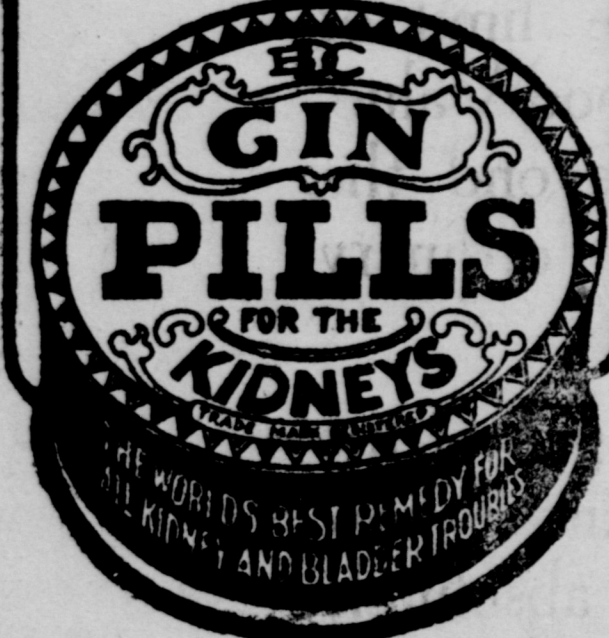

years in Dorchester and I got him there safely. You remember of the Sheriff in Charlotte county who allowed a handcuffed prisoner to go into the closet on a train, on the way to the penitentiary, and the prisoner or the handcuffs have not been seen since.

Couns Perry, Dalling and Saunders were anxious to deduct \$9 of the Sheriff's bill, but the Council thought

Sheriff Foster was justified in the course he took in the Scribner case. The following resolution moved by Coun Fleming, seconded by Coun Perry, was carried:

1st—That brush burning in the spring should not be permitted except under the supervision of a competent Provincial Fire Warden, who shall be instructed to report all permits to the Department of Lands and Mines each month together with their certification of having inspected the ground after the burning was completed and being satisfied that no fire was left unextinguished.

2nd—That the act requiring the registration of all persons travelling in the woods be continued in effect and that the certificates be available to woods travellers at all P.O.'s in N.B.

3rd—That the act authorizing the councillors to appoint municipal fire wardens be continued in effect.

4th—That the act confining the issuing of permits for slash burning by Wardens only be continued in effect.

5th—That the council urge upon the Government the necessity of the strictest economy as regards Capital Expenditure such as the building of look-out towers etc. throughout the province. While recognizing the greater efficiency in discovering fires quickly provided by these towers, we believe that increased efficiency of wardens, increased interest of councillors and public at large in the elimination, as far as possible, of the devastation of fire throughout the province, should enable the province to continue an efficient fire service without going to the expense of additional capital expenditure in the building of more look-out towers at the present time.

Coun Raymond believed in protecting the forests and the money for the same was well spent. The government appointee, if he cannot attend to the matter himself, should have power to appoint a responsible man in his place.

Coun McIntosh—Personally I am not in favor of the issuing of permits to enter the woods. I have heard of but few people in Aberdeen who are

in favor of permits. Some time ago I started to go to my summer camp in the woods, but was stopped by the government officer, Mr. Johnston, who asked me for my permit and, as I had none, he refused to let me enter the woods. I told him I was a County Councillor for Aberdeen parish and he then let me go to my camp.

Coun Gibson—I am also opposed to the issuing of permits because it works against the man who has the permit. The man who has a permit will likely be careful, but others who have not permits will enter the woods, the inspectors notice a fire, and they get back at the man who has the permit although he is most likely to be the innocent one.

Coun Fleming—I am particularly interested, owing to my business, in forest protection. The permits give the government a check on those entering the woods, and it enables the government to keep a track on outside strangers.

Coun McIntosh—The permit system is mighty unpopular in the parish of Aberdeen.

The motion then carried. Warden appointed Couns. Phillips, Boyd and Smith as the Dog Tax Committee.

THURSDAY

Council met at ten o'clock, warden in the chair.

Dr. J. A. Wade, Medical Health Officer, explained the work of the following nurses and the work they did in the different communities. There should be one follow-up nurse in every county of N.B. She will go around with the medical school inspector. One nurse will go around with the medical school, inspector.

