JOAN OF ARC

Woodstock Choral Society Concert

Thursday, May 15th, marked the first appearance of the Woodstock Choral Society under the direction of Mr Frank Magill Sherlock.

Mr Sherlock, whose ability as a musical director is well known, again proved his ability to conduct, for from the start to the finish the concert was a musical achievement worthy of commendation. The program was in two parts.

Part One—"In flammatus" from Rossini's Stabat Mater, which was given in a truly finished style, the solo part sung by Mrs H McElroy being exceptionally good. This was followed by a solo, "Invictus" sung by Mr Sherlock and was well received, as were also his two encore numbers, his second song "At Dawning" being well nigh perfect, his finishing notes being as clear as a bell. This is a beautiful lyric and was beautifully sung. Mrs. J F L Brown followed this, singing "The Rosary," Nevin, and as usual she won the hearty applause of the entire audience and was most enthusiastically encored, to which she graciously responded. This part of the program concluded with the singing of Gounod's "By Babylon's Wave," a paraphrase of Psalm 137, and was splendidly done. The shading and blending of the voices clearly showed patient and careful training.

Part Two was of a different nature, being the rendering of Alfred R Gaul's Historical Cantata, Joan of Arc. This is a beautiful work, full of contrast, and showed up a well balanced chorus. Their tone was good throughout, and their enunciation splendid.

The Choral Society has reason to be proud of itself as a choral institution, and it is to be hoped that this concert was but the first of many more. The solos were sung by Mrs S C Heckbert, Mrs H McElroy, Mr C Sykes, Rev W P Haigh and Mr Sherlock. Special mention should be made of the solo work of Mrs Heckbert and Mrs McElroy, who distinguished themselves as soloists of high rank. Woodstock is certainly fortunate to have such fine local talent. Mrs E W Maier was the accompanist and as usual displayed her ability in that capacity.

Throughout the Cantata, the chorus was supported by a local orchestra which added much to the attractiveness of the program. They were Messrs Bridgeo, Dyer, Speer, Camber, Rogers, Wallace, Aliotis and Ris teen.

On the whole the concert was a musical triumph and shows that Woodstock is capable of producing a musical concert at any time under capable direction.

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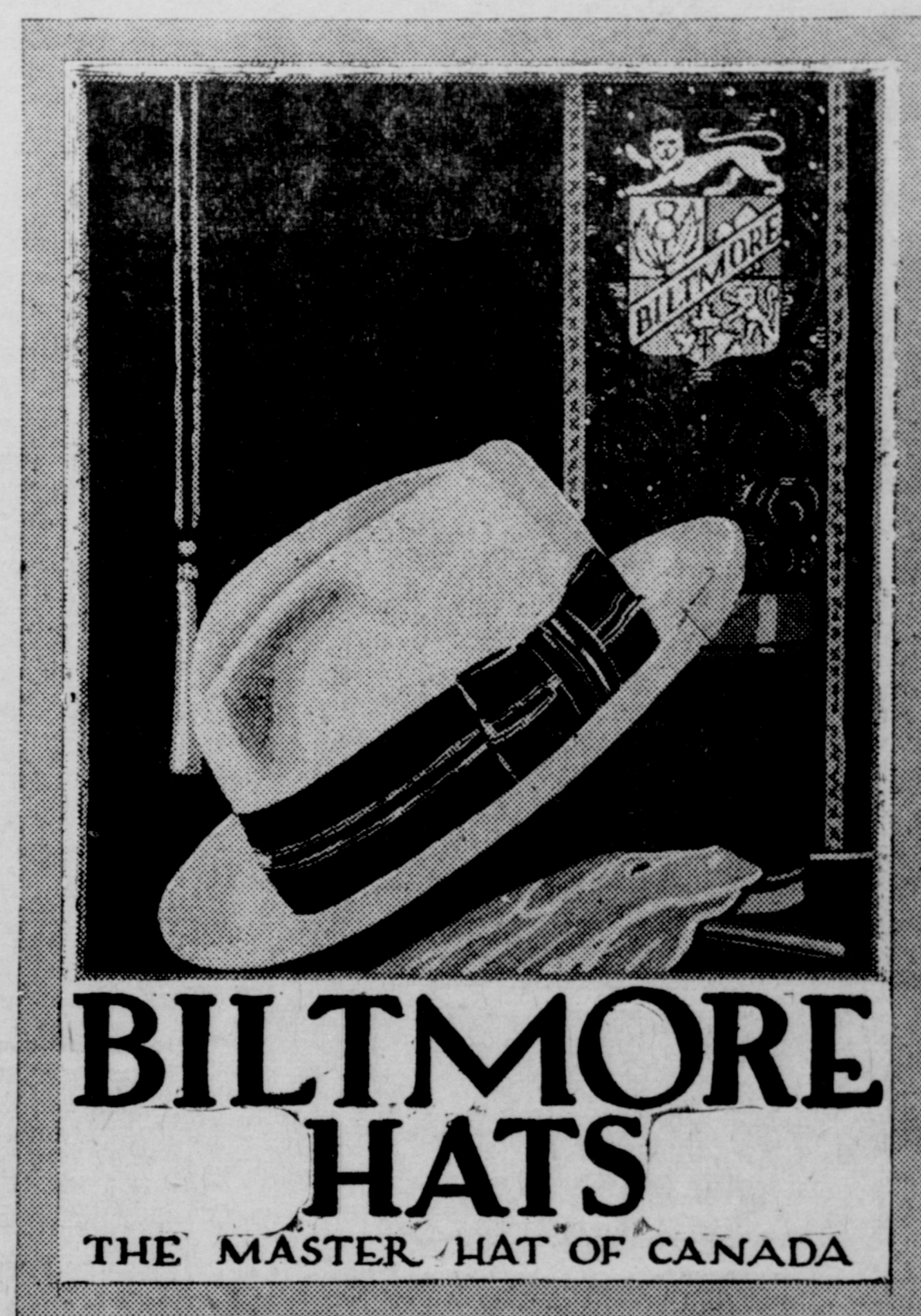
