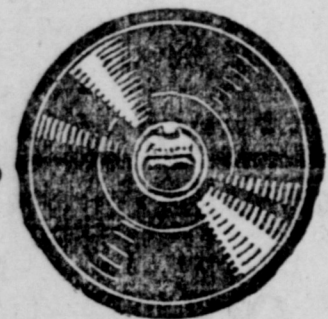

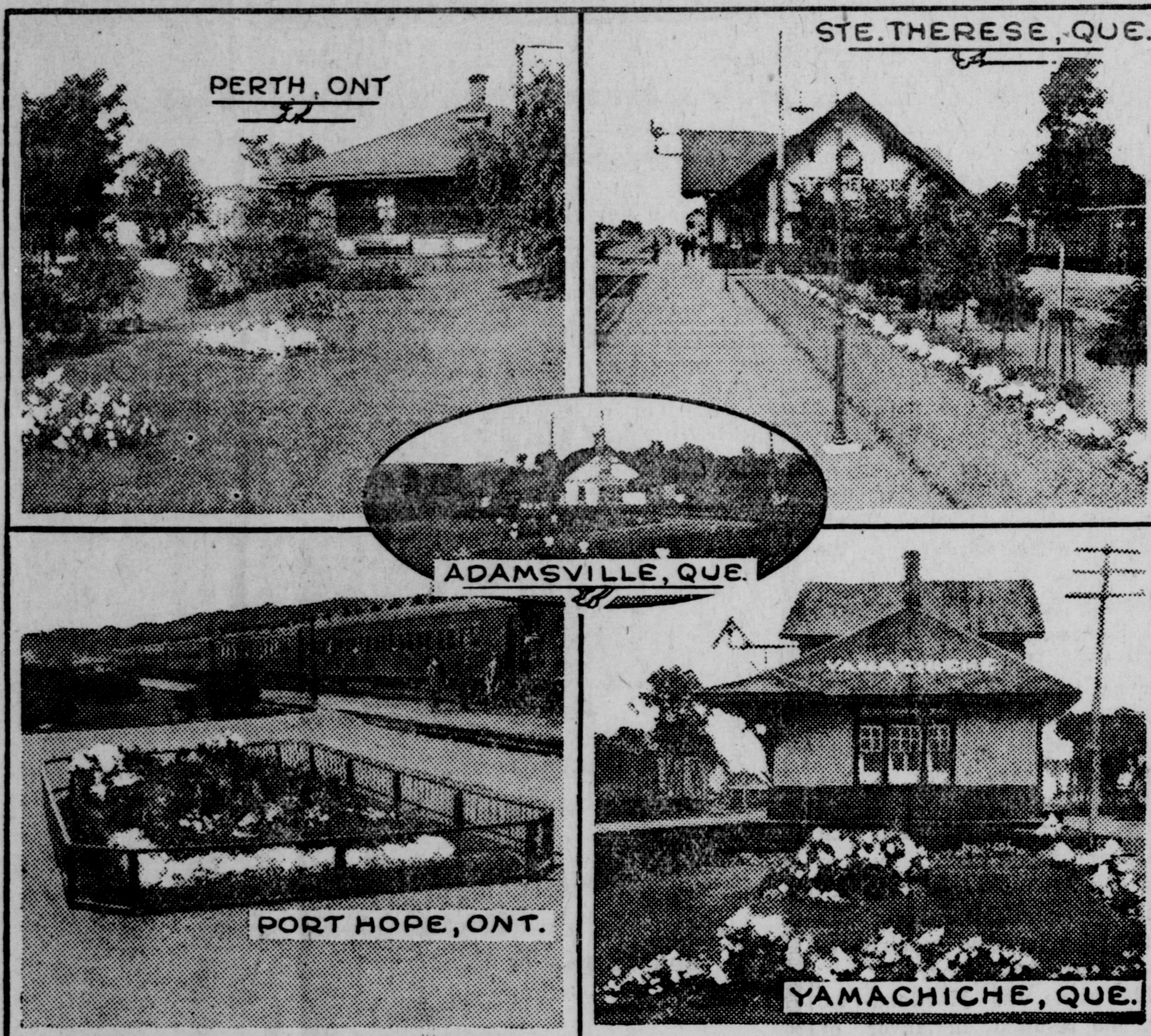

BEAUTIFYING A RAILROAD SYSTEM



Strangers, travelling upon the railways in Canada find pleasure in passing through a country that is new and fresh and possessing a wild, primitive grandeur practically untarnished. But in no small degree this pleasure is heightened and contributed to by a wonderful transformation wrought artificially by the lavish use of trees and flowers which have been planted and cultivated under the supervision of expert horticulturists employed for the purpose by the railway company.

