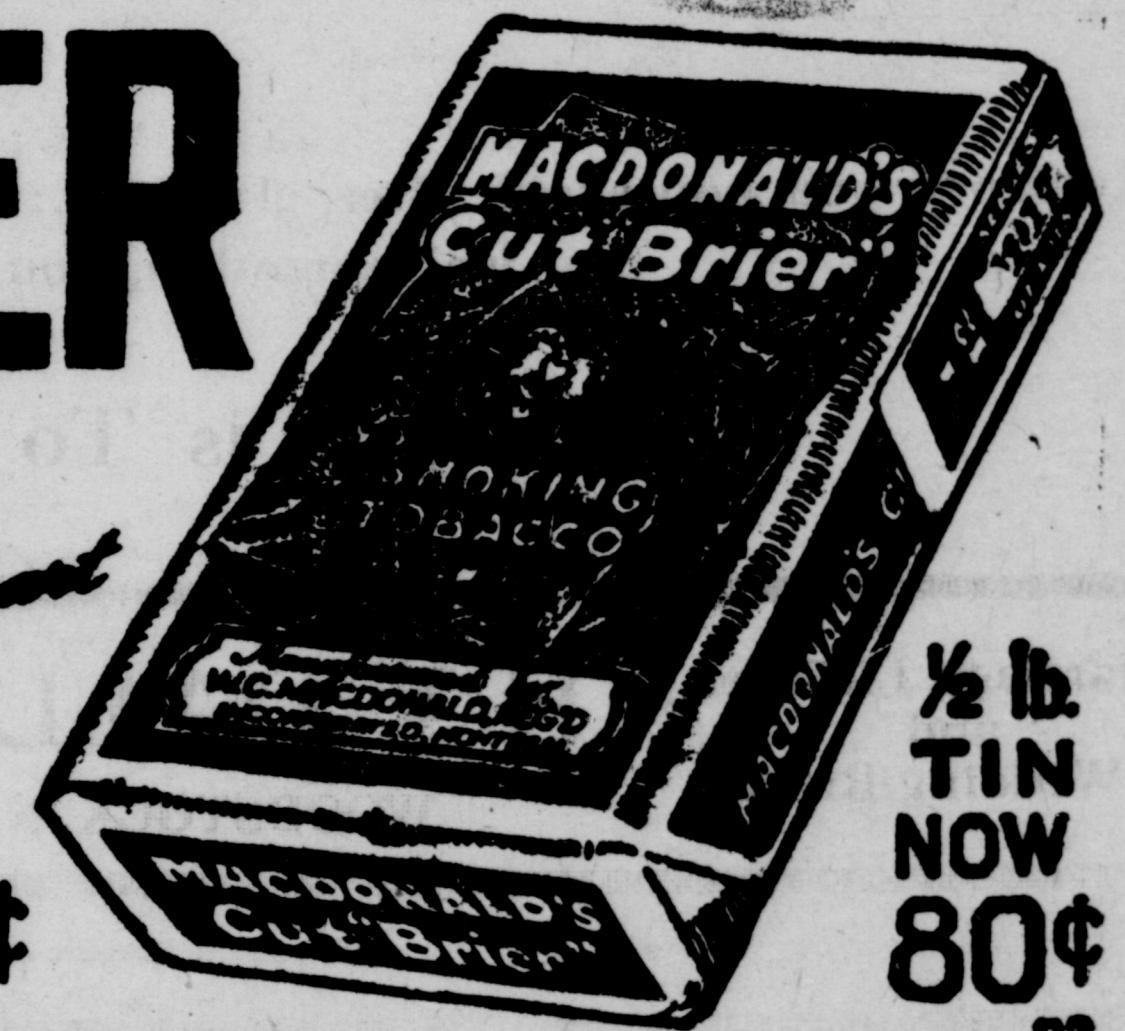

New Brunswick's Coming Industry

Dominion Government Report of 1922

With reference to one Oil Shale property in New Brunswick alone: "On this basis the average yield for the whole body of shale is estimated to be in the vicinity of forty gallons of oil and fifty-seven pounds of ammonium sulphate per ton.
