Better Train Service

(Gleaner, Tuesday)

Representatives of the Woodstock Board of Trade and other points served by the Valley Railway between Centreville and Woodstock, together with the directors of the Valley Railway, are conferring here today with W. U. Appleton, general manager of the C. N. R., Moncton, with respect to service improvements over the Valley from Centreville to Fredericton and St. John. Representatives of the Fredericton Board of Trade are also attending the conference here. His Worship Mayor Phillips, chairman of the Transportation Committee, besides the Fredericton delegation.

The chief matter under consideration is that of the daily passenger service between Centreville, Woodstock and Fredericton. Complaints have been made with respect to the early hour of departure of the train which leaves Centreville for St. John at 5:20 a. m., daily except Sunday, and the late hour of arrival at 11:55 p. m., daily except Sunday, at Centreville. This train reaches Woodstock under the present schedule at 6:32 a. m. and returns at 10:45 p. m.

An attempt is being made to secure a more satisfactory service without the disruption of the present service on the connecting lines, and this matter is being considered today with Mr. Appleton, W. P. Jones, K. C. of Woodstock, Robert Bayley, Deputy Provincial Secretary-Treasurer, and B. M. Hill, the directors of the Valley Railway, are attending the conference. Members of the delegation arriving from Woodstock include J. D. Winslow and J. S. Leighton, of Woodstock, R. L. Colwell, of Lakeville, H. H. Hatfield, of Hartland, C. F. Gallagher, of Bath, and W. F. Anderson, of Lakeville.

Splitting of the present daily passenger service on the Valley Railway from Centreville to St. John into a tri-weekly through service, as at present, with the substitution of a suburban service, Centreville to Fredericton, on the three remaining days, was suggested.

The chief complaint filed by the Carleton county delegation was that of the early hour of departure and the late hour of arrival of the present train on the through daily service to St. John. Splitting the service as outlined would permit the later departure of and earlier arrival of the Centreville-Fredericton train three days a week. The suggestions were taken into consideration, and it is expected that some plan will be worked out on this basis which was agreeable to the Fredericton Board of Trade representatives present.
