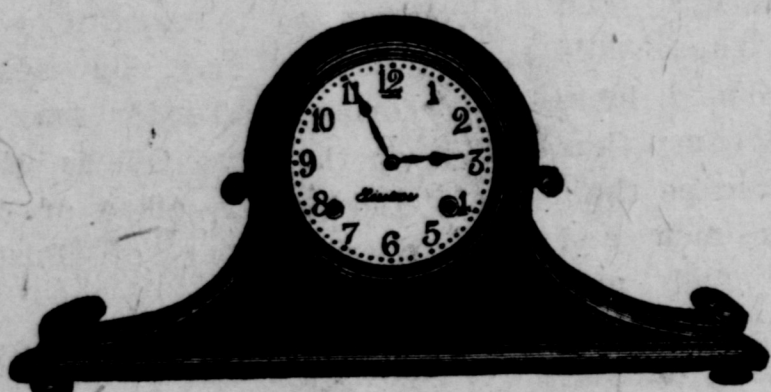

R. F. ARMSTRONG GETS CREDIT FOR FINE SHOWING

Many New Brunswick friends of
R. Fraser Armstrong, son of R. E.
Armstrong, of Saint John, will be in-
terested to learn of the splendid suc-
cess which he is achieving as super-
intendent of the General Hospital in
Kingston, Ont.

The Kingston Standard of May 11
devotes three columns of space to a
very comprehensive article dealing
with the hospital which gives all cred-
it to Mr. Armstrong's work. The
hospital buildings, it is said, are val-
ued at \$780,000. Expenditures for
six months totalled \$87,339.43 and
receipts amounted to \$86,287.26, made
up as follows: Revenue from pa-
tients, \$68,438.72; grants and dona-
tions, \$17,848.54.

The newspaper article points out
that 80 per cent of the revenue is
returned to the city in wages and
salaries and in purchases, more than
\$6,800 going directly to the city of-
ficers in payments for electricity, gas
and water.

The article says: "The Board of
Governors, the controlling body of
the institution is made up of public-
spirited citizens who by paying an
initial fee of \$100 and an annual fee
of \$4 have identified themselves with
this great hospital work. The Board
of Governors of which there are 80
members, annually elects six of its
members to the Board of Manage-
ment. The work of the management
committee is centralized in R. Fraser
Armstrong, the hospital superin-
tendent, who in turn has certain
heads of staff, whom he holds re-
sponsible each for his respective
phase of work."—Telegraph Journal.

BEAUTIFUL HOME OF EX-SHERIFF A. R. FOSTER RAZED TO THE GROUND

Bursting of Acetylene Gas Plant Causes Fire.

The home of Ex-Sheriff Foster was
burned flat about nine o'clock, Tues-
day morning. The house was lighted
by an acetylene gas plant in the
shed, which burst, causing the flames
to spread quickly throughout the
buildings.

The barns adjoining the house
were also burned.

A new car, which he recently pur-
chased, was saved and a summer
house, which stood on the lawn, was
picked up and carried off to safety.

Mr. Foster was able to get most
of the furniture out.

The house stood on the main high-
way, on the bank of the Saint John
River, about 15 miles above Wood-
stock, and was one of the beauty
spots of that section of the coun-
ty.

The loss is partly covered by in-
surance.

The Ex-Sheriff has taken up his
residence in Hartland, for the pres-
ent, where he owns two houses.

THE EXHIBITION BUDGET

Officials Of Various Committees Consider Drastic
Changes Necessary On Program Of 1926 Exhibition
---Estimated Expenditures and Revenue.

The drastic changes in the pro-
gram of the 1926 Exhibition were not
made without deliberate considera-
tion by the officials of various com-
mittees.

The decision was declared after a
tentative budget for the current
year had been drawn up and it was
found that, even with estimated
revenue from several sources boosted
materially in the estimates, an
amount approximating \$725,000 was
required to balance the budget. A
prominent factor contributing to the
decision to prune drastically the agri-
cultural premium list from among
the different items comprising equal-
ly heavy outlay was the recognition
of those assembled of the very evi-
dent indifference of attitude and
lack of support, moral and financial,
of the Carleton County Council to-
wards the Woodstock Exhibition.
The attitude of the councillors, the
exhibition directors assume, is the
expression of the majority of the
farming population each represents.
That the exhibition, as a truly agri-
cultural exhibition, is not popular
and therefore not wanted, it has
been taken to mean, is the verdict of
Carleton County residents generally
as indicated by their representatives.
That Woodstock men personally back-
ing the Exhibition since its incep-
tion have been slow to recognize this
is to be regretted, for the process has
been a costly one, and while sincere
in their enthusiasm and public
spiritedness to boost the promotion
of agricultural development in Car-
leton County through the medium of
the Woodstock Exhibition, it is un-
fortunate indeed that these men
should now be forced to the con-
clusion that their efforts have been
ungratefully rejected. While the in-
terest displayed in the Agricultural
Society is largely manifested by
townspeople, there are a dozen farm-
ers who have zealously worked and
assumed their share of the re-
sponsibilities.

