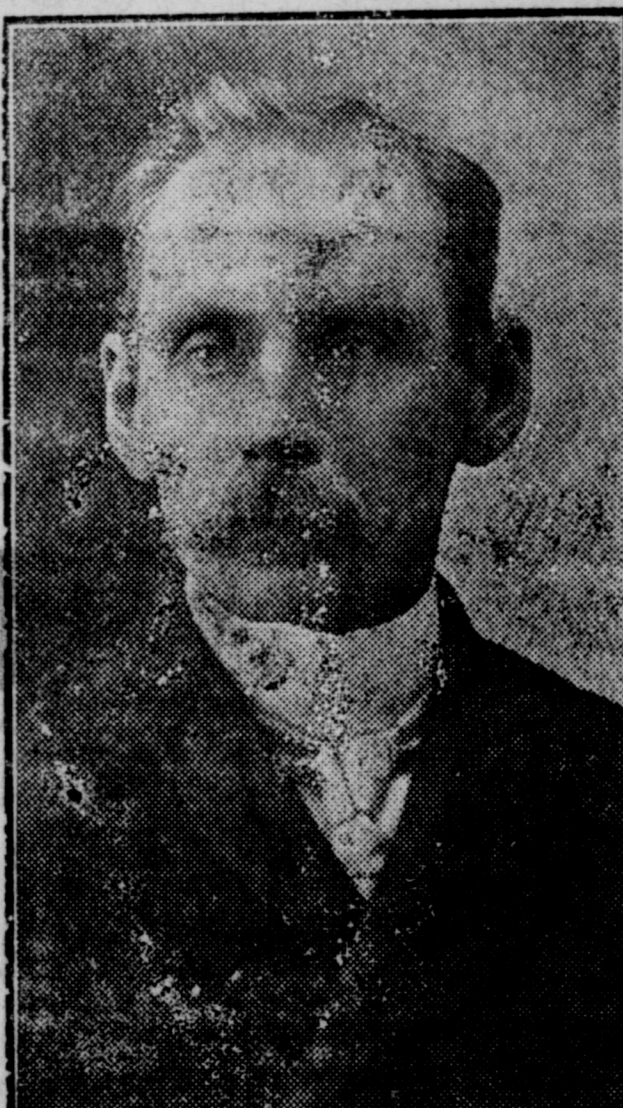

GEORGE B. TRUE WINS HANDSOMELY

Has Majority of 185 Over Opponent—Big Vote on a Gold Day
—W. B. Belyea is Mayor With
Four New Councillors.

For the next two years the destinies of the town will be in the hands of W. B. Belyea, Mayor; C. J. Jones, O. R. Estey and James T. Montgomery, councillors. Geo. B. True serves out the unexpired term of James W. Gallagher, who resigned, the other members who will serve one year are W. J. Dibblee and F. O. O'Neil, who were elected for the two years term. The Mayor and the first three councillors named were elected by acclamation. For the one year term George B. True and Joseph Folkins were the contestants. Owing to some unique features introduced, this election was full of interest and quite a large vote was polled with the result that True had 298 and Folkins 113, giving True a clear majority of 185 which was decisive enough to express the feeling of the citizens generally and a stern rebuke to the busy bodies who tried to foist their views on the electorate along lines that marked for further dissatisfaction of the citizens who were already opposed to taxes that spelled nothing but expense. LECTURE BY JOHN L. PATON

Good Attention and Much Interest—
Education a Great Social
Problem.

The lecture on Education given by Mr. John L. Paton, in the Fisher school Assembly Room, on Tuesday evening was well attended, in spite of the extremely cold weather.

Mrs. I. B. Merriman, Regent of the E. O. D. E., under whose auspices the lecture was given, presided and with her, on the platform were the first and second vice regents, Mrs. Gordon Bailey and Mrs. Godfrey Newnam and the Education Secretary, Miss Neales. Education, said the speaker, is the largest word in the dictionary. It is the developing that power in every person from within, ministering to it and nurturing it, in other words, to make the best of oneself for the best of others. Recently, Mr. Paton said he had some 4000 essays submitted for his inspection from school children, on the topic, Why I Go To School. He said the essays could be divided into four groups: the boys who went because they had to; the girls who went to learn good English, or to gain a cultural polish; the ones who went to "get on" and those who had the idea that if England didn't have good schools, Germany would defeat them and drive them from the world market. The speaker quoted many instances to show that the educated man is the man who conforms to the law of progress. Education enables one to bring out and develop the inner gifts. In conclusion, he said, Education is a great social problem, and that the natural drift of things would be downward unless combatted by activity and concentrated attention. At the conclusion of the lecture a vote of thanks was moved by Miss Neales and seconded by Mrs. Gordon Bailey, the audience endorsing it by standing.

VOCATIONAL SCHOOL GRADUATES

In Mr. E. W. Mair's address before the council in presenting the case of the Vocational School he gave some very interesting information concerning this institution. He said in part of the graduates of Vocational School:

41 young ladies of the Commercial department are employed in Woodstock.

