THE BEAUTIFICATION OF RURAL SCHOOL GROUNDS

The Canadian Horticultural Council have earned the gratitude of every public spirited citizen in fostering the ornamental planting of the school grounds throughout the country. Commencing last year ten silver cups were offered for competition in various districts of the Dominion to the rural schools accomplishing the greatest degree of beautification to the grounds during

the year. Most of these cups were won last season but they cannot become the property of any school until won three times, not necessarily in succession. With the winning of each cup goes an Award of Merit Certificate that may be framed and kept by the school as a permanent record.

Mr. L. F. Burrows, Secretary of the Horticultural Council at Ottawa, announces that the number of entries being received promised keen competitions this year. With each entry a photograph of the grounds should be supplied, to be compared with a similar picture taken in the autumn showing the improvement that has been made. Trustee boards, Women's Institutes and Horticultural Societies are urged to cooperate with the Council which will provide instructions and suggestions on the plants that may be used and their arrangement in the school grounds.

HOT WATER PIE CRUST

2 1-2 cups flour
1-2 cup boiling water
1-2 cup shortening
1-4 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon salt

Cream the shortening with the water by adding the latter only a bit at a time. Mix the salt and baking powder with the sifted flour and stir this into the butter and water. Turn out upon a floured board and roll thin before lining the tins. This amount will make upper and lower crusts for one large pie.

\$5,000,000 FOR THE RURAL CREDIT PLAN

Ottawa April 17—Rural credit legislation, which the Government will submit to the House, provides for an initial subscription by the Federal Government of not more than \$5,000,000. The Federal Government subscribes five per cent of the capital stocks as loans are made by the board, the Provincial Government another five per cent, and each borrower will be required to put up five per cent of his loan at the time it is made. The maximum of farm loan bonds which the Federal Finance Minister may hold at any time is \$15,000,000.

The loans will be handled by a board consisting of the Minister of Finance and three other members, of which one will be appointed by the Canadian farm loan commissioners.

The terms of the Government's proposal are as follows:—"That the board shall issue farm loan bonds to make long term loans to farmers, and the Government of Canada shall provide initial capital for the board to an amount not exceeding \$5,000,000 and subscribe an amount of five per cent of the capital stock as loans are made by the board."

"The Government of the province in which loans are made shall be required to subscribe to the capital stock of the board as loans are made in such province an amount equal to five per cent of this loan payable at the time the loan is made. The loans shall be made on the security of first mortgage on farm lands; the interest rate shall be such a rate in ex-

cess of the interest payable on the farm loan bonds as is sufficient to provide for the expenses of operation; the farm loan bonds shall be legal investments and may be purchased by the minister of finance provided that the amount of such bonds held by him shall not at any time exceed fifteen million dollars, and the amount of any payment by the government of Canada on account of capital of the board as payment for farm loan bonds purchased shall be paid out of the consolidated revenue fund on the authority of the governor in council."

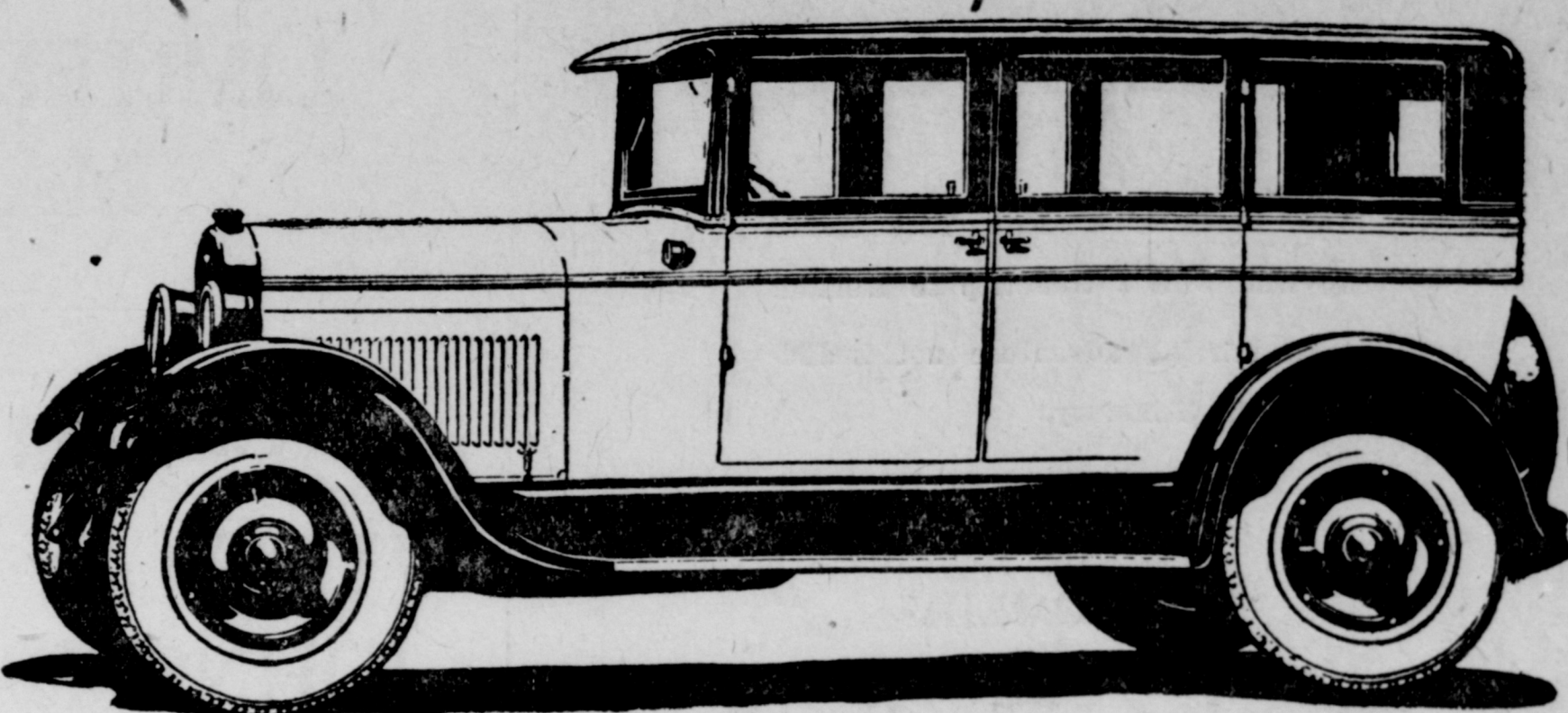
