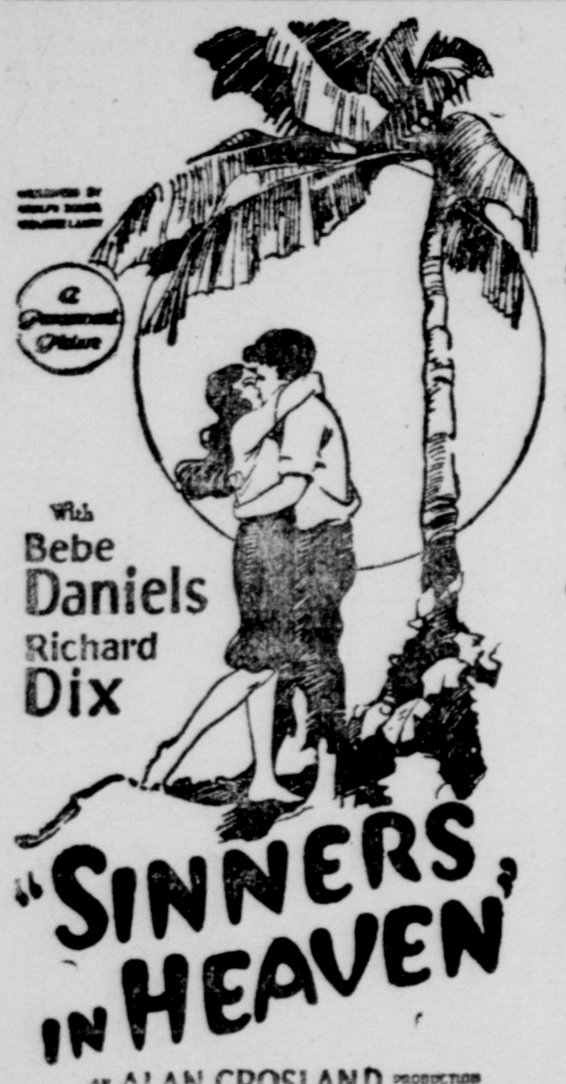

SHALL THE TOWN BUY THE LOCAL POWER CO?

MR. BAXTER VERSUS TEMPERANCE ALLIANCE

The reason the leaders of the Temperance Alliance are withdrawing their support from Mr. Baxter and his candidates at this election is because of public statements made by Mr. Baxter to the effect that he regretted ever having introduced a Prohibition Act without giving a right for the party accused to appeal. The leaders of the Prohibition Party have realized at once that if the right of appeal is given the Act is absolutely useless. The right of appeal was taken away under the Canada Temperance Act and has been taken away under similar legislation every where. If the law were changed as proposed by Mr. Baxter every person accused of offences against the Intoxicating Liquor Act would have the right to appeal. This would enable the Court of Appeal to upset the conviction in case there was any flaw whatever in it or in the evidence which led up to it or in the taking down of the evidence and the appealing party could also have his case tried all over again in the County Court before a Judge or a Judge and jury as he chooses. It would lead to almost endless delay in the settlement of cases. The Temperance Alliance realize just what it means because they were very astute when the law was passed to see that the Magistrate had exclusive jurisdiction and that there should be no appeal and no certiorari to remove any conviction made by him. Of course, they understand as well that Mr. Baxter is playing for support from both parties and expects to secure it as he did, to a great extent, in certain parts of the Province at the last general election. The Temperance people have made up their mind not to be fooled a second time.

NEW SCHOOL AT McADAM OPENED

McAdam, N. B., June 29—The formal opening of McAdam's new composite high school, erected at a cost of \$67,000 took place Monday afternoon. The ceremonies in connection with the formal opening were attended by Lieutenant Governor Todd and a number of representatives of the educational profession. The new school, which has been erected under the provisions of the Vocational Act, provides commodious quarters for vocational instruction. On the ground floor are located class-rooms and laboratories for instruction and practical work in metal, electricity, wood-working and draughting. Provision is made for commercial instruction on the first floor, while quarters on the second floor will be available for cooking, sewing and pre-vocational instruction.

The new building is three stories in height, constructed of brick and concrete with a frontage of approximately 150 feet, and is 58 feet in depth. The contract for the erection of the building was awarded to C. J. Smalley at a figure slightly in excess of \$50,250. Plumbing and heating costs amounted to \$9,650 and lighting installation an additional \$1,000. The remainder of the total cost of \$66,910 is made up of incidental costs covering the preparation of plans and specifications, bond issue, inspection and minor details.

Among those attending the opening ceremonies were Dr. W. S. Carter, chief superintendent of education, and Fletcher Peacock, director of vocational education.

Mrs. Clifford K. Rogers and little son of Carleton, Manitoba, and Mrs. Charles Colwell and children of Fredericton were called home this week on account of the serious illness of their father, Mr. U. R. Hanson.

The first step in the solution of this problem whether the Town shall buy the Power Company and operate an electric light utility is to present all the information on hand for discussion in the public press. The final step is the election to determine the wish of the taxpayers on July 29, 1925.

The preliminary steps already taken by the Town Council are: 1st—Legislation has been obtained allowing the Town to acquire the Company and to issue debentures in payment for it. 2nd—An option has been obtained from the Power Company to sell to the Town for the amount of their liabilities, or approximately \$76,000.

These steps were taken as a possible remedy to conditions now existing whereby the Town is served from Aroostook Falls through four companies instead of as formerly by one Company. Due to these changing conditions the power users pay higher rates and the large bulk of

What is the Value of the Power Company

The Company's statement of Physical Assets and its Statement of Operation for 1924-25 is printed below. The statement of Mr. Wright, electrical engineer places the value as about \$95,000. The replacement value according to Mr. Ewart, electrical engineer would be about \$50,000, and to this should be added the value of it as a going concern with franchise and flowage rights. The value allowed by the N. B. Board of Public Utilities to base rates on was \$80,000.
