ANSWER TO LETTER OF J. C. MANZER

Perth, N. B., July 8, 1925.
To the Editor of the Sentinel:

Dear Sir:

We have noted with much interest the letter from J. C. Manzer, Havana, in your issue of June 25th. Mr. Manzer paints a very rosy picture of things as they might have been, and if Mr. Manzer's assumptions are correct, then the shippers of New Brunswick potatoes are guilty of gross mismanagement to squander such a large portion of the farmers' money to inefficient selling in Havana. We have examined this letter carefully and while we would like to be charitable and not question the good faith of Mr. Manzer we find that in the face of such a series of glaring mis-statements, that we can come to no other conclusion but that Mr. Manzer is deliberately trying to mislead the public and cast reflections on the business methods of a large number of reputable merchants in the Province of New Brunswick.

He says there was no over production. How a man who ever pretends to be a potato dealer can make such a statement in face of the largest crop ever produced in the north eastern section of the North American continent, is beyond our knowledge. Mr. Manzer states that there was just enough potatoes in the Maritime Provinces to supply the Cuban market. Nothing could be farther from the truth. Thousands of cars were shipped to the provinces of Ontario and Quebec, the prairie provinces and to Great Britain, and on account of the very deplorable condition of all markets it was necessary to grade the potatoes very carefully and as a result, we believe that fully 25% of the crop in the Maritime Provinces was graded out and became a total loss.

There is a great deal to be said in favor of Mr. Manzer's proposed plan of controlled shipments to Cuba, but this is not a new departure and the idea did not originate with Mr. Manzer. Our firm was the earliest advocate of this method of marketing New Brunswick potatoes in Havana, and on account of our activities in this connection we, together with Messrs Hatfield and Gallagher, have been accused of contravention of the Anti Combing Act, and we have it from very reliable authority that the investigation of our firm and associates was instigated by Mr. J. C. Manzer of Havana, and has resulted in the publication of the most outrageous charges against the business integrity of some of the most reputable citizens of New Brunswick ever issued by a government department. Mr. Manzer has taken particular pains to prevent his name from being actively connected with this investigation, but we believe it was through misleading information furnished by him, that the charge was laid against us.

Mr. Manzer represents that the price of potatoes was forty or fifty cents per barrel in the fall. This is not correct. We find that our average price in New Brunswick since the beginning of the season in September last, has been approximately 75c per barrel.

We dislike exceedingly to be continually before the public in the newspapers of the province, as we have always considered our business as a private one, but in cases of this kind, when such glaring mis-statements are made, we cannot in justice to ourselves let them pass without corrections.

PLANETS WILL BE SPEC-TACLE FOR WATCHERS

Washington, July 4.—Shortly after sunset during July the five brightest planets—Mercury, Venus, Mars, Jupiter and Saturn—all will be above the horizon at the same time for the greater part of the month.

On the evening of July 10, says a bulletin from the American Nature Association, Mercury, Venus and Mars will appear so near together that they might almost be mistaken for a triple star, although in fact Mercury will be about 105,000,000 miles from the earth, Venus 146,000,000 miles and Mars 239,000,000 miles.

Mars is increasing its distance from the earth and drawing in toward the sun so it will be increasingly difficult to find it in the twilight. Mercury and Venus now are approaching the earth.

Mercury will reach its greatest eastern elongation on July 28 when it will be more than 27 degrees east of the sun. This, the American Nature Association points out, is within one degree of its greatest possible distance from the sun and great enough to enable it to be picked up easily in the twilight after sunset.

Anyone watching these three planets this month with the aid of a small telescope or field glasses might imagine they were playing tag or running a race in the northwestern sky after sunset. All three will move eastward during July from Cancer to Leo, but all will be moving at different speeds with respect to each other and the earth. Mars, the slow moving one of the trio, will be at the beginning of the month farther east and higher in the western sky than the other two, but the other two planets will pass it on July 10. Saturn, which has been above the horizon in the evening hours for some time, has been moving slowly westward, but on July 12 it becomes stationary, as viewed from the earth, and then begins to swing slowly backward toward Libra to the east. Jupiter, now rising over in the southeast in Sagittarius, will be in opposition to the sun, or on the meridian due south, at midnight on July 10. It will then rise at sunset and be in view all night. On this date Mercury, Venus and Mars will be about an hour and a half after the sun.
