COUNCIL MEETING FRIDAY EVENING

Council met at 8 p. m., on Friday evening, Aug. 7. Present Mayor Belyea and Ald. Dibblee, Montgomery, True, Jones, Creighton and Estey.

Messrs W. S. Sutton and J. N. W. Winslow were heard before the board requesting that a fixed valuation be placed upon the Carlisle Hotel for a period of ten years.

Mr. Sutton said that it was well known that a number of local men had taken over the Carlisle Hotel. In improving and refurbishing the hotel the directors would spend some \$20,000. All the contracts were let locally whenever possible. The principal idea the directors had in making the purchase was the pride the directors had in the town which so badly needed a first class hotel. It will be conducted solely as a hotel and for good of town. The request was a reasonable one, merely to fix a valuation for a term of years. The manager, Dudley Day, was well and favorably known all along the Saint John river.

J. N. W. Winslow said that the town needed a good hotel, and, in having one, it will probably gain more than the stockholders of the Carlisle. The citizens know that no improvement had been made in the hotel property for years. It was only a reasonable request to ask for a fixed valuation for a number of years. This will not be establishing a precedent as the Council has already given that privilege to the Capitol Theatre.

Mayor Belyea told the delegation that the Council would consider the matter and give its decision at the next regular monthly meeting.

In reply to a resolution of thanks passed at a previous meeting, Mr. Rutledge read the following letter from Engineer S. R. Weston:—

Dear Mr. Rutledge:—
I thank you for your kind letter of August 4th, and assure you that I am very pleased to have attempted to assist you in any way in arriving at a satisfactory solution of your power distribution problem. I hope that whatever is done will leave the Town of Woodstock in a position to take the fullest advantage of the Provincial Hydro Development which is being undertaken in the interests of the Province as a whole, and which is designed to give every municipality equal opportunity to participate in its benefits.

Manager Rutledge said that he was pleased to report that the chairman of the departments were well under the spending mark. There were \$60,000 collected on this year's taxes and \$34,000 were yet to be collected. Last year we had difficulty in getting in the taxes at the end of the year and business conditions were not much better this year. In order to get results, unless there was some objection, he intended to appoint a special collector as was done last year.

On motion of Ald. Jones, seconded by Ald. Creighton, the manager was given permission to engage a special collector.

Ald. Estey, chairman of the water committee, said that, on the instructions of the Council he and Manager Rutledge had received the following legal advice from the town solicitor: As to the right of the trustees of the Fisher Estate to vote that estate on the question of purchasing the plant of the Woodstock Power Company, the solicitor said the trustees had the right to do so; as to the right of the Town Council to take another vote of the ratepayers on the same question, the solicitor said it was not proper or right to hold another vote on the same question, it must be a new proposition entirely—something new for the people to vote on.

Ald. Creighton said that in the vote just taken, the popular vote was in favor of the town buying the plant and he was sure that the majority of the people were in favor of another vote, particularly when the votes of two men defeated the proposition.

Ald. True—These two men referred to had a perfect right to vote. They had as good if not a better right to vote than the men of the Power Company who did vote although they were endeavoring to sell the town something. The proposition to buy the Power plant has been turned down. It seems to me we should not take it up again, unless we had a signed petition asking for another vote.

Ald. Dibblee—The fact that there was no notice until a few days before the vote as to how estates should vote, and the doubt as to whether one could vote while his taxes were unpaid—these two things alone should influence the town in taking another vote.

Ald. Estey said that he had a talk



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with Mr. Leighton, secretary of the Power Company, and the suggestion was made that both parties meet in a round-the-table talk, when good feeling would prevail, and the whole subject again discussed.

Ald. Jones was in favor of the Council and the Power Company getting together. The plebiscite has given us no authority to buy the plant. We can get together and have a frank talk. A small committee would be better than the whole Council to obtain results.

Moved by Ald. Creighton, seconded by Ald. Dibblee, that the manager and the chairman of the water committee arrange a date to meet with the directors of the Power Company and the whole Council, or otherwise, as they think best. Carried.

The Council then adjourned.

Maritime Golf Association

The meeting of the Maritime Golf Association held in Fredericton last week was one of the best that has taken place in the last five years. Many prominent young players from all sections of the Maritime Provinces took part, and with one or two exceptions all qualified in the first division.