The most striking example of what can be effected by this means is to be seen along the Canadian Pacific tracks through the Prairie Provinces, according to an article on the subject in the April "Landscape Architecture" by E. L. Chicanot.

"Along the more than three thousand miles of main line," writes Mr. Chicanot, "there were naturally a good many men, station agents, section foremen and others who were garden lovers and who, with the limited means at their command and to the best of their ability, cultivated little pieces of ground about the scenes of their activities. The planting of a little garden at a station, especially in certain bleak, treeless areas, was a conspicuous feature and added some little beauty to the surroundings. This gave to a higher official of the company, about thirty-five years ago, the idea of expanding the work of beautifying the grounds by assisting and encouraging

agents and others in work of this kind. This took concrete form in the distribution to station-agents throughout the system of free packets of flower seeds. Inevitably, of course, some men did not bother about them but sufficient did to produce a very marked effect and make noticeably attractive those stations where the seed had been properly used and cared for.

"The impression was so striking that the Operating Department of the company proceeded to have small gardens laid out and planted at some of the principal stations and division points along the system. The result of this again was so impressive that a special study was made of the whole question, and subsequently it was decided to engage in the work thoroughly and systematically and to add an expert horticulturalist to the staff."

"The work since that time (1908) has grown tremendously, each year seeing a number of new gardens laid out about the company's stations until today the Canadian Pacific Railway has the largest number of gardens of any railway company in the world."

"Now along the steel system from coast to coast lies a series of fair gardens and spots of green sward and often the cool and refreshing shrubbery about the station constitutes the one cheerful feature of entry into a town otherwise drab and unattractive."

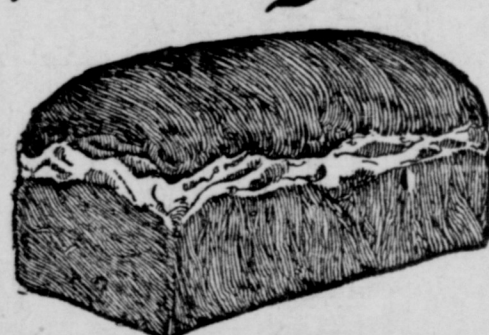

Here and There

It is expected that the present year will break all records in the movement of Eastern trans-atlantic travellers. It is estimated that over a quarter of a million Americans and Canadians will travel to Europe during the season.

The supply of farm hands for Western farms is not equal to the demand and the shortage is becoming more pronounced as the season progresses, in spite of the large number of immigrants coming from Europe for this purpose.

During the eight months ending March 1925, 187,798 cars of grain were passed by the government inspectors for the western provinces. This number has only been exceeded four times in the past twenty-four years. Of the total for this year 105,555 were on Canadian Pacific lines.

According to a statement issued by the Bureau of Statistics, Canada's production of commercial fruits for the past year showed a decrease of \$8,902,912 in value as compared with 1923. The total value of fruits grown in 1923 was \$33,169,343 and in 1924, \$24,266,431.

There has been a decided increase in the first quarter of this year in the ordinary life insurance written in Canada as compared with that of the corresponding period in 1924. The increase in March over February was from twenty-eight to thirty-five million dollars.

According to the first weekly report issued by the Canadian Pacific Railway, the crop acreage this year will be slightly less than last. It is estimated that Manitoba will sow about 2,643,000 acres this year, Saskatchewan 8,555,183 and Alberta 2,721,689 making a total area of 13,919,872 as compared with 14,153,905 in 1923.

Very encouraging reports as to the general agricultural outlook in Southern Alberta have been received from Canadian Pacific Agents around Calgary. Much more progress has been made with seeding than was anticipated and conditions are described as either "splendid", "fine" or good and in every case plenty of moisture in the ground is reported.

The country is being besieged by moving-picture stars. Mary Pickford, Viola Dana, Tom Mix, Harold Lloyd and others have passed through within the last few weeks, and explored the Rocky Mountains and other Canadian attractions. The latest is Hoot Gibson, who is bringing a large company of movie people here to film the Calgary Stampede as an incident in a "super" drama.

