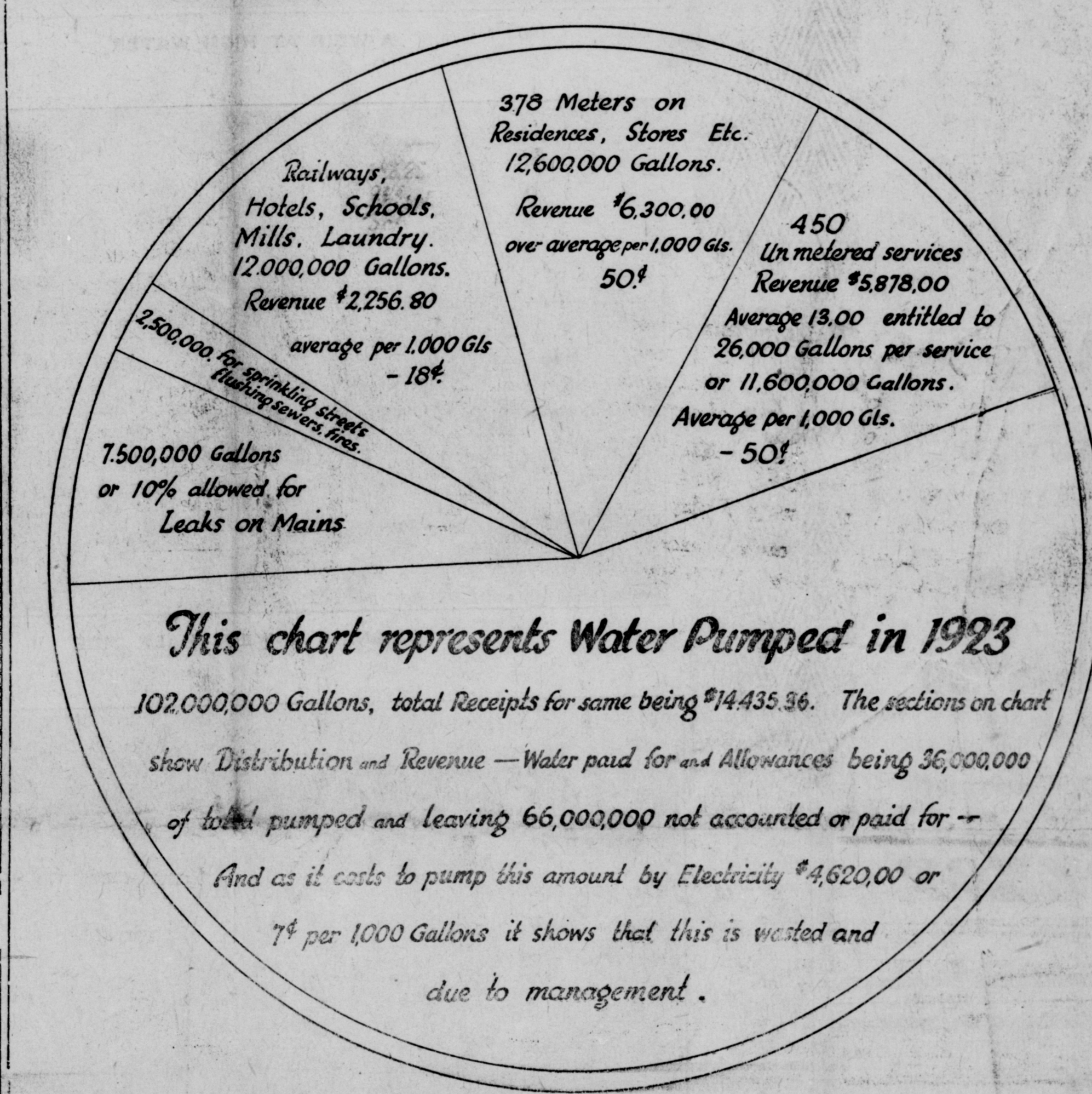

Chart Presented at Last Public Meeting of Special
Interest--Time for Explanation.



MEETING OF AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY NO. 41

There was a very well attended
meeting of the Agricultural Society
in the Town Council Chambers on
Tuesday evening, January 6th, the
President, Col. F. H. J. Diblee pre-
siding.

