

QUANTITIES OF LOOT TAKEN BY U. S. OFFICERS

Robbers' Den Yields Great
Stores of Stolen
Goods

BANGOR POLICE
CAPTURE MEN

Burglars' Outfit With Ex-
plosive Found in Two
Automobiles

A report, coming by way of Houlton, says the gang of automobile bandits connected with numerous breaks and burglaries along the Maine and New Brunswick border, have been apprehended and are now in jail at Skowhegan, Me. In a big Studebaker car, stopped by officers, jewelry and other goods to the value of \$4,500, as well as a quantity of nitro-glycerine were found. This car was in Boston and in charge of Stephen Hoppe. In a Ford car captured in Portland, two men, Stevens and Haley, were arrested. When Stevens learned that the Boston police had arrested Hoppe he confessed, it is said, to several breaks through the state. On searching both men there was found on Haley \$31 in bills and \$1.95 in silver; on Stevens \$2 in bills, some small change and a bag full of silver amounting to \$8.78, a Stillson wrench and a revolver.

On Friday the sheriff's office at the county jail in Bangor looked like an overstuffed pawnshop. The place was piled high with a vast quantity and endless variety of goods, ranging from silver teaspoons to horse blankets and from wrist watches to gum boots.

The sheriff and his men had made another visit to the robbers' den where on Thursday they unearthed some of the plunder gathered in recently by burglaries in eastern and northern Maine, and this time they cleaned the place out completely. The robbers' den is a house in Hermon, Me., on a road branching off from the main highway, which for some time has been occupied by Steve Hoppe, associate of Clifford Stevens and Leroy Haley, and much frequented by the latter pair. Hoppe bought the place two years ago, and at once made extensive repairs on the story and a half frame house, which was a wreck when he took it, added dormer windows and a porch, and gave the building a coat of paint.

Undoubtedly these are the same persons who attempted to enter the Tarbell store at Smyrna Mills, who were fired at by the watchman and one wounded. They also visited New Brunswick. Many articles found have been identified by owners of towns they visited.

Sheriff John A. Moores said that in his belief at least \$50,000 worth of stolen goods had been shipped by motor from Maine to other states, most of it going to Boston. The burglar's outfit captured on Friday at the Hermon headquarters included three electric drills, a box of dynamite (25 pounds) in half-pound sticks, acetylene gas outfit, drills and cold chisels of all sizes, batteries, caps and fuses in great quantity and variety. The plunder sent to Bangor jail filled two large motor cars. This important capture cleans up the automobile bandits that have been operating all summer and who at times had headed for Woodstock, but at Ashland, Me., they suspected that New Brunswick officers were watching them and they went in another direction.

The men arrested near Moncton and given penitentiary sentences were not working with the outfit just captured.

YOUNG MOWBRAY IS SUSPECTED IN ANOTHER MYSTERIOUS MURDER

Former Benton Youth or Double Seen at Beverley.
Scene of Second Murder--Search on in Boston for
Clements' Slayer--Youth Had Just 86 Cents When
Found--Same Sum Was Found on Body.

Beverly, Oct. 10.--Their all-day attempts to establish the identity of the man whose body was found in Norwood Pond Saturday having failed, police late today found a slender thread, which may connect the murder here with that of F. A. Clements at Burlington.

This clue is a statement by Chas. Sylvester, night gate tender at North Beverly station, that a young man resembling closely the pictures of Halie Mowbray, who has admitted that he helped conceal the body of Clements after the Burlington murder, spent Thursday night at his shack near the crossing.

Thursday is the day on which the body of Clements was recovered from Shawshen River at Bedford. Chief of Police William Davison tonight announced that he had received a telegram which may lead to the identification of the murdered man. The wire was from A. J. Rice of 25 Carlton St., Springfield, saying: "Do not bury the body. Will arrive tomorrow." Chief Davison wired back that the body was buried this morning and asked for a description of the man Rice has in mind.

At Shack All Night
Sylvester is the night man at this crossing. Dodge's Row, which starts at the crossing, leads to Norwood Pond, in which the local victim's body was found Saturday. It is the nearest railroad station to the scene.

On Thursday afternoon, according to Sylvester, a youth about 18, wearing a blue sweater and resembling the picture of Mowbray, appeared at his shack. He loitered about and then, telling Sylvester that he had hiked all the way from Newburyport, asked if he might lie down for a few minutes on the cot in the shack.

Sylvester invited the youth inside and he remained there all night. Sylvester questioned the youth, who was reticent, and learned that he was a truck driver out of work, that he had come to North Beverly the day before and walked to Newburyport--a distance of about 17 miles--in search of work, and that on that day, Thursday, he had walked back.

Claimed to Live Here
He claimed to have a room in Scolay Sq., Boston. He said he was broke except for 86 cents. By coincidence, this is the same sum which was found in the clothes of the body in Norwood Pond. Sylvester was curious why the youth left the train at North Beverly, instead of another station nearer to Newburyport.

James Parsons, day gate tender, saw the youth about 10 minutes of 7, Friday morning inside the station. Parsons declared his attention was drawn to the stranger because of his worried and odd appearance. Frederick E. King, station agent, recalled such a youth at the station in the morning but was not able to say he resembled the published picture of Mowbray.

"I was pretty busy," remarked Mr. King, "but I remember the man asking me for a ticket to Boston. I especially noticed him because instead of taking the 7 o'clock train, he waited until the 7.33."

The police are investigating the story of young Mowbray, in the belief that he has not told all he knows of the affair. The field of inquiry has shifted from Burlington to Boston, where the authorities are keeping close watch on the haunts of certain characters.

Beverly, Mass., Oct. 12.--Fred R. Risteen, a former Nova Scotian, whose body, weighted with cast iron, was found in Norwood Pond, North Beverly, eight days ago, was killed in a midnight fight with George W. Plummer, jr., in the woods, three miles from his home, Mrs. Marion A. Risteen, widow of the dead man, and Plummer told the police today. Both were arrested last night, charged with murder.
