CO-OPERATIVE SHIPPING OF HOGS AND LAMBS

Mr. J. H. King, Sheep and Swine Promoter for New Brunswick, and his assistant, Mr. Murray McKenzie, both of the Dominion Live Stock Branch, spent the past few days in the county in different communities. Their visit to this section was prompted by the many enquiries they have received during the past winter from Carleton county farmers relative to co-operative shipping of livestock, a phase of work which has attained a wonderful development in the past few years in other parts of the province, as a result of the efficient service rendered through the services of the above named officers.

In addition to organization work among the adult farmers, these officers of the Live Stock Branch are giving attention to the development of Pig Clubs among the youths of different communities. To Johnville, goes the distinction of having been the first pig club organized in Carleton County. A membership of upwards of twenty boys and girls have each already set about to secure and raise to marketable age two young pigs of bacon type. At the end of the season a Pig Club Fair will be held at Johnville where all the pigs will be shown to compete for liberal prize money put up jointly by the Federal and Provincial Departments and the local community. The result of a judging competition held among the members, together with the points received by each for their pig entries, will determine which two members will be chosen to represent their club at the different competitions to be arranged for Pig Club workers at the Winter Fair, Amherst, next fall. Organization of the Pembroke Boys' and Girls' Swine Club followed closely the establishment of the Johnville Club. Pembroke has a goodly membership and enthusiasm prevails among the young people who have undertaken to pursue the work outlined.

Keen interest is being displayed at up-river points in the co-operative shipping of lambs and hogs, and the organization of several shipments is looked for. From what can be learned of the attitude of the farmers of the Woodstock and surrounding district towards the matter of co-operative shipping, it is, to say the least, indifferent. It is to be regretted, yet very evidently true, that there are in the country, just as we have in our own town, too many who are content to sit back and resign themselves to the condition of things as they find them; too many who constitute a drag on their fellows instead of a power in united forward effort; too many who repeatedly, resignedly sigh that "something's got to be done," but who are unwilling to participate in the doing of any work or exercising of any effort to endeavor to correct the condition in question. We may send delegation after delegation to Ottawa to impress upon those in power that there do exist in the Maritimes certain problems, but if we, in town, fail to make an effort to help ourselves there is little hope that much improvement will ever be wrought. We must throw off the mistrust for one another, set aside this reluctance to accept as good policy that which has proven fruitful and profitable to other parts of the country, similarly situated and similar in conditions, and grasp every opportunity to better ourselves and those around us. The Sentinel does not profess to pose as an agricultural paper, but we recognize, as all must sooner or later, that a section such as ours, so rich in soil and enjoying climatic and other conditions favorable to a diversified system of farming, should be almost entirely dependent on a one crop policy. There need not be a radical change from the one system to the other. This would undoubtedly prove disastrous. Much money has been invested in potato machinery and storage houses. Too much to warrant discontinuing their use, but not so much but what a reduction in acreage planted could be brought about with a correspondingly greater interest shown to livestock production in general. already exists an efficient marketing machinery which is available to the farmers for the purpose of handling, co-operatively, shipments of practically every form of livestock. To be engaged in the growing of a crop good returns from which are dependent upon a poor or failure crop in other sections of the continent, especially when it constitutes a crop that is more or less generally grown, is, after all, a mighty uncertain business. That there should be provided a service through which the organization of co-operative shipping livestock clubs can be formed is indeed as it ought to be in a country noted for its progressive agricultural policies. A community's measurement of progressiveness will soon be judged in outside parts by the degree to which it associates itself with promotional programs such as those above mentioned. Just where do we fit in this section?
