Carleton County Court.

In the Carleton County Court recently held here, there were two important criminal cases tried before His Honor Judge Carleton.

King vs. Garfield Bennett—The information was laid by Harry London. He claimed that Bennett had tried to trade horses with him and had been refused, and that Bennett had gone to his barn and taken his horse away leaving his own horse in its place. That Bennett had then disposed of the horse by trading him away with a party living in the State of Maine.

Evidence as produced by the defence that London had told several people on the day of the alleged theft that he had traded horses with

the defendant. It was also shown that London had worked the horse Bennett had left and made no effort to get possession of the other horse although Bennett had had it in town afterwards to London's knowledge.

The jury retired and after quite lengthy consideration brought in a verdict of not guilty.

King vs. Sam Lloyd—The information was to the effect that Samuel Lloyd had stolen a mackinaw coat from Harold Demerchant. Both lived near Bath in the Parish of Kent. The coat, which was found in Lloyd's possession, was claimed by both Demerchant and his mother to be the same coat stolen from their barn about a year ago.

The defence claimed that Lloyd had found the coat hanging in his shed after the threshers were at his place and that it had been left there and innocently worn by Lloyd, that

he had worn it in the presence of Demerchant's brother, and that they had accused another party of stealing another mackinaw coat a year before they claimed they lost the one produced in court.

The jury retired and shortly brought in a verdict of not guilty. In both these cases the Crown was represented by C. J. Jones, while the prisoners were defended by F. C. Squires.

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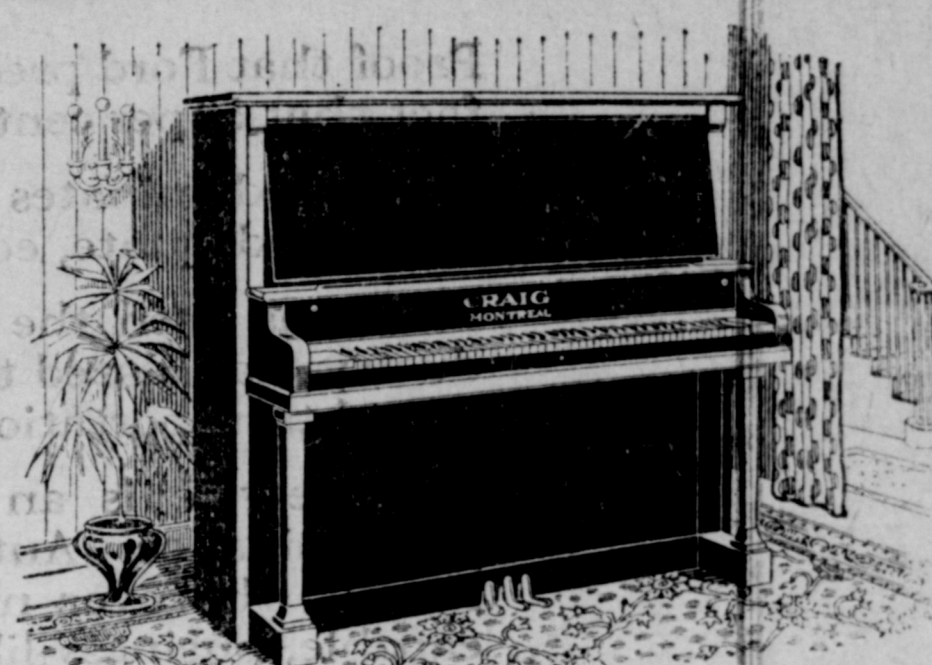
