COUNCIL RETAINS TOWN MANAGER

TROJAN-ROVERS WIN HARD FOUGHT GAME

Score Tie At End of Game--Over-time Play Necessary For Decision--Exciting Contest

After having had a slight edge most of the way and leading by two points within a few seconds of the finish of the game the Woodstock girls lost in over-time play to the Trojan-Rovers of Saint John last Friday evening at the armoury, 30-25.

The St. John girls have to thank Miss D. Norwood, their star forward, for turning defeat into victory. Just before the whistle blew announcing the end of the contest she was awarded two penalty throws for a foul by a Woodstock player. The score stood 22-20 in favor of the locals. It was a tense moment. The crowd watched breathlessly as Miss Norwood toed the mark for her first throw. If the Saint John girl was nervous she did not show it. Coolly she poised herself and tossed the ball. As it dropped through the netting a generous murmur of admiration went up from the crowd. But could she throw another? She did, and the score stood 22-22. Her success seemed to give her team-mates a new lease of life, and in the over-time play which followed they scored eight points while the best the locals could do was to increase their total by three tallies.

It was seen early in the game that the Woodstock girls could hardly hope to overcome the big lead of 25 points established by the Rovers in Saint John, but it looked as though they might win the game by a small margin. The score saw-sawed now in favor of one team, now in favor of the other. At the end of three out of the four quarters the tally was tied, 6-6, 13-13, 22-22. At half-time Woodstock led 16-12.

The girls of both quintettes were on the ball at all times, and kept the crowd keyed up to a high pitch of excitement throughout the match. With a little more practice in passing the local girls would undoubtedly defeat the Trojan-Rovers on the armory floor, and give them a close game on the Saint John floor.

RESULTS OF SACRED CONCERT

START SOON WITH GRAND FALLS DEVELOPMENT

Final Details Of Agreement Being Completed--Fraser Will Pay \$400,000 For 20,000 H. P.

Representatives of the Fraser Companies Ltd., and the International Paper Company are getting together this week to complete details of the agreement under which the former will get 20,000 horse power from the Grand Falls power development and will in return hand over the various storage and storage rights held by them. The price agreed upon is \$20 per horse power which means \$400,000 per annum.

After these two companies have settled all details the Government will have to take up the matter of Crown Land leases--the present leases being for long lumber manufacturing only.

According to the Fredericton Gleaner, which seems to have authoritative sources of information in connection with the matter, it may not be long before the New Brunswick Railway lands comprising some 1,600,000 acres will be owned by the International Paper Company. This would lead to the erection of a new print plant on the St. John river at a point about the centre of the province, not far from Fredericton.

DECIDES PRESENT SYSTEM BEST

Coun. Gilliland Outlines His Reasons For Voting to Retain Town Manager

The Council met in special session on Tuesday evening, the 16th, to vote on appointments for the positions of Town Treasurer and Superintendent of Streets, Sewers and Water Works.

All the Councillors were present. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Coun. Smith: I move that Mr. J. C. Whitehead be engaged for the position of Town Treasurer and Book-keeper to perform all the duties of the Town office at a salary of \$1,800 per annum.

Coun. Churchill: I second that motion.

The motion was lost. Councillors Jones, Estey, and Gilliland voting against it. Mayor Belyea cast the deciding vote.

Coun. Jones: I move that Mr. M. J. Rutledge be retained as Town Manager at the same salary he has been getting, to perform all the duties of the Town office, acting as Town Treasurer and collecting the taxes.

Coun. Estey: I second the motion.

Coun. Gilliland: Before the motion is put I wish to make myself quite clear. The ticket I was associated with in our recent election was pledged to a policy of economy. And in order to accomplish this we were prepared to make a change in the system of administration if it seemed advisable. I therefore supported the motion to dismiss the Town Manager, which was the only course for me to pursue under the circumstances. We then advertised for a Town Treasurer, Book-keeper, and a Superintendent of Streets, Sewers and Water Works. Amongst the applicants there were only two men who had had any experience in town affairs, Mr. J. S. Leighton whose tender was \$2,000, and Mr. A. G. Fields, whose tender was \$1,300, making a total of \$3,300 for the two positions. The Town Manager, who looks after the office and also the streets and water-works and sewers, and the office assistant receive a total of \$3,250 under the present system. So I am unable to see where a change would effect any economy, and there would likely be less efficiency. We have an expensive filtration and water system and I am sure it is not desired by the ratepayers to have anything less than expert supervision.

In our town last year we had a warrant of \$90,000, and our total tax arrears \$16,185. St. Stephen's warrant was \$90,658, and total arrears \$20,418. Newcastle's warrant \$73,768, and arrears \$45,264. Chatham's warrant \$88,575, and arrears \$59,881. Our financial standing is second to none, and we are able to cut the warrant \$10,000 this year. Owing to our good showing we are now getting enquiries from various Bond Houses who are anxious to tender on any bonds we may have to offer this year.

I assured Mr. Smith that I was willing to dismiss the Town Manager if by so doing we could effect a real saving, but I cannot see where we can do so. We must have a man capable of looking after our interests and I am convinced that it is not wise to make any change.

Coun. Churchill: Mr. Gilliland does not figure the savings we would make. We could save \$1,500. I don't see why two men like J. S. Leighton and A. G. Fields would not make our position perfectly safe. I have nothing against Mr. Rutledge personally but I know of one man who served at this Board and could not get along with him--Mr. Gallagher. I think we should save the \$1,500.

Coun. Estey: Mr. Fields would not take Mr. Horton's place and save his wages. Mr. Fields says he would not dig ditches or do street work. He would act as Superintendent.

Coun. Churchill: We could get a cheaper man to do Mr. Horton's work.

Coun. Estey: None of these applicants would step into a ditch with a pick and shovel. If we had to hire
