

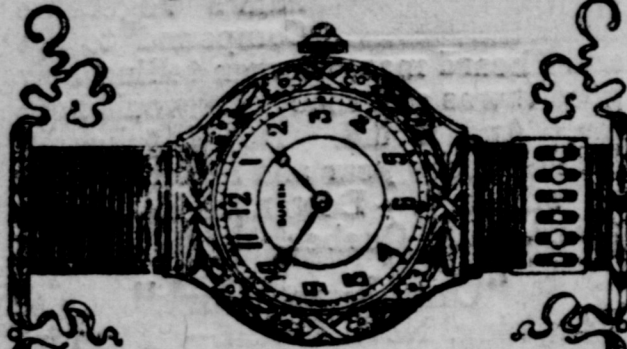

BIG PROGRAMME AT GRAND FALLS

The International Paper Company were hosts on Tuesday to an immense throng of visitors on the occasion of the opening of the development at Grand Falls. Lieut. Governor Todd and suite, Premier Baxter, Hon. P. J. Veniot, Hon. Robert Manion, Hon. G. B. Jones, Raymond Fellows, Atty-General of State of Maine, and other provincial officials were among the guests and took part in the ceremonies. President Graustein and executive officers of the International Paper Co. came by special train, which carried also over 500 invited guests from all parts of the province. The train passed through Woodstock at 10.15 a. m. It consisted of eleven coaches, three of them bearing banners—"The New Brunswick International Paper Co.", "Grand Falls Power," and "The Saint John Power Co."

A large marquee above the crest of the falls contained tables, to accommodate six hundred diners, and after luncheon the official program was carried out. Mayor Collins of Grand Falls, presiding.

DOUCET'S CHARGES REPUDIATED

Conservative Government Counsel Finds No Incident Open to Reproach In Cruise of The Margaret.

Quebec, Que., Aug. 5.—"After having examined all documents and after Mr. Duncan, Mr. O'Connor and myself have taken note of all relevant evidence, and the crew of the Margaret having been examined, I wish to declare publicly and categorically that no incident occurred aboard the Margaret which could be reproached against the persons named, whether Mr. Lapointe, Mr. Bureau or any of their companions," said R. L. Calder, K. C., at the opening of the enquiry into the cruise of the Government steamer, Margaret, instituted at the request of Premier Meighen, following the statement on the public platform by A. J. Doucet, ex-member for Kent, N. B., which charged that Hon. Ernest Lapointe, former Minister of Justice, and Senator Jacques Bureau, former Minister of Customs, had engaged in a joy-ride on the Government boat and which statements were subsequently denied by the ex-ministers—Montreal Star.

Mr. Doucet of Kent, has again put himself on the defensive through his process of false and silly charges against members of the late Liberal Government. But the worst of it is that, as a Conservative, he has also drawn the Conservative party into the mess.—Gleaner.