The Maritimes will never make progress in the game until the different clubs make an effort to interest the young men and start them out under the care of a professional. The weather was hot and oppressive, and was very much felt by the older players. The course was in good condition, but the greens were fast and tricky and required a steady hand and good judgment. Notwithstanding this fact, many good scores were turned in.

Out of nine members of the Woodstock Club who took part in the matches, three of them were successful in winning in their divisions. Phillip Marsten won the First Consolation prize, Willard Hayden the Third Consolation and Cecil Stewart the Desolation prize. George Mitchell won the handsome trophy donated by Steward McCawley, by default, and now has permanent possession of it.

The prizes were presented by the President, Mr. George A. Taylor, and among them was a handsome loving cup to Mr. Ralph Robertson, of the Riverside Club, who acted as starter and gave general satisfaction.

Gerald and Frank Melke played in the finals for the championship, which was won by the latter. These boys have attended all the meets in the past five years. They are splendid golfers and more than that—good sports.

SIR HENRY THORNTON OPTIMISTIC ABOUT FUTURE OUTLOOK FOR C. N. R.

Vernon, B. C., Aug. 7.—Sir Henry W. Thornton, chairman and President of the Canadian National Railways, together with two of his directors and regional and divisional officials is today inspecting the new Kamloops Kelowna branch line and the territory which it will serve. The presidents party arrived here this forenoon and left immediately for Kelowna where they are being entertained at luncheon. The journey to Kelowna and return is being made by automobile, the party having come to Vernon this morning by special train over the newly completed line from Kamloops to here. Last night at Kamloops Sir Henry, Major Graham A. Bell and J. Gill Gardner, directors, were guests at a dinner tendered by Kamloops citizens to Hon. Dr. Sutherland, Minister of Public Works for British Columbia.

Optimistic Outlook

In the course of a brief address to the Canadian National President dealt with the financial situation of his Company and spoke with optimism of the outlook for the balance of the present year. Though gross receipts had been reduced by \$9,000,000 during the first six months of 1925 as compared with the similar period of 1924 there had been a corresponding decrease of operating expenses amounting to \$10,000,000 so that the net earnings show a betterment of more than a million dollars. The last few days of July had shown the first increases and present crop prospects throughout Western Canada indicated that business for the balance of the year would be very heavy.

New Branch Line

Referring to the new Kamloops Kelowna branch line now nearing completion Sir Henry informed his audience that the Canadian National was going into the Okanagan Valley with the intention of securing every pound of freight and every passenger possible and of giving to the people of the area served the very best that could be given in the way of railway service. Touching upon the financial situation he stated that while the first three years had been occupied with a multitude of problems requiring solution a thorough financial survey was now being made which would determine what recommendations should be made to the government in regard to more complete financial amalgamation of the constituent companies of the Canadian National system and what if any action should be taken toward writing off capitalization.

NO AMALGAMATION OF GREAT RAILWAYS

Ottawa, Aug. 7.—Hon. G. P. Graham, Minister of Railways, today emphatically denied that proposals for amalgamation of the Canadian National and the Canadian Pacific were under consideration. "What is being done," said Mr. Graham, "is in line with my statement to Parliament when the railway estimates were brought down. I then said that I was going to ask the two railways to get together as much as possible and try to come to some arrangement of co-operation that would include not only passenger traffic, but an exchange of freight on an equality basis that would prevent duplication. To that end, and with a view to reducing expenditure, we are endeavoring to secure co-operation of the two lines.

"What will be the outcome of these proposals no one knows yet. But no scheme of amalgamating the systems has been considered."

Mr. Graham left for Brockville this morning.

SHOWERS IN SASKATCHEWAN OF GREAT BENEFIT FIT TO GRAIN CROP

Regina, Aug. 7.—Coming in time to give the grain crops a greater opportunity to fill out before the harvest begins and brightening prospects for a yield higher than the average, heavy local showers, accompanied by thunder and lightning fell at many southern Saskatchewan points yesterday.

The showers fell between Moose Jaw, on the west, and Carlyle, on the east, and from points ten miles north of Regina to a few miles along the international boundary.

The storm lasted from 10 to 45 minutes. Experts were of the opinion that where rain fell, while not heavy in volume, it would increase the yield per acre.
