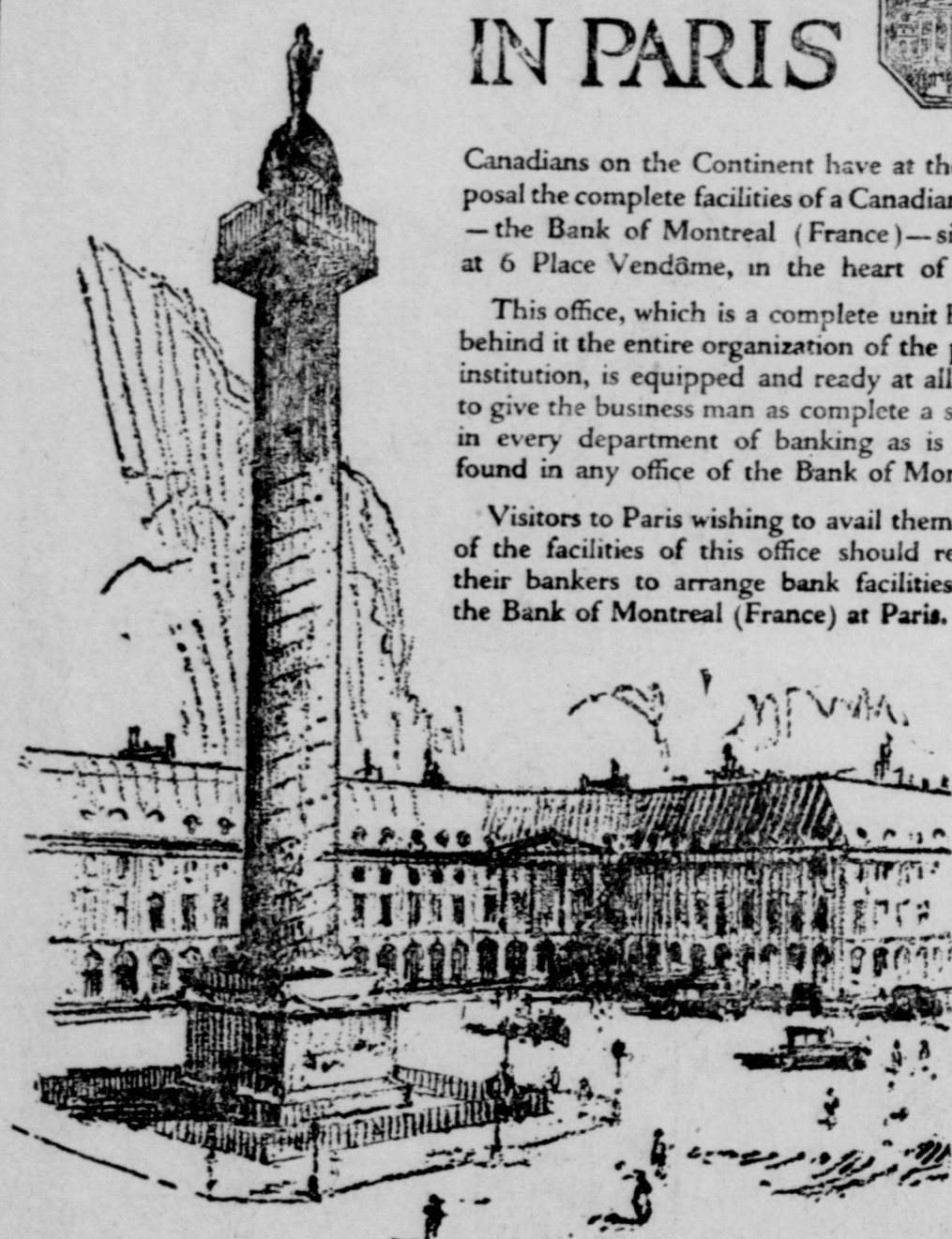

Mr. Wm. Jameson who has been employed here for a few days, has returned home.

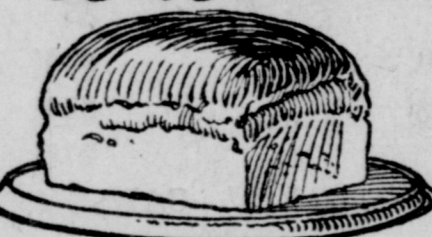
Miss Alice Rogers has returned from Woodstock.

YearsTHE NEW BRUNSWICK
EGG LAYING CONTEST
Week Ending July 10th, 1925

The 230 hens in the New Brunswick Egg Laying Contest which is carried on at the Experimental Station, Fredericton, laid 926 eggs during the week which brings the total to date since November 1st up to 26,437. The pen of Barred Rocks owned by George Manchester, Fredericton, led in production for the week with a total of 55 eggs. The pen of Barred Rocks owned by C. M. Peart, Lewisville, was in second position with 52 eggs. The pen owned by A. T. Reed, Rollingsdam, still continues to lead in production with a total to date of 1565 eggs.

Second position is occupied by the pen of Barred Rocks owned by A. S. C. Steven, Hoyt, with a total production of 1503 eggs. Two hens have passed the 200 mark; these are owned by W. E. B. Tait, and A. S. C. Steven, with records of 201 eggs. The hen owned by Mrs. George Danby, North Devon, is in second position with 190 eggs.

Out door yards have been built for the contest pens. The hens are gradually being accustomed to these by being turned out first for an hour and gradually increasing the period as the hens become accustomed to the yard conditions.

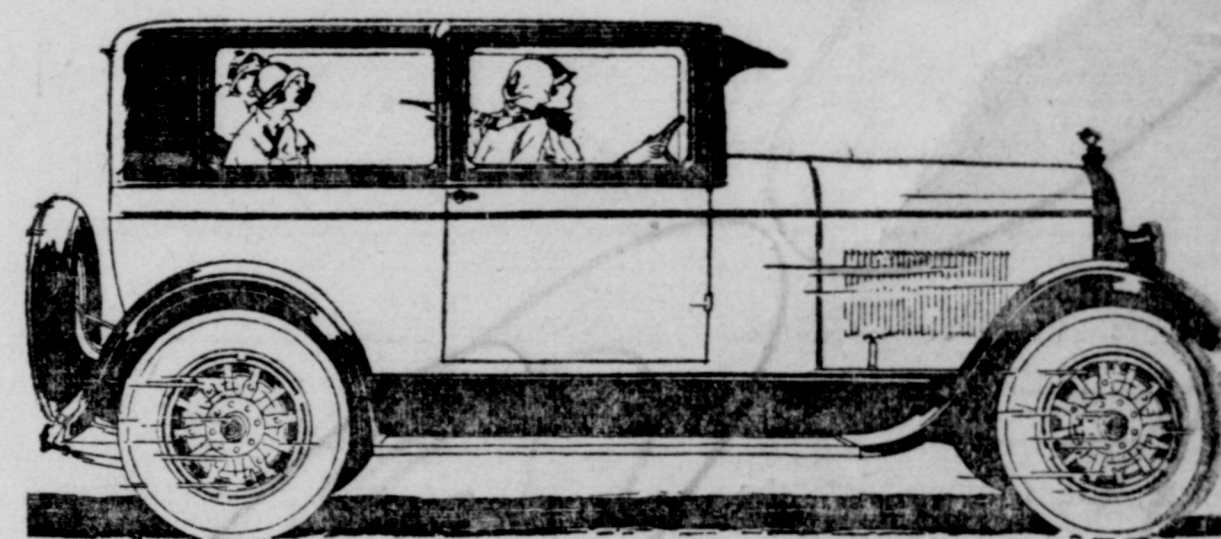