45 hold positions in outside points with salaries up to \$40.00 per week. 17 of the Home Making department have entered Hospitals where the training they received in dietetics secured them preferred positions and entrance into the largest institution.

23 have married.

Two graduates of the Vocational School of the 1921 class, finding the local farming conditions temporarily unfavorable decided to sell part of the knowledge which they had obtained at Vocational School. They went across the line, but rather than accept an old job, as too many have recently done on crossing the border, those two young men made up their minds that they were going to find employment in some agricultural phase of work, some employment from which they would derive experience which would stand them in good stead when they returned to their farm properties in Carleton County. They carried their diplomas with them, and in their heads they carried a store of knowledge which substantiated the information borne by the certificates.

One of those young men, who made his home with Mr. Harvey Hopkins, Plymouth, is today, herdsman in charge of a 42 head herd of dairy (Continued on page five)

BANGOR PHYSICIAN IN MURDER CHARGE

Arrested for Causing Death of
Former Carleton County
Girl.

Bangor, Me., Jan. 19.—Anne Vivian Stair, brunette beauty of 20 years, whose native place is West Waterville, N. B., and who had for some time been employed as housemaid in the family of George Haskell, a merchant, in Houlton, died in the Aroostook Hospital in that town Friday night and as a result of her ante mortem statement a warrant was issued on Saturday from the office of County Attorney Weatherbee in Bangor for the arrest of Dr. Charles D. Edmunds of Bangor on the charge of murder.

Dr. Edmunds was arrested at 3.30 Saturday afternoon by Frank J. Rogan, criminal investigator for the county attorney's office, and Police Inspector Frank J. Golden, and locked up in the police station.

At 2.30 Saturday morning the same officers arrested at the Maine Central freight yards Edward D. Gilbert of Houlton, who was one of a crew of 19 men employed as caretakers of a train of 33 cars of potatoes, bound from Aroostook county points via Vanceboro to New York. Gilbert, who has not as yet been informed of the girl's death, admitted, so the prosecuting authorities say, his connection with the case, saying that on Wednesday last he accompanied Miss Stair to Bangor and to Dr. Edmunds' office, where the illegal operation is said to have been performed, after which the pair returned to Houlton. Gilbert is 23, and has a wife and one child. He is said to come of good family.

Dr. Edmunds, who maintained perfect composure when the officers came to arrest him, has made no statements so far as the newspapers can find out. He has engaged George E. Thompson as attorney. Murder not being a ballable offense, Dr. Edmunds remains in a police cell as also does Gilbert.

Miss Stair, accompanied by Gilbert returned to Houlton Wednesday afternoon. On Thursday at 10 a. m., the girl's condition became so serious that Dr. F. W. Mann was called to attend her, and at once ordered her taken to the Aroostook hospital, where, as is usual in the cases of patients who are liable to become public charges, an affidavit was prepared, reciting the circumstances of her illness, to which she made oath. The affidavit was prepared at the instance of First Selectman George W. Ervin, by Walter Cowan, attorney and notary public, and was read to Miss Stair and sworn to before those named and two nurses. In this affidavit she is said to have named Dr. Edmunds and Gilbert.

On Saturday morning, after consultation with Attorney General Fellows and County Attorney Weatherbee, Dr. H. J. Millikin, one of the medical examiners for Penobscot county, went to Houlton and there, with Dr. Frank H. Jackson, medical examiner for Aroostook county, performed an autopsy on the remains of Miss Stair, with Drs. Mann and John Potter as observers.

On Sunday the body of Miss Stair was taken home to West Waterville near Woodstock, N. B., by her mother, accompanied by the girl's fiancé, a young man of that town.

ON TRIAL BUT NOT ALLOWED TO BE PRESENT

Unusual Procedure in Relation to
Charges Against Potato Shippers
—Star Chamber Methods Roundly
Condemned.

It is said, and it seems that there is considerable truth in it, that the potato shippers are to be tried without being allowed to be present at their trial or to be represented by counsel. It is understood that Mr. Herford, the investigator, has intimated his intention to examine any witness alone excluding everybody except the Commissioner and his counsel, Mr. P. J. Hughes, K. C. and that this examination will take place at any place or at any time without notice to any of the parties whose conduct has been brought into question. It is understood that the investigator was willing to have Mr. T. W. Caldwell, M. P., present when the witnesses were to be examined as he was the man who had been named by the complainants to represent them but that he would not allow Mr. Caldwell to be present if the shippers objected.

It is also understood that Mr. Herford after examining any witnesses that he chooses to call in that way privately intends to take a run up to Hartland, Bath and Perth and go into the offices of Hatfield & Co., Ltd., C. E. Gallagher and Co., and Guy G. Porter Co. Ltd., and obtain any information that there may be there in the way of correspondence or contracts or books, etc. After that he may call some of the gentlemen representing these various firms separately to give evidence before him and that he and his counsel may cross examine them privately.

The intention seems to be to prevent any of this information being given to the public.

Mr. H. H. Hatfield, one of the shippers in question, expressed himself very strongly against any such Star Chamber methods of investigation into any question where charges had been made against any person without allowing the person against whom the charges were