That the influence of the Exhibi-
tion in the betterment of agricultural
effort in Carleton County is evi-
dent will be admitted by even those
unfriendly disposed to it. The quality
and number of good, pure-bred stock
have materially increased during the
past few years. Approximately \$40,-
000 has been paid out in agricultur-
al premiums during the seven years
that the exhibition has been running.
Of this amount, \$24,000 or 60 p. c.
it is fair to estimate, has remained

in Carleton County, and very largely
paid out to farmers. Let us see what
the county has done in the matter
of financial assistance. Of the total
cost of \$110,000.00, for the erection
of the Exhibition buildings, the

Municipality of Carleton contributed
\$20,000.00. The total grants since, a
seventh of the amount of which is
met by Woodstock, do not exceed
\$1500. In the face of such one sided
support, can the proposed radical
change in the policy of running the
fair be justly criticized? We think
not.

TOWN AFFAIRS

Weekly Budget of News Items From
the Town Office.

There are about 420 automobiles
in Woodstock. This is one car to 8
people. These cars now form a large
instrument for service and pleasure
of the community, as well as of de-
struction and dust nuisance to the
roads. As they increase in numbers
our complaints for dust nuisance in-
creases. On the main roads water-
ing will not do. We should start a
plan of oiling with the object in view
of eventually having a dust proof
surface on the main roads. The
street committee are considering
testing one short stretch, with oil and
one with calcium chloride.

In the meantime drive at a reason-
able speed in Town and help abate
the dust nuisance.

The tax roll has been received
from the Assessors promptly on the
date set, and the bills will be mailed
on May 25th.

By-law No. 19 Section 7 reads as
follows:

"It is the duty of the Superin-
tendent of water department to have
turned off all services against which
water and sewer rates are more than
thirty days in arrears. In such case
the water will not be turned on
again unless outstanding accounts
have been paid in full, including a
two dollar charge for turning off."

INVITE MINISTER TO INSPECT THE HOULTON ROAD

Board of Trade Pressing
For Immediate Improve-
ment Of Highway

At a special meeting of the Board
of Trade held Monday afternoon at
the Town Hall a motion was passed
instructing the secretary to extend
to the Minister of Public Works and
his Chief Engineer an invitation to
come to Woodstock this week and go
over the Woodstock road.

In the absence of the Board's pres-
ident Major J. D. Winslow occupied
the chair. After outlining briefly the
purpose of the meeting Major Wins-
low called upon Mr. F. C. Squires,
M. L. A., to report what had been
done towards securing immediate
action in the matter of improving the
road.

Mr. Squires informed the Board
that he, together with Messrs Smith
and Melville, had had a conference
with the Minister, and that he had
assured them of the government's in-
tention to do some work on the Hou-
lton Road this season. Just what
work was to be done or when it
would be done had not then been
settled; but the Minister fully under-
stood the importance of the highway
as a tourist artery, and stated that
it would be made passable for traffic
this summer.

Before closing his remarks Mr.
Squires took occasion to pay a trib-
ute to the newly appointed main-
tenance engineer, F. W. C. Wetmore,
who was present at the meeting.

Mr. George Balmain stressed the
importance of quick action. Already,
he pointed out, tourists were arriv-
ing in the province, and in one case
a tourist had reported that in a tour
from Kansas City to this province
only one bad stretch of road was en-
countered—that from Houlton to
Woodstock. This was very bad ad-
vertising and a remedy was needed
at once.

Mr. Wetmore spoke briefly express-
ing his opinion that considerable work
would have to be done on the road
in order to insure it being passable
during continued wet weather. He
had endeavored to make the trip to
Houlton a short time ago but could
not get very far. He understood
that there were worse places farther
along. Mr. Wetmore said he would
write to Chief Engineer Kinghorn
and advise him of the condition of
the road.

Moved by Mr. W. J. Dibblee, sec-
onded by Mr. G. B. True, that an in-
vitation be extended to the Minister
of Public Works and his Chief En-
gineer to visit Woodstock and per-
sonally inspect the road between
Woodstock and Houlton; also calling
his attention to the adverse public-
ity already being broadcasted as a
result of the terrible condition of the
highway. Carried.

The meeting then adjourned.