Lord Aberdeen and Temair, former Governor-General of the Dominion and Lady Aberdeen passed through Canada recently with the British delegates to the seventh Quinquennial conference of the International Council of Women, of which the Marchioness is president and founder, at Washington. On the bridge at Niagara Falls Her Ladyship was presented with a golden key symbolic of free entry into the United States.

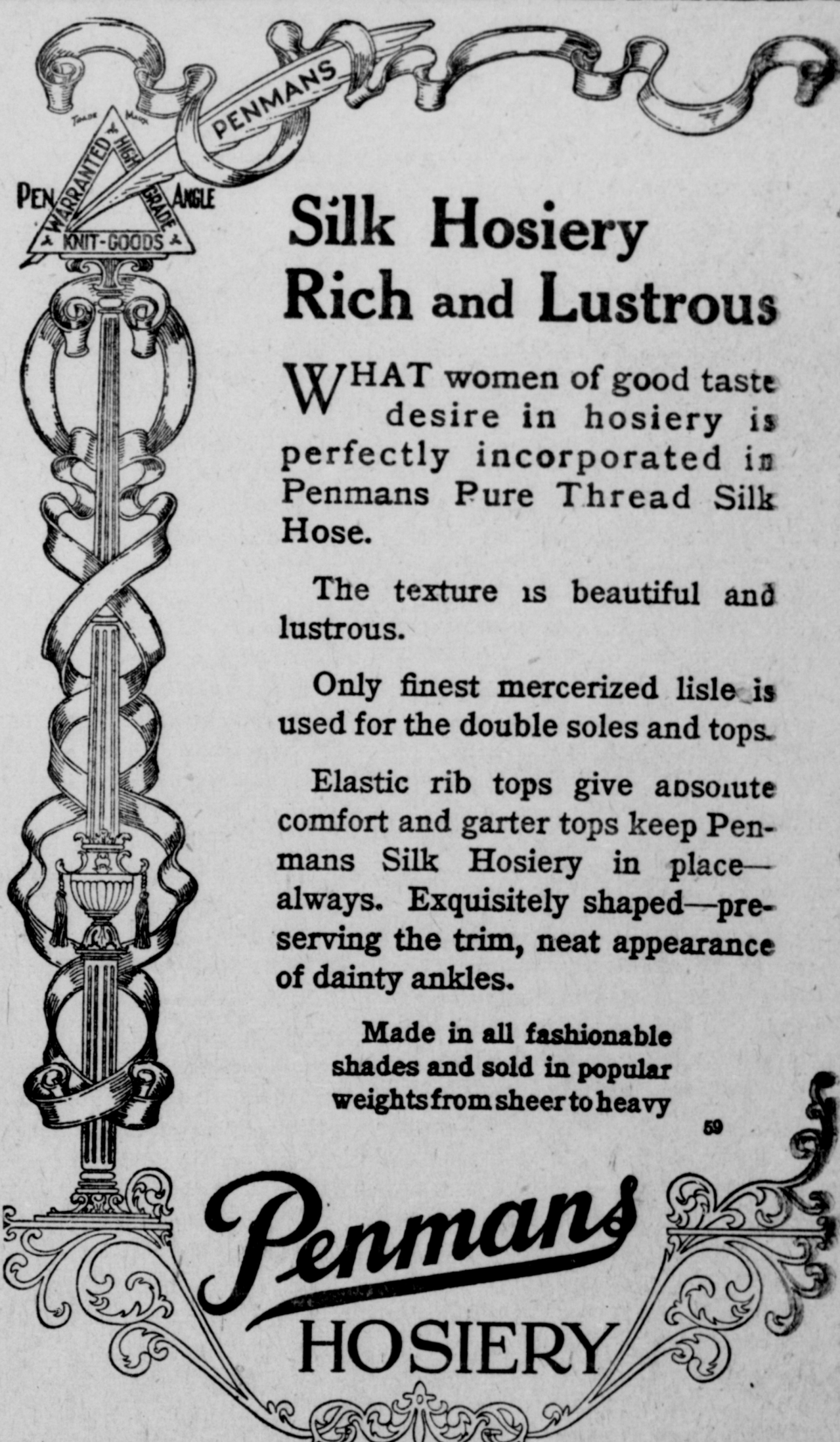
OBITUARY
