CHARGED WITH THE MURDERING OF HIS WIFE

Tragedy in the St. Croix Valley-- Arthur Crowell of Robbinston, Me., Has Been Arrested on a Serious Charge.

There was a murder on Thursday at Robbinston, on the St. Croix river, opposite St. Andrews. Arthur Crowell, an employee of a sardine factory in Robbinston is in Machias jail charged with murdering his wife, Margaret, and will be tried at the next term of the Washington county court.

According to the evidence there had been frequent quarrels at the Crowell home, mainly over a son of Mrs. Crowell by a previous marriage, the son is a cripple and not able to work much, but the husband thought he could do something or else be otherwise provided for. About four o'clock yesterday afternoon there was another quarrel and Crowell, getting into a violent state of mind procured a thirty two calibre revolver, according to the evidence and shot the woman through the head. She died practically instantly. Crowell is alleged by witness to have made the remark after the shooting that he would use his revolver on any person who attempted to arrest him.

A Deputy Sheriff was sent for and drawing a revolver which he pointed at Crowell, demanded his surrender. Crowell was forced to surrender and was taken to the Calais lockup about ten miles distant for the night. Crowell has been committed for trial and is now in Machias jail.

Bridegroom from Hartland

A quiet home wedding took place at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. William Drake, Truro, Tuesday evening last, when their eldest daughter, Abbie Bell, became the bride of Gordon McBurney, Hartland, N.B. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Bruce D. Knott, B.A., assisted by the Rev. J. H. Puddington, Melville Square.

The bride wore a travelling suit of fawn broadcloth and a very becoming black hat and carried a handsome bouquet of bridal roses and maiden hair fern. She was on the staff of the Bank of Montreal at Hartland, N.B. for four years, and her girl friends gave her a miscellaneous shower before leaving for Truro. The groom's present was a beautiful fur neck piece. The groom is an ex-service man and has a position with the H. H. Hatfield Company, Hartland, N.B. On their return from their honeymoon, Mr. and Mrs. McBurney will reside in Hartland.—St. John Globe.

After the meeting the new executive elected G. Earle Logan as secretary-treasurer.

The address of welcome was given by Alexander Machum, secretary, and Major Priestman made a brief reply. A short programme was carried out. TOWN FATHERS IN BRIEF SESSION

Sidewalk Construction to Commence At Once--Tenders for Part of Work--Fire Committee Reports An Investigation.

On Friday evening the town council met, all members being present except Coun. Bell. The usual routine business occupied very little time and no discussion.

Town Manager Armstrong in addressing the board, on the sidewalk project, said the work would require seven hundred barrels of cement which could now be bought at a fair price. The plans and specifications had been prepared and he would ask for tenders for part of the work. He hoped to have the work completed by August 4th.

Referring to a misunderstanding between the chief of the fire department and Patrick Culbert, caused by the fire of May 24th, when Mr. Culbert's house was totally destroyed, Coun. Creighton and Gallagher reported that in the investigation it was shown to the satisfaction of Mr. Culbert that the town was not in any way to blame. The matter was one between the chief of the department and Mr. Culbert and would not doubt be satisfactorily settled by these gentlemen. Applications have been received from the Hillman Bros., that under certain conditions they would erect houses on St. John street. They asked for a fairly good sidewalk and an improved street extension. The town manager intimated that the concessions asked for would be granted and he hoped that building operations would commence very soon.

Mr. Hartley briefly referred to the Bank of Nova Scotia appeal, to the supreme court of Canada, and said there would be no appeal and taxes, interest and costs would be paid.

It was ordered that the balance of the sidewalk bonds be issued at 5 per cent, providing the act will allow it.

Coun. Gallagher strongly urged that a public meeting be called to discuss the matter of a celebration on July 12-13, the dates of the circuit races. The councillor's remarks met with favor and it was decided to call a meeting of the citizens for Wednesday, 14th inst.

Carnival, Parade & Sports, July 12-13

Citizens Meeting Decide on Big Day--Committees Appointed--Citizens to Stand Behind Movement.

The citizens meeting Wednesday night, to discuss the advisability of holding a carnival in connection with the races, July 12-13, was very well attended. Mayor E. W. Mair presided and briefly outlined the object of the meeting. He felt that the citizens should stand behind the movement and use every effort to make it a success. W. J. Dibble, Robt. Strain, J. H. Gallagher, J. R. Brown, R. F. Armstrong, George Balmann and others spoke strongly in favor of the project. It was decided by a unanimous vote to hold a carnival on July 12-13, the first day to be devoted to a parade and the second to baseball and other sports, previous to the races. The sum of five hundred dollars was appropriated for prizes. A nominating committee consisting of J. S. Leighton, Robt. Strain and W. J. Dibble were appointed to name other committees and report at a meeting to be held Tuesday night. Mayor Mair, Town Manager Armstrong, and Coun. J. H. Gallagher were appointed a committee to confer with the business men in relation to the proposed program. Final action will be taken when this committee submits its report Tuesday night.

WOODSTOCK NUMBER OF BUSY EAST

Skeletonized Unit

Militia orders give the personnel of the skeletonized infantry battalion which will receive annual training this year at camps of training. The battalion headquarters will consist of commanding officer, second in command, adjutant, musketry officer, signalling officer, regimental sergeant major, regimental quartermaster sergeant, orderly room sergeant, signal sergeant, signal corporal and two horses. Each company is to consist of six officers, company sergeant major, company quartermaster sergeant, four sergeants, six corporals. Details for the battalion consist of ten batmen, two cooks, four cooks' helpers and two fatigue men. This establishment will make the total strength of a battalion, 101 of all ranks which is about twenty per cent of peace strength.

