NOVA SCOTIA COMES FIRST WITH MANY ENTERPRISES

Nova Scotia calls itself a province of first things.

The first Roman Catholic Church in Canada was built at Annapolis (the ancient Port Royal) in 1608, antedating the first one in Quebec Notre Dame de la Victoire by seven years. Some time after the surrender of Port Royal to a New England force in 1710 the church was converted into an Anglican Church and here the first Anglican service in Canada was held.

The first Protestant Church in Canada was St Paul's (Anglican) Halifax, built in 1749.

The second Protestant Church in Canada was built in Halifax, Matthews Church, commenced in 1751. In 1815 it became St Matthew's Church the property of the Presbyterian body.

The first Colonial See was that of Halifax, created in 1787.

The first Methodist Church in Canada was built at Point de Bute, N. B., in 1790, followed two years later by the first Methodist Church in Halifax.

The first Presbyterian Church in Canada was established in Ouslow, Colchester County in 1764.

The first ordination in Canada of a Protestant minister took place in Halifax in 1760.

The first Sunday School opened in Canada was in 1785, in connection with St Paul's Church Halifax.

Apples grown in Nova Scotia in 1633, believed to be the first in Canada.

The first dockyard in Canada was established in Halifax in 1758.

The first university in Canada was King's College, established at Windsor in 1788.

The first undenominational public school in Canada was established at Halifax in 1748.

Nova Scotia was the first part of America to instal wireless telegraphy at Glace Bay 1903.

The first newspaper in Canada was printed in Halifax in 1751—the Halifax Gazette.

The first province to adopt the system of dividing the provinces into counties was Nova Scotia when in 1759 Nova Scotia was divided into 4 counties—Halifax, Lunenburg, Annapolis and Kings.

The first representative assembly in Canada met in Halifax in 1758.

The first road in Canada was that made by Champlain from Digby Gut to Port Royal soon after 1604.

The first distillery in Canada was established in Halifax in 1750.

The first public gardens in Canada were made at Halifax in 1753.

The mining of Coal in Nova Scotia antedated any such industry in any part of America. Coal was shipped from Cape Breton to France in 1743.

Mrs. David Simpson

Mrs. Mary A. Crawford-Simpson died May 4th, at the home of her daughter, Madison, Maine, after a few days illness of pneumonia, aged 87 years.

She is survived by one daughter, Mrs. George Curtis, Madison, Me., and four sons, Isaac Simpson, Amity, Me.; David James Simpson, Island Falls, Me.; and John Simpson, Camden, Me.; four brothers, James Crawford, Elmwood; George Crawford and John W. Crawford, Kirkland; William Crawford, Los Angeles, Cal. She was the eldest daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Crawford, Kirkland, who came from the old country eighty-five years ago. She spent her girlhood days among the first settlers of the country, in the history of the people many instances are related of the noble part she took among them in times when diseases came in their families and no nurses—medical aid slow to reach them owing to conditions of the country in those early days.

After her marriage she lived in Amity 60 years, Mr. Simpson died four years ago, since then she has lived in Haverhill, Mass., and Madison, Me.

Funeral services were conducted at her late home Amity by Rev. Dalbeck. He spoke of the wonderful mother's love she had lived out during her long life not only to her own household but to all others. To live for others was the motto of her life. Funeral was conducted by Mr. Lisbet. Four of her grandsons were pall bearers. Interment was made at the Rural cemetery, Haverhill, on the Simpson estate, Amity, Me.



Here and There

During 1924 the 1,800 bee-keepers of Manitoba marketed 1,302,000 pounds of honey, valued at \$195,000, according to official returns by the Provincial Apiarist.

Prof. J. A. Allen, Provincial Geologist of Alberta, declares in an official statement that sixty-two billion tons of coal, half of which is recoverable, lie beneath the surface of Alberta soil.

Seymour Backus, Vice-President of the Backus-Brooks Company, of Winnipeg, states that the largest producing pulp mill in the world will be in operation at Kenora, Ont., before the end of 1925.

It is estimated that Vancouver will ship approximately 25,000,000 bushels of grain of the 1924 crop. Shipments already total 21,188,000 bushels. Commitments for almost 1,000,000 additional bushels have been made.

The special train operated by the Canadian Pacific Railway and known as The Trans-Canada Limited, which makes the journey across the entire country in eighty-eight hours, recently commenced its season, the seventh since its inception.

According to a bulletin issued by the Bureau of Statistics Alberta's foreign population is in excess of 180,000 with approximately 100,000 American included in the total. About 5,000 Americans reside in Calgary.

When Their Majesties King George and Queen Mary paid their official visit to the British Empire Exhibition at Wembley shortly after the reopening, they boarded the miniature Canadian Pacific train and made a trip around "Treasure Island" and expressed great interest in all they saw.

An effort will be made this year to transplant Swiss mountain roses in the Canadian Rockies. These roses, which were brought from Switzerland by Dr. Huebscher, late Swiss Consul at Montreal, are extremely hardy and only thrive above elevations of 3,000 feet. They will be planted in the gardens at Lake Louise and Banff.

