FIRE AT FISHER MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

Some Anxiety Felt--Number of
Patients Removed--Cupola of
Building Destroyed--Good Work
of Nursing Staff.

An alarm of fire from the Fisher Memorial Hospital Friday evening brought the department out quickly also a large part of the population of the town. The fire, which was in the cupola, was exceedingly hard to handle but with the arrival of the reliable steam fire engine and hard work of the firemen and citizens it was subdued. Quite a quantity of water went through the front of the hospital necessitating the removal of several of the patients from the upper floor. Some patients were taken to their homes in the ambulance. The excellent work of the nurses and the quiet manner in which they carried out their duties was most favorably commented upon.

The matron, Miss Buid, and her assistant, Miss Myles, had the situation well in hand and the removal of the patients was carried out without confusion or accident. The loss on the building was appraised at \$2,900.

The amount of interior damage has not been fixed.

THE KING VS. L. JACOB HOLMES

The trial of L. Jacob Holmes in the Carleton County Court here ended on Tuesday evening. After addresses by Counsel, F. C. Squires for the accused and C. J. Jones representing the Crown, and the charge of his Honor, Judge Carleton to the jury, the latter returned after being out a short time returned with a verdict of not guilty. Holmes was then set at liberty.

The principal witnesses for the Crown were Vera Canam, who had accused the prisoner with an offence against herself, and her mother, Sarah Canam. The turning point in the case was probably occasioned by the searching cross-examination of these witnesses by Counsel for Holmes. Other witnesses were Sheriff Foster, Almon Canam, Father of Vera Canam, and Mrs. Burdiss Kearney. Holmes gave evidence in his own behalf.

APPOINTMENT OF NEW SENATOR IS ANNOUNCED

Ottawa, May 6--The appointment to the Senate of Hon. C.W. Robinson of Moncton, N. B., was officially announced Monday night. Mr. Robinson recently resigned the portfolio of Lands and Forests in the New Brunswick Government.

Hon. Clifford William Robinson is one of the outstanding men in the public life of New Brunswick, and served for a time as Prime Minister of that province. He has not only been prominent in legal, political and civic affairs, but is also connected with the industrial development of the province, being associated with a number of important concerns.

TOWN COUNCIL IN REGULAR SESSION

Routine Business Carried Out--
Opportunity for Aspiring Taxi
Enthusiasts --- Gasoline Pump
"Overhauled" --- New Pumping
Unit Ordered --- No Discount
Water After May 15th.

The town council were in session Monday evening and heard the bills and accounts read and referred to the finance committee. The matter of licenses for taxi drivers was discussed and a petition read. It was finally decided not to charge a license.

Some applications for the position of town manager were read. Town Manager Rutledge in submitting his report for the month of April said: Gentlemen:

STREETS AND SEWERS

Chief work was ditching and cleaning sewers. Bad spots on roads and sidewalks were filled in. A gravel sidewalk was constructed on Connell street, from Hartley street to Elm street. The steam roller has been repaired and other summer equipment, including sprinkling cart, put in working order.

WATER

Tenders have been requested for a new motor driven pumping unit and electrical control. The gasoline pump which had never been overhauled since its installation, was taken down, repaired, and is now in first class working order.

FIRE

Three alarms were answered during the month, and hose was laid on one occasion. A new hose cart has been ordered.

GENERAL

Tax receipts for the month were \$795.71. The water bills are now out, and a discount of 5% will be allowed until May 15th. After discount period is over water will be turned off in the cases of those in arrears.