Coun Stevens—Would the Council be in honor bound to carry on the work and pay \$2400 after the Rockefeller Fund paid for the nurses for two years.

Dr. Wade—At present that is the arrangement. It would seem to be a good idea, if the counties would try it out, but not bind themselves. If the thing does not work satisfactorily there should be a proviso that the counties should not have to carry it on after two years.

Coun Melville—How would it do to adopt the scheme and put in a proviso that if it works well we will carry it on.

Coun Stevens—Who appoints the nurse?

Dr. Wade—The department.

Coun Dalling—I have listened with a good deal of pleasure to the remarks of Dr. Wade as to the work of the medical inspector and the follow-up nurse. We had a few bad cases in Richmond. Dr. Bailey vaccinated our school teacher, Katie McLellan. The teacher took sick and had to come to Woodstock and it cost her \$75 before she got well. She was out that money and the school department would not allow her even her school time.

Dr. Wade—The woman may have not protected her arm.

Coun Bell—How did the teacher get through Normal School without being vaccinated?

Coun Phillips—I had a son vaccinated at the Grafton school by Dr. Bailey and became very sick. The arm was not wrapped up to keep out foreign matter.



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Coun Fleming told of a case in Aberdeen where Dr. Somerville quarantined a house for an infectious disease and the man was not able to get out and earn a living for his family. As a matter of fact there was no infectious disease in the house. There should be some remedy for cases of that kind.

Dr. Wade—We have to depend upon our doctors. Dr. Somerville is one of them, he diagnosed the case, said it was scarlet fever and put the house in quarantine. He might have isolated the patient and let the man go to work.

T. C. L. Ketchum, secretary of the local board of health, made his report.

Moved by Coun. Perry, seconded by Coun. Balmann, that the report be filed. Carried.

Coun Balmann—Is there a case of contagious disease near this Court House at present?

Mr. Ketchum—Yes, diphtheria, and the house has been placarded.

Coun Stevens—In the matter of licenses for hotels, you only received \$7.

Mr. Ketchum—Those are all who applied. The fee is \$1.

Moved by Coun Melville, seconded by Coun. Balmann, that the grant to the Board of Health be \$1700.

Moved by Coun. Perry, seconded by Coun. Brown, in amendment that the grant be \$1500.

Coun Melville said that if there happened to be an epidemic break out the Board would be short of money.

The amendment carried, and Council adjourned till 2 o'clock.

Council met at two o'clock, Warden in the chair.

The auditor stated that Coun Bell had received from L. E. Young, collections made, the sum of \$114, to be applied to the indebtedness of the parish of Wakefield.

Moved by Coun McIntosh, seconded by Coun Melville, that Coun Hugh J. Fleming be added to the committee to interview the executors of the Fisher estate in regard to improvements at the Hospital.

Carried.

Coun Melville submitted the report of the Municipal Home Committee. He said that as the management at the Home was not satisfactory, he advertised for tenders for caretaker and had 16 applications. He and the late Coun Carvell made the selection of the present caretaker who proved to be a very capable official. There are 26 inmates; had wood enough to last all winter, but the sanitary conditions were not satisfactory.

Coun Perry said he was pleased with the report. He had much to do with the starting of the Municipal Home. Kent had paid \$687 for the poor from his parish. Putting in a tank might improve the sanitary conditions.

Moved by Coun Perry, seconded by Coun Phillips, that the report of the committee on the Municipal Home be adopted. Carried.

Moved by Coun Perry, seconded by Coun Tweedie, that the Council visit the Vocational School in a body at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning.

Warden Anderson appointed Coun. Stevens as a committee of one to notifiy E. W. Mair, the president of the Vocational School, Board and R. W. Maxwell, the director of the School.

Moved by Coun. Bell, seconded by Coun Melville, that the Carleton County L. P. Fisher Memorial Hospital be given a grant of \$3500.

Coun Dalling—I consider the Hospital is a luxury and move in amendment that the grant be \$2500.

Coun Tracey—I second the amendment.

Coun Melville—Coun Dalling says the Hospital is a luxury. It is not much of a luxury to be sick. The Council at one time only gave the Hospital \$2000. We said you give us a matron, assistant matron and service and we will vote you \$3500. The Hospital Board has done so and by taking hold the Board has made it grow. The Hospital treats more poor patients at a cost that exceeds the grant.

