WHAT'S COMING NEXT?

The opposition candidates in the present campaign are heavily handicapped in opposing a Government which has kept its hands clean of scandal during its entire term of office, while their own misdeeds when last in power, linger fresh in the memory. All their base insinuations have widely missed their mark, returning like curses and chickens home to roost in their midst. The cap they would place on their opponents' heads so perfectly fits their own that they must perforce wear it. It becomes them extremely well and nobody would wish to take it from them.

In their frantic efforts to bring the Government into disrepute they have employed methods, which, while meriting the severest censure, are, nevertheless, highly amusing for their effrontery and barefaced audacity. We have already referred to the laughable Mr. Potts, who boldly proclaims that the Grand Falls development will cost forty million dollars, but he is only one of many seeking by any and every perversion of the truth to snatch victory from certain defeat. The positively screamingly funny attack on the Health Department for its advocacy of the pasteurization of milk is yet another example of how a drowning man will grasp at a straw to stave off inevitable doom. As it is common knowledge that impure milk has produced higher infant mortality and weakened the physique of children more than any other cause, it can only be assumed that these aspiring gentlemen would sacrifice the public health for political power. Are we living in the 20th century or in the dark ages that such arrant ignorance can be openly displayed? Not satisfied with such blatant tomfoolery they even insinuate that the Hon. Dr. Roberts, who has written one of the brightest chapters in the history of the Province, is lining his purse with profits from the St. John City pasteurization plant. Truly they look for their own failings in others and honesty of purpose passeth their understanding. What a splendid type of men to have in the Legislature! Racial and religious prejudice, green auto plates, countless fantastically distorted facts, illicit liquor and pasteurized milk, have all been exploited to the limit. OPTOMETRIC CONVENTION

The fourth annual convention of the Optometric Association met in Charlottetown, P. E. I., last week.

The president, Mr. G. F. Hutcheson, was in the chair and there was a large number of delegates in attendance.

At the morning session, after the business meeting and the registration of delegates, an address of welcome was given by Mayor McKenna, to which the Provincial Presidents replied.

Lectures were given by Mr. Edward Bind, Secretary of the Department of Optometry, Ontario, on Tests for muscular imbalance; on Instrumentation of Optometry by Mr. Jas. H. Manning, of New York; on "Some Diseases the Optometrist Should Recognize," by Dr. H. D. Johnson and by Mr. I. S. Nott of the Scientific staff of the Consolidated Optical Company, New York. At noon the Gen-othalmic Optical Co. of New York gave an exhibit of their equipment, which includes the very latest and most scientific apparatus.

At the close of the afternoon session the delegates enjoyed a social hour and the local members of the Association served refreshments. At the business meeting the different reports showed that the finances of the Association were in good condition, and that much good was resulting from their efforts along the line of the establishment of the Canadian College of Optometry at Toronto, in the elimination of the mail order advertisement sale of spectacles, and in doing charitable work by supplying children of the poor, with proper glasses.

An interesting part of the convention were the four exhibits in the hall by the Butler and Joben Co., Montreal, Consolidated Optical Co., Toronto, the Maritime Optical Co., Halifax and the Imperial Optical Co. St. John.

ST. GERTRUDE'S PICNIC

The annual picnic of St. Gertrude's Parish was held on the Church grounds on Tuesday afternoon and evening. This picnic is one of the annual events of the town of Woodstock.

The first St. Gertrude's picnic was held by Father Connelly at Bull's Island, now the Exhibition grounds in 1857. A feature of his crude kitchen outfit was the boiling of water in wooded casks. The receipts of this picnic totalled \$226 14s 2d. The few remaining residents of Woodstock who attended that picnic still speak of the roads leading to the town crowded with vehicles of all descriptions making their way to the picnic grounds.

Times have changed and with it the slow drawn horse and wagon has been replaced by the self propelled and quicker automobile. Times though have not changed the harmonious feelings that exist. As in 1857 so in 1925 we find all denominations patronizing St. Gertrude's Picnic. Above the material benefits that may be extended to each other from time to time, the kindness and good will between all its people must ever be the most valued and jealously guarded asset of the town of Woodstock.

The ladies of St. Gertrude's have always sustained a high reputation in the standing of the supper served at the picnic. This year, it is generally conceded, they even surpassed previous efforts.

The committee of the University Senate authorized to make an appointment to the chair of French and German has selected Dr. Geo. H. R. O'Donnell for the position.

Dr. O'Donnell has a B. A. from the University of Idaho (1912), an M. A. from the University of Washington (1916) and a Ph. D. from Yale (1921). Since October, 1923, he has been abroad and for the greater part of the time a student at the University of Berlin. He has two articles in the press, Sir Theodore Martin and his Translation of Goethe's Faust, and Frederick Gertacker's Leben and Werke. He is an experienced teacher, having had three years' successful experience as instructor in the University of Oregon and having been engaged in High School teaching (New Haven High School) and tutoring during his course at Yale University.—Gleaner.

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TWELVE BRITISH JOURNALISTS COMING TO CANADA

A party of twelve British journalists, representing some of the largest and most influential newspapers of Great Britain, will visit Fredericton during the latter part of August as the guests of President E. W. Beatty, of the C. P. R.

Mayor Phillips has been advised of the tour which has been arranged for the journalists, who are expected to arrive in Canada early this month for the purpose of gaining insight into Canadian conditions. They will probably leave Montreal about August 23rd en route through the Maritime Provinces. In New Brunswick they will visit Fredericton, St. John and Moncton.

"This is no joy ride," wrote J. M. Woodman, District Superintendent of the C. P. R., St. John, asking suggestions regarding arrangements which could be made to have the visiting journalists meet with a number of the leading business men of the Capital during their stay here. It is probable that anything in the nature of extensive entertainment will be taboo.—Gleaner.

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