Routine business being dispensed
with, the meeting gave its attention
to matters incident to representa-
tion of this association at the Annu-
al Convention of the Farmers' and
Dairymen's Association, to be held
at Sussex, January 13th, 14th and
15th. Mr. Henry Hay, Richmond Cor-
ner, and Mr. A. E. Raymond, River
Road, were the delegates appointed
to represent the local organization.
As Mr. C. H. Gray, Jacksonville, is
Vice-President of the F. & D. A., and
therefore a delegate by virtue of his
office, the local society will this year
have three votes at the annual con-
vention in Sussex. The Secretary
pointed out that Mr. Gray was in line
for the presidency of the provincial
association for the ensuing year, and
suggested that it might be appropri-
ate if next year's convention could
be held at Woodstock. The speaker
said that as Director of the Vocational
School, he would be pleased to ad-
dress a letter to the association in
convention inviting them to meet at
the Vocational School next year. A
motion was duly passed authorizing
the secretary to invite the Farmers'
and Dairymen's Association to con-
vene here next year.

The Prize List Committee for the
1925 Exhibition was appointed and
is composed of the following: R. W.
Maxwell, W. G. Kearney, C. H. Gray,
H. W. Rogers, H. M. DeWitt, Earle
Avery, L. R. McElhinney, Wm. Hay-
ward, Sam Keyes, Wm. McDougall,
Frank C. Brown, Mrs. Chas. Comben,
Mrs. R. E. Holyoke and Mrs. W. S.
Sutton.

Other committees appointed were
the Grounds, and Light, and the At-
tractions, the former being com-
posed of Mr. Joseph Fewer, Mr. Ralph
Hayden and Mr. John Lenehan, while
Messrs. Robert Strain and C. M.
Aughterton constitute the latter.

The following representative dele-
gation of farmer members of the so-
ciety was appointed to wait upon the
County Council and solicit a grant
for the 1925 Exhibition: C. H. Gray,
Nathan Phillips, Walter Payne, Wm.
Hay, H. W. Rogers, Wm. Kearney,
Sterling Peabody, Heber Sharpe.

The Exhibition this year, accord-
ing to a resolution passed at the
meeting, will be held for four days,
beginning on the Tuesday of the
week following the week of Presque
Isle Fair.

The water situation was very effec-
tively dealt with at the last public
meeting by ex-Mayor Munro and
there being no change in the atti-
tude of the council the matter will
be of special interest at this time.
The excellent chart, drawn by Mr.
Munro, tells a story of waste that
can hardly be credited, and which,
with other expense, accounts for a
75% increase in water rates. In the
course of his remarks Mr. Munro
said:
"Town affairs are receiving some
attention, at the present time, due
very likely, to the Council increasing
water rates SEVENTY FIVE PER
CENT, for at least the term May 1st
to Nov. 1st next.
In my opinion, I feel that if the
Ratepayers make no protest against
this increase, they will find, that it
has come to stay for a long period.
For some unexplained reason, the
Council make up the Water Budget,
and not satisfied with the way Man-
ager Armstrong had made up pre-
vious Budgets, they have amongst
other charges increased the Interest
charge from 1922, from \$4,500.00,
with an additional amount set aside
for sinking fund 1,000.00 and have in
1924 charged up Interest alone at
\$8,600.00, and then not satisfied with
this move, they have also cut down
the receipts from hydrant rentals well
as a supply for all domestic and
sanitary purposes. Has this not all
this makes an adverse showing of
\$7,650.00. THE PRESENT RATES
WITHOUT ANY INCREASE ARE
VERY MUCH HIGHER, THAN IN
ANY OTHER TOWN OR CITY IN
THIS PROVINCE, AND WILL CER-
TAINLY TEND TO INCREASE THE
COST OF THE LIVING HERE, AND
RAISE RENTS AS WELL AS WA-
TER. Any comparison but with Fre-
dericton seems to annoy the Chair-
man of the Water Committee, well,
we will take Fredericton, and I
would ask the Chairman of the Wa-
ter Committee, to go over the Fre-
dericton Report for 1923 and see that
while they have Water Bond interest
to the amount of \$40,295.00 yearly,
yet they do not charge up any inter-
est to the Water Department ac-
count; yet every dept. that gets wa-
ter or coal pays the water dept. as
shown in the Credits.
Why should Woodstock water ta-
kers have to pay in rates, so that the
streets, sewers and other depart-
ments have all the water they want
and not pay anything for it. Is this
the idea that is now moving this
Council?
If it is, surely it is time for a
show down, and a fight to the finish.
When the Water System was first
installed here, one great argument
was better security from fires, as
