VISITORS FROM MAIMI, FLORIDA, MET BIG MOOSE

M. and Mrs. Austin Enroute Here Had Interesting Experience Near Woodstock, N. B.—They Like Our Country.

Seldom, if ever, have visitors from the Southern States to our province had the opportunity of seeing our big game in the manner experienced by Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Austin, of Miami, Florida, who arrived in the city last evening by motor from St. John. Mr. and Mrs. Austin stopped over in Woodstock, N. B., for a day or so on their way from Sault Ste Marie to Sydney, N. S., by the all Canadian route.

While at Woodstock on Thursday morning, Mr. and Mrs. Austin went out on a hunting trip with Dr. and Mrs. Brown of that town, the party motoring about twelve miles into the country. The day was a delightful one and the trip to the woods was thoroughly enjoyed. Dr. and Mrs. Brown had to return to the town early to enable the doctor to fulfill an engagement there, and the Austin party remained behind taking their time about driving homewards.

Suddenly, as the car reached a particularly wild piece of ground a large moose crashed out of the underbrush and trotted along the road ahead of the machine. Never having seen a moose before Mr. and Mrs. Austin were naturally much startled but recovering their composure they tramped on the gas and raced after the antlered monarch. Overtaking the animal the mudguard of the car grazed his hind leg causing him to increase his pace. The chase continued for about three miles before the moose left for the woods again and on two occasions the driver of the car was able to reach out and slap the big fellow on the flank.

Why the animal did not turn on his tormentor is a miracle and Mr. Austin says it did not occur to him what danger he was exposed to had the animal done so.

Speaking to a Times representative last night, Mr. and Mrs. Austin were both highly elated that their introduction to the New Brunswick moose concerning which they had heard so much, was such a novel one. They state the moose was a big one with antlers, as they expressed it, "wider than our outstretched arms."

Mr. and Mrs. Austin left Miami on May 24th last and motored to Northern Michigan where they have a summer cottage. After somewhat over two months spent there they proceeded to Sault Ste Marie and continued by motor on to Montreal and Quebec and so on to Woodstock and Moncton. After a day or two spent here they intend to proceed to Sydney, C. B., before returning home. During the past several years Mr. and Mrs. Austin have motored pretty well all over the continent. Residing in Miami, Florida, they motored one year to Tijuana, Mexico; on another occasion to Vancouver and this year to Sydney, C. B. They are delighted with the scenery in Canada and were particularly delighted with the Canadian Rockies, having motored to Lake Louise and other well known resorts. They found their trip from Sault Ste Marie to Moncton very charming and say our roads are excellent. In the whole distance over 1300 miles from the Soo to here, the only bad stretch they experienced was a piece about 65 miles long in the vicinity of North Bay, Ontario.

Mr. and Mrs. Austin says our province of New Brunswick is lovely as far as they have seen it and they are anticipating fine scenery on the way to Sydney. Enroute home they will motor through the Annapolis Valley to Digby and ship to St. John from where they will motor home. During their conversation with the Times representative, the latter advised them to spend a couple of days in Moncton and take a few side trips advising them to see the Colpitts Fox ranch at Little River, the Gordon Falls at Elgin, the Rocks at Hopewell Cape and to continue down to Alma. They were grateful for the advice and said they would remain a day or so and see some, at least, of these places. They say they have found it a difficulty down this way to get information of the local points of interest other than what may be seen along the main route.
