## POWER COMPANY MATTERS AGAIN UNDER DISCUSSION

Council Votes to Not Pay Increased Rate—Now to Utilities Commission—Company Will Sell Out to Town at Arbitration Price—No Move Made to Purchase—Coun. Creighton Intimates New Company—\$8,000 Added to Warrant—Does Part of Amount Go to Pay Power Co. Increase?

All the members of the town council were present at the adjourned meeting Tuesday night. Some slight change was made in the minutes of the previous meeting at the request of Coun. Page.

Additional \$8,000  
Town Manager Rutledge informed the Board that, due to the flood, the town was faced with unusual expenditure and suggested that \$8000 be added to the warrant which would make the total \$30,000. Coun. Augherton moved, seconded by Coun. Creighton that the amount be added.

On motion of Coun. Augherton seconded by Coun. Creighton, the latter's resignation as a member of the housing board was accepted and Manager Rutledge appointed in his place.

The manager stated that he had an offer from the Dartmouth fire department of a Seagrave truck for \$600.

Coun. Creighton moved that the manager be authorized to look the truck over and purchase if it was up to the requirements of the town.

Mayor Brown announced two vacancies on the school board. Mrs. Comben's term of office had expired. At the request of Coun. Augherton, the matter was left open until the next regular meeting.

Coun. Page said that several members of the council, with Manager Rutledge, visited Houlton and gained some useful information relative to power matters. They found it a profitable business. He felt if the town could get same rates as Houlton it would be a good proposition. Coun. Page said that an informal meeting had been held during the afternoon with power company officials who made a proposition for an increase of rates covering three months. He was not prepared to say that the hydro commission would deliver power from Bridgewater, Me.

Will Sell to Town

The Power Co. are willing to sell their plant to the town at a price to be fixed by arbitration. It is of serious importance and should be considered carefully. It might be good business from the point that the hydro commission are harnessing the province. It would be business to buy from hydro commission—organized on a proper basis. It can be done at a less rate than it is today.

Coun. Gallagher—"This is all very true but in the meantime we are up against a hard proposition and I feel we should give the company the advanced rates for three months, until we can make some definite arrangement. It is only justice to the whole town."

Coun. Augherton moved, seconded by Coun. Dunbar:

"That the Woodstock E. L. & P. Co. be granted an increased rate for Power and Light as asked for from the first of May, inst., for three months, and that this in no way affect the present contract with the Power Co. except for the balance of the named period but the contract to stand as executed for balance of the term except the three months above stated."

Should "Swallow" Loss  
Coun. Creighton did not think this should be railroaded through. He was not in favor of the "concession."

It was putting the cart before the horse. The power company should "swallow" their loss if they are going to continue. He did not think it was good business to buy from a jobber. He was in favor of taking the business over from the power company. The nearer you get to the producer the better. The power company stated that they were willing to sell out at any time.

Coun. Gallagher—"We all heard what went on today. The company said they were willing to sell at an arbitration price. It may be good business to take it over but until a

## CARLETON LIGHT INFANTRY HAS NEW COMMANDING OFFICER

Lieut. Col. J. J. Bull Has Honorable Record—Battalion to Camp June 26th—Other Woodstock Officers

In the changes in the Carleton Light Infantry, Major J. J. Bull succeeds Col. L. L. Kennedy whose term of command has expired, Major Hazen Flemming succeeds to the command of "A" Company, Woodstock, and Major J. J. Bull succeeds to the command of "B" Company, Woodstock.

Bull becoming, by appointment, Lieut. Colonel of the Carleton Light Infantry, is 500 strong in peace times, with headquarters in Woodstock. The four company centers are Woodstock, Hartland, Perth and Edmundston. Messrs F. M. Buck and J. Archer Watson are taking out commissions in the Carleton Light Infantry. Some 120 officers and non-commissioned officers of this unit will go under canvas at Sussex on June 26th, for nine days advanced training. This is the first time in 25 years that the command of this Battalion has been centered in Woodstock which is the headquarters. The last commanding officer from Woodstock was Colonel J. D. Baird.

Amendment Carries  
Coun. Creighton moved, seconded by Coun. Page, the following amendment:

"That the 'concession' be not granted at present time, but if the town takes over the supplying of light and power then the town pay them the extra for the time the company operates by steam." Coun. Creighton, Dibble, Page and Mayor Brown voted for the amendment. Carried.

Couns. Gallagher, Augherton and Dunbar against the amendment.

A New Company?  
Coun. Creighton remarked "if the town don't buy out, we can organize a company to buy in an hour."

To Utilities Board

Moved by Coun. Page, seconded by Coun. Creighton—"That the town clerk and town manager appear before the Public Utilities Commission on May 25th, and 'fight' the application of the Power Company or increased rates to consumers of power and light."

Council adjourned to Monday, 21st, at 8 o'clock.
