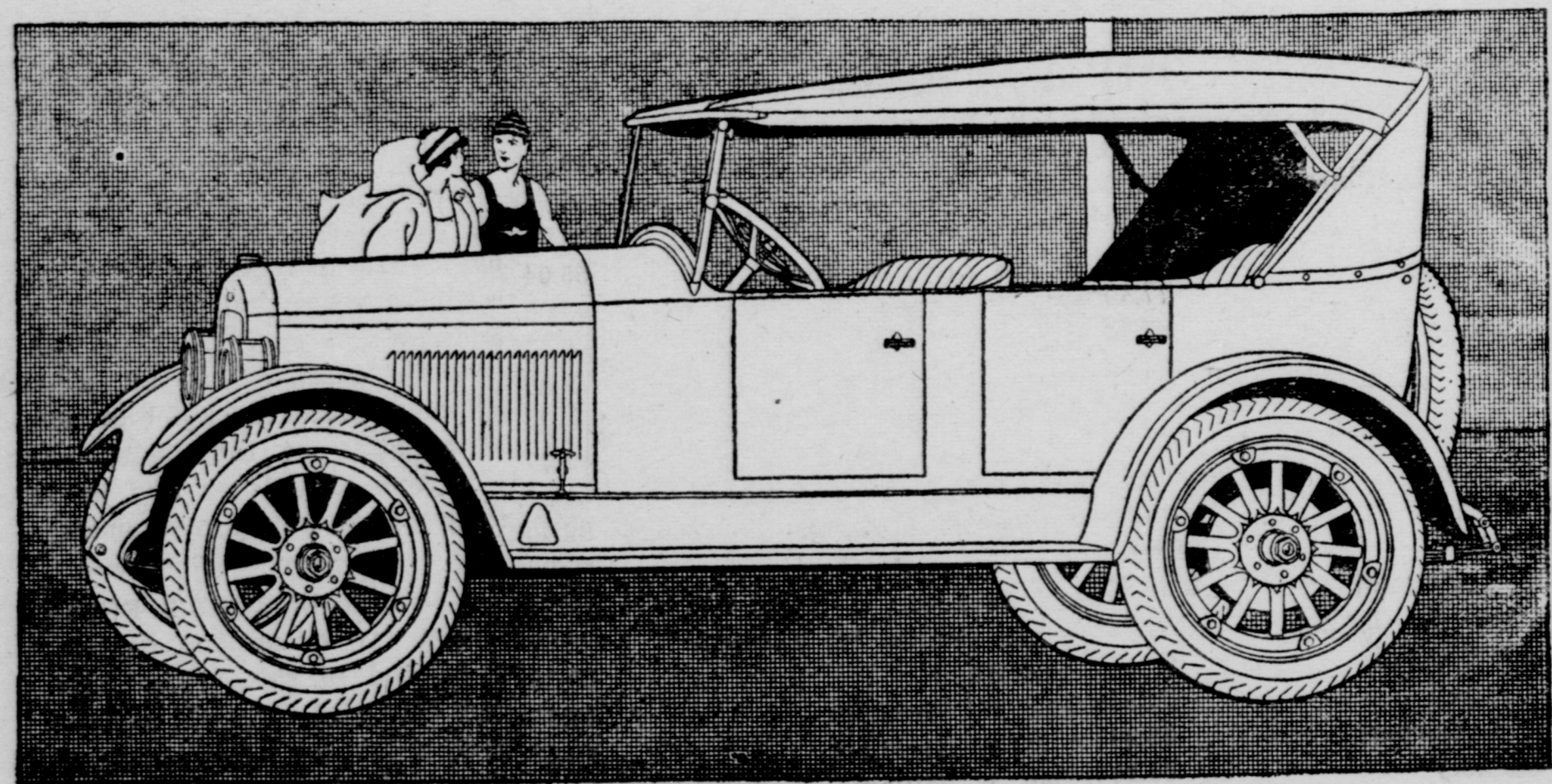

THE CANADIAN DOCTOR

There are Doctors—and Doctors in
Canada.

The title used to have but one mean-
ing—the now old-fashioned all-round
physician, who looked after the fam-
ily from the cradle to the grave and
combined all the departments of med-
icine in his old person. But now the
profession has been subdivided into
countless sub-divisions, and the Ex-
pert is displacing the Family Physi-
cian.

Canada has, it is estimated, 8,000
doctors who receive recognition thru
degrees, or one to every 1,000 of the
population, whereas in the United
States there is one to every 720.

It is further estimated that Canada
needs three hundred new doctors an-
nually to keep up the supply and
meet the demand. Canada has one
medical school for every 900,000 of
the total population; while in the United
States there is one medical stud-
ent for every 8,000 of population, and
in Canada one to every 3,700.

The Rockefeller Foundation is giv-
ing generous aid to medical educa-
tion in the Dominion, having donated
\$5,000,000 in the last two years for
this purpose, \$2,000,000 of the sum
being earmarked for scholarships as
part of their world-wide programme
of assisting existing medical schools
to increase their resources and to im-
prove their teaching research.

Modern days no doubt call for mod-
ern doctors, with an ever increasing
percentage of specialists, but let us
not forget the Old-School doctors, the
Maclures of the country, who served
and still serve their respective gen-
erations with fine skill and finer altruis-
tic motives.

FARM LABORERS
Canadian Pacific Railway to Run
Farm Laborers Excursion to Winni-
peg.

Canadian Pacific Railway will again
run Farm Laborers' Excursions to
Western Canada this year on August
4th and 18th. The fare for going
journey will be \$20.00 from St. John
and any other points in the province
on the line of the Canadian Pacific.
From points east of St. John and in
Prince Edward Island, the fares will
be made up of the lowest one way
second class fare to St. John plus
\$20.00, war tax additional. For the
return journey fare will be \$25.00
from Winnipeg to St. John and other
points in New Brunswick on the line
of the Canadian Pacific. To points
east of St. John and in Prince Ed-
ward Island, lowest one way second
class fare additional.

Every person purchasing farm lab-
orers' ticket will be furnished with
verification certificate, which when
filled in at Winnipeg by farmer, to
show that the holder of coupon has
been hired to work in the harvest
fields, will entitle the person to pur-
chase ticket from Winnipeg to any
point in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or
Alberta, but not west of Edmonton,
Calgary or Macleod, at rate of one-
half cent per mile, but not less than
50 cents.

The Canadian Pacific will operate
the required number of special trains
from St. John, the first to leave at
3.30 p. m. Eastern, or 4.30 p. m. At-
lantic or 5.30 p. m. St. John Day-
light Time, other trains to follow at
intervals in the late afternoon and
evening of August 4th.

Special accommodations on the trains
will be provided for ladies or for par-
ties travelling together. There will
also be arrangement provided for pas-
sengers procuring food on the jour-
ney.
