CAMPING SITES READY FOR TOURISTS

Nestling picturesquely among the purple hills bordering the St. John River lies the beautiful town of Woodstock, the Capital of Carleton county, so aptly called "The Garden of the Province." It is on the trunk road which leads along the St. John river whose scenery tourists have said is unequalled by the historic Rhine. Dividing the town into two sections is the Meduxnakik, a tributary of the St. John River. The name is Indian, meaning rocky bottom.

Woodstock, situated on the main trunk road between St. John and Edmundston, is sixty-five miles north from Fredericton, the capital of the province, twelve miles from Houlton, Me., and twenty-six miles from Bridgewater, Me. Houlton and Bridgewater are situated on the main state road to Presque Isle and are connected by good roads to Bangor and Portland, Me., and Boston, Mass.

Woodstock, sometimes called the sporting town, is known far and near. The Exhibition building and race track is a great attraction to the majority of people, owing to its size, site and modernness. This building is situated on an island which is one of the best and most popular exhibition grounds in the province. These grounds are reached by an approach from the Grafton Bridge. The half mile race track includes the greater part of the southern end of the island and has proved to be one great feature in drawing large crowds to the exhibition. The horse races are carried on every summer and have brought tourists, who take a great interest in this sport, from all parts of New Brunswick and the Bowler towns of Maine. Below the race track is a field well adapted as an aerodrome. On this island is to be found also the Tourists Camping Grounds, beautifully situated amidst a grove of shade trees. There every facility is to be found for tourists camping, including a cook house with cooking equipment and good water supply. The existence of the Camping Ground is indeed a strong feature in attracting tourists.

Our excellent Golf Links, situated on rising ground within the town limits, are worthy of mention for they may be compared with the best. On looking from the links one has the most wonderful view of the St. John. He can see the vast hills and forests which seem to be a part of the river. The members have built a clubhouse in log cabin style and its wide veranda is a very tempting place to rest as one finishes a game of golf. Many of the members live in Houlton, a border town twelve miles distant from here. Adjoining the golf links are the tennis courts, well patronized by the young people.

In summer a carnival is held prepared by the citizens whose love for sports is unlimited. This is followed by the Chautauqua whose musical, educational and humorous features are appreciated by the public. Not only the town becomes fascinated by these attractions but neighboring districts.

This popular town has many fine public buildings which add to it a distinguished look. The Court House, Armory, Post Office, Library, several beautiful churches, Hospital and Schools are among the attractive public buildings. The school of which we are proud and which other towns, nay, even cities envy, is the Vocational School, the gift of L. P. Fisher, thanks to whose generosity we owe our Library, Hospital and High School.

Our wonderful hospital, formerly the residence of Mr. L. P. Fisher, stands on a hill overlooking the beautiful scenery along the St. John River. It has a most efficient matron and nursing staff, and the hospital is said to be second to none in the Maritime Provinces.

Standing in front of the Court House is a fine monument erected in memory of our brave men who sacrificed their lives in the Great War.

Woodstock is strictly speaking an agricultural town situated in a rich agricultural district. Many of the farmers bring their produce to town and thus our stores have in them the finest and best dairy and garden products. It is a busy little town of about 4000 population. Among the industries are the woolen mills, woodworking factories and three lumber mills. Woodstock has a very up-to-date business section. The Canadian Pacific Railway and the Canadian National Railways have proved to be a great help in communicating with other places. Taking Woodstock as a centre, the surrounding country, rich in agricultural wealth and natural beauty.

Woodstock has become an important entrance for tourists from the American side, being so short a distance from the border. The roads leading to Woodstock from all points are good; the scenery found along these roads is unsurpassed for natural beauty; tourists are always welcomed to Woodstock, and the people are ever ready to direct and aid them.

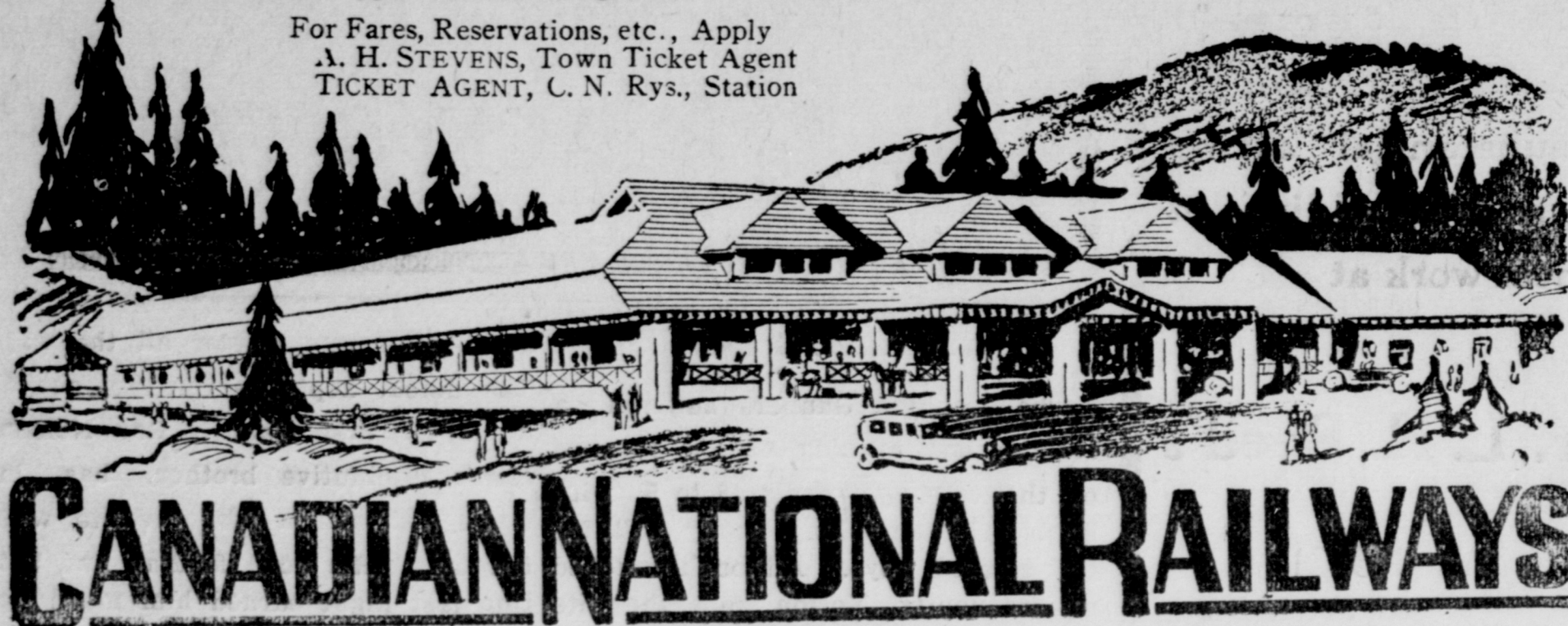
