\$20,000 FIRE LOSS AT CENTREVILLE

Barber Shop & Pool, Wilson's General Store, And Scholey House Prey To Flames

Fire which broke out at Centreville, on Tuesday night, in the building owned by F. K. McKenzie and occupied by Sloat and Cains, as a barber shop and pool room, completely destroyed the building, and before it was subdued had spread to and razed the general store of G. Wilson Co., and the residence known as the Scholey house, owned by Col. L. L. Kennedy and occupied by Mr. J. Quinn.

The fire was first noticed about 10 o'clock. It had gained a good start and aided by a brisk wind soon reduced the McKenzie building to a blackened ruin. The only article saved was a barber chair. There was no insurance on either the building or the contents, and the loss altogether would amount to about \$20,000.

From the McKenzie building the flames extended to the general store of G. Wilson Co., and in spite of all efforts to save it the store and contents were completely destroyed. The building was worth about \$5,000 with stock valued at about \$8,000. The loss is partially covered by insurance.

The final prey of the flames was the residence known as the Scholey house. Practically all the household effects were removed by willing hands before this building caught fire. It was worth in the vicinity of \$4,000, and the loss was partly covered by insurance of \$2,500.

Had it not been for the invaluable work done by the private fire-fighting apparatus of C. M. Sherwood Co., there is no doubt but what the whole village would have been destroyed. Citizens all lent valuable aid and there was no lack of willing help. It is thought that the fire originated in the pool room from a cigarette stub.

HORSE NOTES

JOHN DIBBLEE, FORMER WOODSTOCK MAN, GEN. SUPT. OF NIAGARA DISTRICT HYDRO

Advice has reached Woodstock of the recent appointment to the general superintendency of the generating stations of the Hydro Electric Commission of Ontario, of Niagara Falls, of John Dibblee, a former resident of Woodstock, and son of the late William Dibblee. Included in his general duties, Mr. Dibblee, it is learned, will have direct charge of the so-called Niagara District, including the recently constructed Chippewa-Queenston plant which cost in the vicinity of eighty millions of dollars.

LARGE CROWDS AT-TEND CIRCUIT COURT

Three Cases On Docket—Address of Welcome to Justice LeBlanc—Grand Jury Brought True Bills.

The spring session of the Carleton County Circuit Court opened here on Tuesday, Justice LeBlanc presiding.

A pleasing feature of the opening was the presentation by R. P. Hartley and F. C. Squires, M. L. A., of an address of welcome and congratulation on behalf of the Bar, to Justice LeBlanc who was recently elevated to the bench of the Supreme Court. The Justice replied feelingly, thanking the Bar for their kind words and good wishes; and took advantage of the opportunity to congratulate the County of Carleton on the possession of such a magnificent Court House—one that stood second to none in the province.

A large crowd was on hand when the Court opened and the Court House was comfortably filled throughout the whole session. The Grand Jury was made up as follows: Geo. Jones, Allan Poole, Edgar Neal, Geo. Gibson, and H. H. Smalley, Woodstock; Joseph Palmer, Lakeville; Fred Seely, Arthur Dickinson, Hartland; James Peters, Florenceville; George F. Burpee, Chas. Wilkinson, Centreville; and Stanley Hatfield, Peel. The Grand Jury found True Bills in two cases. The third case had been before the Grand Jury at the last sitting of the Circuit Court.

Petit Jurors were: F. L. Moers, Frank Foster, Chas. L. Smith, Cecil Stewart, Ralph Hayden, Woodstock; George Coffee, Bellville; Owen McCarty, Woodstock; Ed. Saunders, Florenceville; Reuben Rideout, Peel; L. A. Noble, David Bell, Bristol; Alfred Strong, Bellville; Arvin Nevers, Elisha Palmer, Wilmot Rideout, Hartland; Samuel Hill, Cloverdale; Harrison Rogers, Northampton; Charles Gray, Upper Woodstock; Louis Boyd, Johnville; Edward Brooks, Hartland, and Ralph Sprague, Woodstock.

In the case of the King vs. Fred Snow, the defendant, a youth of 14 years, was charged with indecent assault. The complainant was Miss Jennie Murchie, of Kirkland. R. P. Hartley for the Crown, and F. C. Squires defending. The jury brought in a verdict of not guilty.

The case of the King vs. J. Lavigne, in which Lavigne was charged with indecent assault and adultery, was next on the docket. Miss Helen Prosser, aged 15, of Waterville, was the complainant. The hearing took all day, and it was after four o'clock when the jury retired to deliberate. They were out over an hour. The verdict was, not guilty. R. P. Hartley for the Crown, and F. C. Squires for the defence.

The case of the King vs. Rex Stewart was withdrawn by the Crown. There being no civil docket, the court then adjourned.