Coun Dalling—I have every confidence in Coun Melville, but I still contend that there are free luxuries to the doctors and nurses and others. As to taking care of the poor, any destitute person will be taken care of in any city hospital. I have never had to issue any permit for a poor patient from Richmond. Why does it cost so much there as compared to other hospitals?

Coun Balmann—The Fisher Hospital is a wonderful institution. It has not yet had the capacity to put it on a standard scale. As living is high, the expenses of the Hospital are high. When the price of living was less, expenses at the Hospital were less. It would be better to increase than to curtail the grant. Formerly people in general were more charitable and they do not rally now to assist sick people, hence the need of an Hospital for the poor and afflicted.

Coun Perry—Kent has received very cordial treatment at the Hospital. I do not know how the price compares with other hospitals. Kent had 15 free patients in the Hospital last year, and, if times do not improve, we hope to double that number next year. I do not know what we would do without the Hospital. I would like to get along with less than \$3500, but the Hospital can't, and I will vote for the larger amount.

Coun Bell—Wakefield had one free patient in the Hospital and I was mighty glad to know just where to put that patient.

Coun McIntosh—I was there as a patient and it is a risky piece of business to lower the present high standing of the Hospital. Aberdeen had only one free patient.

Coun Phillips—I was always favorable to the Hospital but the Council has always tried to decrease expenses there. I am glad that the Board can get along with \$3500. Coun Melville used to be quite a critic of the Hospital. He has now had Hospital experience and as he is a safe man he would not ask for \$3500 if he thought \$2500 would do.

Coun McDougall—Coun Melville said that we agreed to give \$1500 extra if the Hospital gave the service, but it is not giving the service. I have had some experience with hospitals here and elsewhere. The board of trustees deserve credit for their work. There is discrimination however. Let the patient bring in his own doctor from outside the hospital staff and he will not get the same treatment. The Debec doctor never got fair treatment at the Hospital, but he is too much of a gentleman to make any complaints about it. I put a man in the Hospital, and they ordered him out. They gave me only two days to get him out and he was dying. I applied to get him in the Home for incurables but there was no room just then.

Coun Cliff—I understand that Coun McDougall, asked to have the man taken in for a few days, and he remained there a couple of months. No successful operation could be performed on him and he had to be removed.

Coun Melville—The Hospital, is not a home for old people, nor for incurables. As to rates, we visited several nearby hospitals in an endeavor to improve our own Hospital and found our rates were lower than the nearby hospitals that we visited. Everything used in the Hospital is bought at wholesale cost.

Mr. Hartley—I was on the trustee board for ten years. I found that a certain doctor could bring tuberculosis patients to the Hospital. The board of trustees did not agree with me on the question of management and I resigned. I strongly claim that doctors should not be on the trustee board.

Coun Raymond—It is only a question of \$1000 between the motion and the amendment. The Hospital, is a credit to the county. My wife was there. She was nothing but praise there. She has nothing but praise for the nurses and staff. I am satisfied with the treatment of free patients, but thousands of dollars are due from those who went in as pay patients and the board should make a strong effort to collect that money.

Coun Balmann—Mr. Creighton said that these bills were handed in to Mr. Holyoke and Mr. Whitehead for collection, but these gentlemen were told not to press the collection on distressed people.

Coun Boyd—We are greatly pleased with the Hospital in my parish. Kent sent 15 free patients to the Fisher Hospital and no sick people could be used better.

Coun Bull—I was in the Fisher Hospital for some time. The doctors and nurses gave me great care, and I will vote for the \$3500.

Coun Tweedie—My information about the Hospital is favorable and I will vote for the larger grant.

Coun Brown—It is only natural

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that there will be some criticism. I have every confidence in Coun McDougall, but the Hospital is a worthy institution. When the Hospital building was given to us it was a white elephant, as it was not suitable for an Hospital. I will vote for \$3500 if the trustees will pay some attention to the criticisms now being made.

Coun Balmann—I was never in the Hospital for treatment, but it is a worthy institution and well managed. My wife was there and she had not the slightest fault to find even with the old management. I was on the

Hospital Board some years ago, and, at present, it is one of the best hospitals in the world outside of Mayo Bros Hospital in the United States.

Coun Clark—I was 17 days in the Fisher Hospital, and I was used (Continued on page six)