Alienist Says Swim Insane

Further Examination Probably be Held--Report Sent to Ottawa--In Hands of Justice Department--Swim a Raving Maniac

Benny Swim, condemned to be hanged on July 15th for the murder of Harvey Trenholm, a returned soldier, and his bride of a fortnight, Mrs. Olive Trenholm, who was Benny's cousin and former sweetheart, has been declared insane by Dr. J. V. Anglin, superintendent of the Provincial Hospital at Fairville and an expert on insanity.

The report of Dr. Anglin to that effect has been forwarded to Hon. H. A. McKeown, chief justice of the King's Bench Division of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick, and by him sent on to Ottawa, where it is now under consideration by the Federal Department of Justice.

No word has been received from the department of Justice, but it is expected that the sentence that Swim be hanged on the 15th of July be not carried out until his mental condition is decided.

The prisoner is now a raving maniac and has become dangerous.

PROGRESSIVES SUPPORT FIELD-ING BUDGET

Vote Taken at 2.20 A. M.--Government Has Eighteen Majority --Announcement Received With Great Applause.

Ottawa, June 14--By a majority of eighteen, the government at 1.20 this morning carried its budget proposals. Nine Progressives and one Independent voted with the government, the vote standing:

For the budget, 119

Against, 101

Government majority, 18.

The Dayton amendment was rejected by a vote of 167 to 44, a majority of 123 for the government.

Several Progressives did not vote, although in their seats. This fact was called to the attention of the speaker by Mr. Meighen, who called on them to vote. The division as so modified was then announced as: Against the amendment, 169; for, 51; majority against, 118.

The main budget motion was then carried by eighteen, the vote standing: For, 119; against, 101.

Nine Progressives and Mr. Neill (Ind., Comox-Alberni) voted with government.

Division in Progressive Ranks

As in the vote on the main motion there was a division in the Progressive ranks, five of their number voting for the amendment and the remainder against it. The two Labor men, Woodsworth, of Winnipeg Centre, and Irvine, of East Calgary, voted for the amendment, and later against the budget.

The actual vote on the Drayton amendment was reached only after a curious incident. When the house divided, several Progressives did not vote either way, among them being Miss MacPhail, the woman member. The result of the vote was announced as:

For, 44; against, 167; majority against, 123.

Immediately Right Hon. Arthur Meighen, leader of the opposition, drew the attention of the speaker to the Progressives' abstention and emphasized that they had acted contrary to the rules of the house.

"They did not vote and they were in their seats when the vote was taken," the speaker queried.

"Yes," Mr. Meighen replied, "and they are not on the whips' lists as being paired."

The speaker ruled that those in their seats and not paired were obliged to vote.

"No loafing on the job," called out a voice from the government side, the house roaring with laughter.

SOUGHT REMOVAL OF HON. F. B. CARVELL

Progressives on the Warpath in Parliament.

Ottawa, June 11--When a vote of \$221,636 for the Board of Railway Commissioners was under consideration in the House of Commons just before six o'clock on Saturday, G. G. Foote, Progressive, asked whether Hon. W. R. Motherwell had taken any steps looking to the removal of Hon. F. B. Carvell from the post of chief of the board. Mr. Foote said that Hon. George Langley had appeared before a committee of the House and said that Mr. Motherwell had made an election promise to place a resolution on the order paper calling for the removal of Mr. Carvell.

Mr. Motherwell said that he had a statement on the matter in his desk and began to search for it, when the Premier arose and said that Mr. Motherwell had made representations on the matter to the government and they were receiving consideration.

Mr. Motherwell said he had made his statement regarding Mr. Carvell in his capacity of a private citizen. He was now a cabinet minister and the position carried responsibilities. This ended the discussion and the item carried.

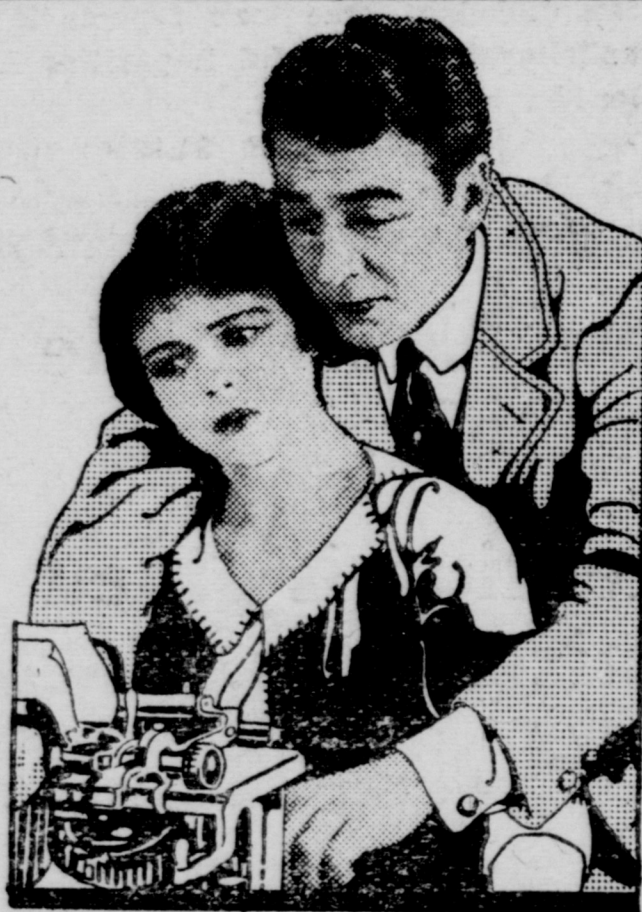
