head. She died practically instantly. Crowell is alleged by witness to have made the remark after the shooting that he would use his revolver on any person who attempted to arrest him.

A Deputy Sheriff was sent for and drawing a revolver which he pointed at Crowell, demanded his surrender. Crowell was forced to surrender and was taken to the Calais lockup about ten miles distant for the night. Crowell has been committed for
