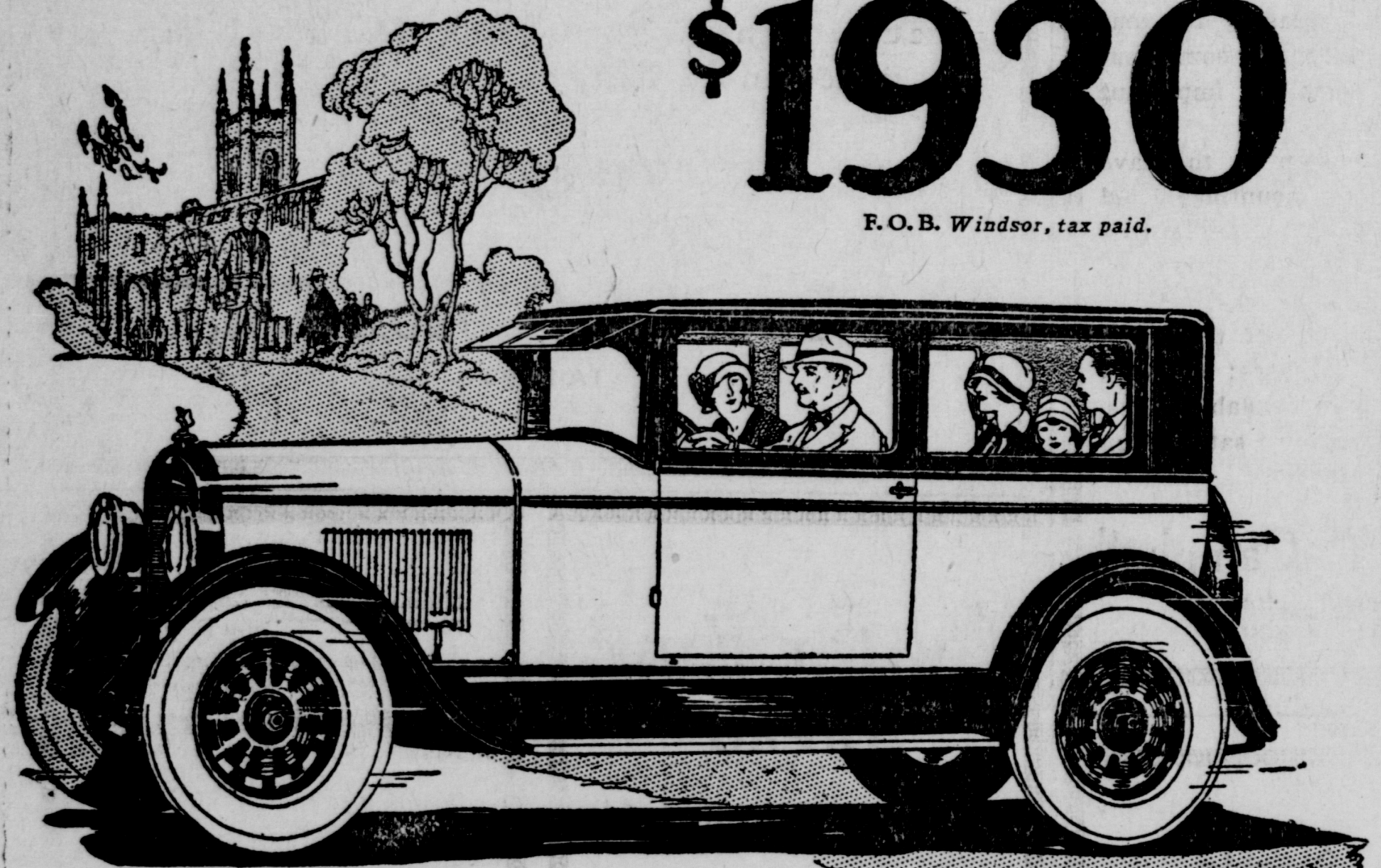

FISH HATCHERY AT SIMPSON BROOK

A meeting of the Carleton Branch of the New Brunswick Fish and Game Protective Association was held in the Court House, Woodstock, at 7.30 on Thursday evening, June 25. In the absence of the President, Dr. L. Dec McIntosh of Hartland, Dr. N. P. Grant of Woodstock occupied the chair.

This branch has been organized but one year and has done a vast amount of good. It has had repeated visits from James Catt, inspector of hatcheries for the Maritime Provinces, with headquarters in St. John, and from J. A. Rodd, head of the fish propagation service for Canada, with headquarters in Ottawa. Through its efforts in the appointment of new wardens, there is less illegal fishing on the Miramichi. Many lakes and rivers have been stocked with fish, and this week Paul Parent of the hatchery at Rapid de Femme, placed 90,000 salmon fry at Marvin Brook in the Meduxnakik river and 10,000 more will be placed there in the near future. It has 189 names on its roll of membership.

P. S. Marsten, the secretary treasurer, read the minutes of last meeting which were approved. He also reported that the cash on hand amounted to \$141.87.

The secretary reported having forwarded a resolution to Hon. W. E. Foster, a member of the International Water Ways Committee, as to the pollution of the water by starch factories in Aroostook county, and that gentleman replied stating that he had forwarded the resolution to the Marine & Fisheries department at Ottawa.

The following officers were re-elected for the coming year:—

Honorary President—G. W. Slipp. President—Dr. L. Dec McIntosh. Vice-President—George Pinder. Sec.-Treasurer—P. S. Marsten.

Voted that the janitor be paid \$1.00 for each time that the meeting room is occupied by the Association.

Messrs Murdoch MacKenzie, C. M. Aughterton and Dr. Clarke, a committee appointed for the purpose presented the following resolution which was unanimously adopted:—

Whereas—The Carleton County branch of the Fish & Game Protective Association views with dismay the intention of the Marine & Fisheries department to remove the present hatchery now situated at the Forks of the S. W. Miramichi to Simpson Brook and knowing that the hatchery which is capable of handling only some 400,000 fry is totally inadequate to stock the river from Boistown to the head of the waters; therefore

Resolved—That this Association puts itself on record as favoring the erection of a hatchery at Simpson Brook of a capacity of 3,000,000 fry during the present summer.

MacMILLAN LEAVES

SYDNEY FOR NORTH

Sydney, N. S., June 27.—The Arctic exploration schooner, Bowdoin, left Sydney this morning on her way north and before sailing Commander Donald MacMillan said in part:

"The Bowdoin leaves Sydney, Nova Scotia, and the Peary will follow fully equipped for exploration and scientific study of new northern lands, with the aid of new methods such as airplanes, radio and color photography, and with a support which places all of us on our mettle. The splendid co-operation of the United States Navy in our preparation had a dramatic climax when the United States Putnam overtook us at Sydney with additional radio apparatus, sent us by the personal order of Secretary Wilbur, Commander R. E. Byrd, in charge of Navy Planes and personnel, and his associates for the United States Navy have accomplished a work in preparation which challenges admiration for their technical ability and superb efficiency and enthusiasm."



CANADIAN NATIONAL RAILWAY EARNINGS

The gross earnings of the Canadian National Railways for the week ending June 21, 1925 were \$4,190,930, being a decrease of \$444,056 or 10 per cent over the corresponding week of 1924.

The gross earnings of the Canadian National Railways from Jan. 1st to June 21, 1925 have been \$99,608,281, being a decrease of \$9,022,316 as compared with the corresponding period of 1924.
