PROBABLY A RECORD

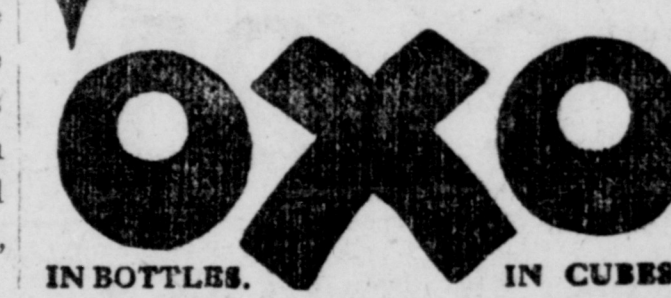