The first trip of the Canadian Pacific S.S. Princess Kathleen from Vancouver to Seattle via Victoria was recently made under most successful conditions. The people of Seattle are so enthusiastic over the increased coastwise service that they have tendered an address of thanks to Captain Troup, manager of the Canadian Pacific Coastal service.

There is every possibility that the Provincial Government of British Columbia may this year complete the construction of the scenic highway connecting Golden on the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway with the summer resorts of Banff and Lake Louise. When this link, much of which was built during the past two seasons, is completed it will make one magnificent triangle through the heart of the Canadian Rockies.

Building permits issued in Canada during the first quarter of 1925 were 10.2% and 1.2% greater than in the first three months of 1924 and 1923, respectively. There were also 5.5% greater than in the first quarter of 1922, 46.5% higher than in 1921 and 4.3% above the 1923 total. The aggregate value of building permits issued for the first quarter of 1925 was \$19,672,637, compared with \$17,846,969 for 1924 and \$19,441,159 for 1923.

THE GREAT TAKU GLACIER

There are many notable sights to be seen by the tourist who has the opportunity to visit Alaska, but none more impressive than the famous Taku Glacier, which lies between Wrangell and Juneau. This is one of the largest ice fields in the world, where the ice breaks off in great bergs that fall into the sea with a roar like a peal of thunder. The glacier is one mile wide and from there it extends ninety miles back into the heart of the mountains that girdle this rich and beautiful land. It is one of the few great advancing glaciers left in North America and it is a sight which impressed itself deeply upon those who are privileged to view it. That number will be greatly increased this summer by the inauguration of a steamship service by the Canadian National Railway from Vancouver and Prince Rupert as far north as Skagway, Alaska, with ports of call en route at Ketchikan, a typical Alaskan town built at the foot of the mountains; Wrangell, a city where bejewelled ladies of the Russian Court danced in rustling silks when other belles were threading the mazes of the Minnet in towns on the Atlantic Coast; Juneau, the modern and attractive capital of this northern outpost of the United States and Skagway, the portal to the famous White Horse Pass, whose name is linked forever with the great gold-rushes where men gambled their lives for the sake of hidden gold.

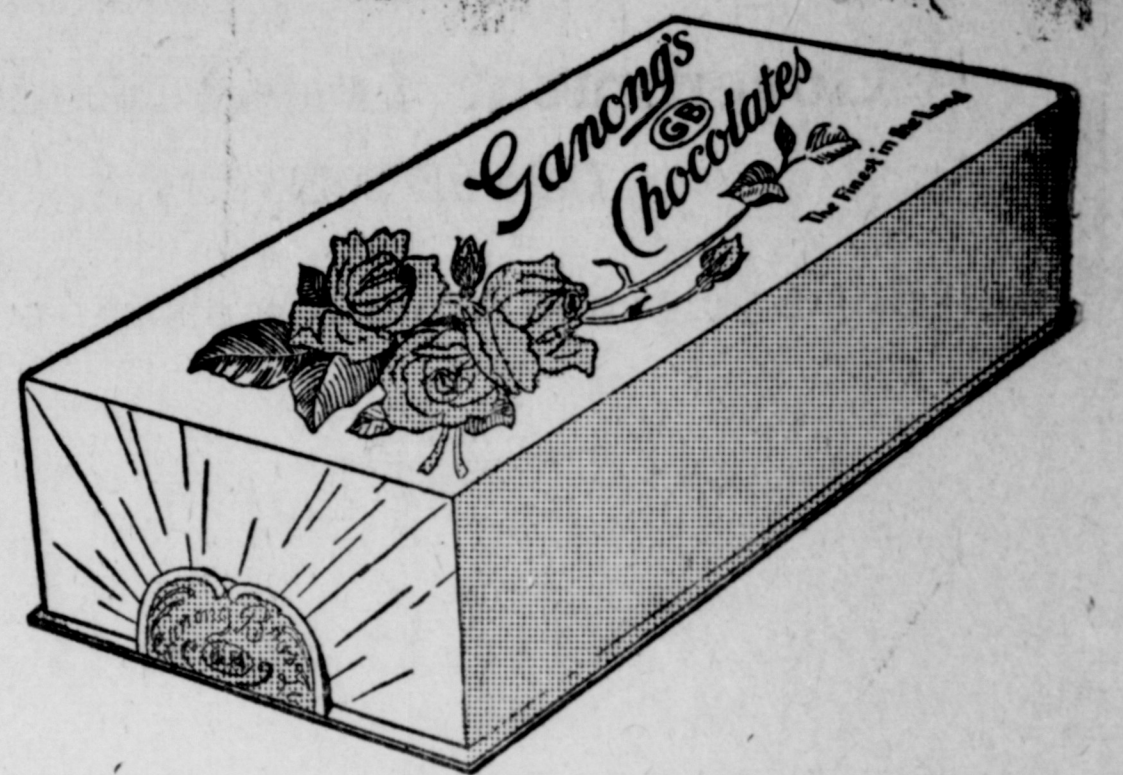
