GRAND PARADE AT MID-SUMMER CARNIVAL

July 16th. Races Postponed.

Although the weather was threatening on the opening day of the Carnival, the streets were lined with people at an early hour, watching for the parade. Two bands were in attendance and at nine o'clock the Woodstock Band gave an open air concert in front of the Carlisle Hotel and the Bridgewater Band gave one in front of Newham & Slipp's Drug store. Cars were not allowed to park on Main street and this gave the spectators a splendid chance to see the parade.

At 10.30 the parade started from the upper end of Main street, near Dr Rankin's residence, proceeding down Main street, across the Creek bridge, down the lower road, up to Broadway back to Main, up Main to Chapel street, along Chapel, up Green street, back to place of beginning.

They lined up as follows:

The Fredericton Gleaner publishes the following letter:
Woodstock, N. B., July 9, 1924
Dr C C Jones,
Chancellor U. N. B.

Dear Sir,—I note with regret that the returned soldier applicant did not receive the appointment to the Staff of the Forestry Department of the University of New Brunswick. The fact that he was considered favored by some of your competent committee sets aside any claim that he was incompetent.

We regret not so much the personal loss to the applicant as the principle involved in his non-appointment. Our Provincial universities are our national universities. It is the national idea to favor returned men, first, as some reward for the sacrifice that they made for our country, and secondly, to promote the idea for the future that services to the country will receive recognition by the country.

Servatis servandis; if our Universities will not promote the national idea, where can we expect them to be promoted? Unfortunately, too, institutions that do not carry out their appointed end, contain a weakness that must necessarily militate against their success.

GOVERNOR'S PARTY VISITS WOODSTOCK

Hon. W. F. Todd Welcomed By Officials of the Town and County.

Lieut Governor Todd and party arrived here Thursday evening on an official tour of this part of the province. Mrs Todd, her daughter, Mrs N Marks Mills and R S Barker, private secretary, were the other members of the party. Elaborate preparations had been made to have an outdoor reception on the court house grounds but a heavy shower interfered with this arrangement and the ceremonies were held in the court house. A large number of citizens attended and a guard of honor from the G. W. V. A. under command of Lt Colonel Bull was present. The 6th Regiment Band played national airs during the evening.

Mayor J R Brown extended a welcome to the distinguished visitors and Warden W F Anderson welcomed them on behalf of the county. Governor Todd expressed his thanks for the heartiness of the reception tendered him. He referred to Woodstock as one of the oldest towns in New Brunswick and noted for its loyalty from the earliest days. In agriculture the county was a leader. This splendid court house was a credit to the county. To the war veterans nothing he could say would measure up to the sacrifices they made. He feelingly referred to those who had given up their lives in their effort to bring peace to the world and they would always be held in splendid memory. During a visit to Governor General Byng his excellency said he was deeply impressed with the loyalty of the people of New Brunswick when on his visit to the province last year.

Closing his admirable address Governor Todd said it was his desire to visit the places of interest before leaving for up river.

Mrs J R Brown presented Mrs Todd with a bouquet of carnations. The large number present were received by the Governor and party who were afterwards escorted to the Carlisle Hotel by the veterans and 67th Band.

Lt Col. W. C. Good who was A D C to the Governor carried out his duties with military precision and dignity.

The party left Friday afternoon for Andover and other points.

Visited Grand Falls

Lieutenant Governor W F Todd and Mrs Todd, accompanied by R S Barker, secretary, arrived at Grand Falls on Friday and attended a public meeting at MacLaren's Theatre, where they were welcomed by a company of school children, who sang "O Canada." Mayor D J Collins occupied the chair.

His Worship read the address of welcome, and little Miss Mary Collins, daughter of His Worship, presented Mrs Todd with a lovely bouquet of roses. Mrs Todd replied with finely chosen expressions.

Lieut Governor Todd replied to the address of welcome by paying tribute to the hospitality of the New Brunswick people. He urged the children before him to take advantage of their educational opportunities and to continue on through High School whenever possible. Speeches were also made by Rev J J Miller and Rev Thomas Albert.

PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT CONVENTION AT ST. JOHN

N. B. Liberals Form Association; 500 at Meeting—Col. A. McMillan is Recommended as President of the Organization—Speech by Premier.

The formation of a Provincial Government Association, which will likely have headquarters in St John, and the general meeting adjourned for which it is almost certain that the principal officers will be St John. At the committee meeting it was decided upon this morning that headquarters be located in St John, and Provincial Government, at which all the following officers elected: President, Colonel A McMillan; secretary, Colonel A McMillan; treasurer, A Neil McLean.
