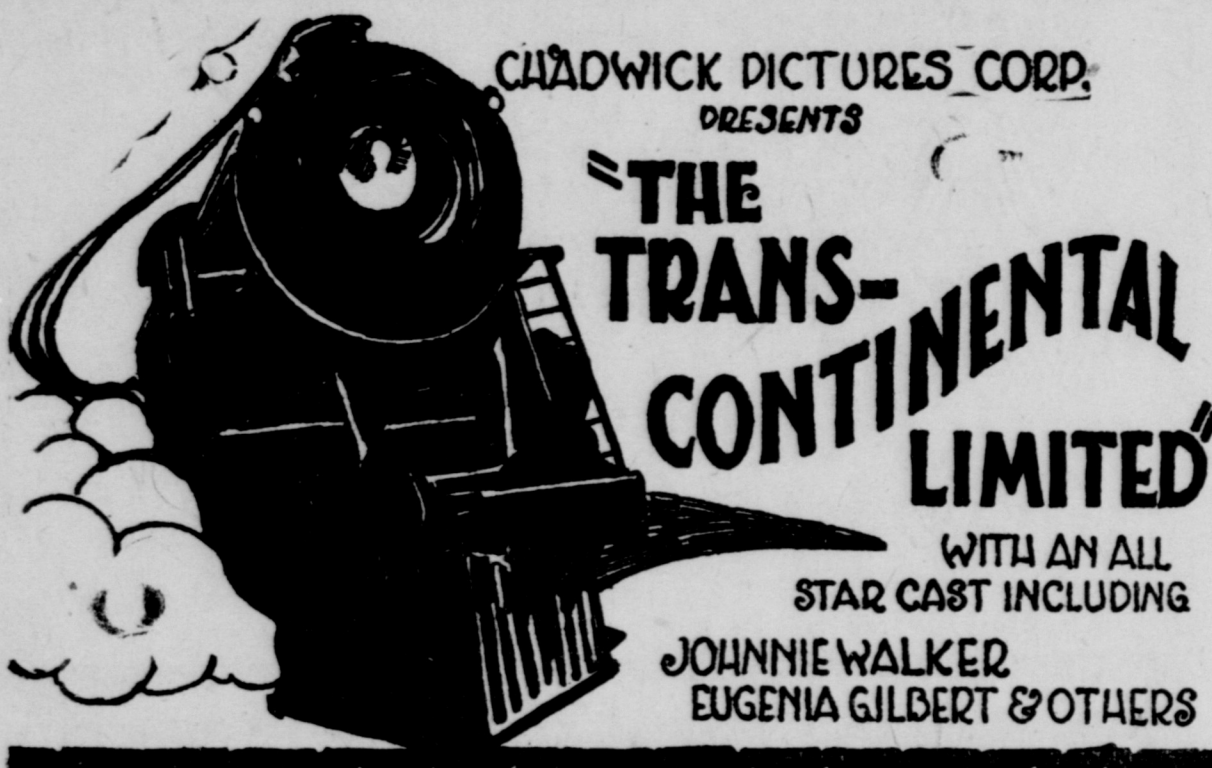

FIRST MEETING OF NEW COUNCIL

The first meeting of the new town council was held on Monday evening with Mayor Jones in the chair and all the councillors present except Coun. Nodden.

The Clerk read the returns from the recent election and stated that Mayor Jones and Councillors Montgomery and Campbell had taken the necessary oaths of office.

After calling the council to order the mayor stated that he wished to take this opportunity of expressing his thanks to the electors for the support given him in the election. He came to this position fully realizing his comparative inexperience and many imperfections, but he felt that he could rely upon the co-operation and assistance of the members of the council to enable him to fulfill his duties in the best interests of the town. He extended his congratulations to the incoming councillors and said that he felt it was a matter for congratulation to the town that five candidates had presented themselves for election, any three of whom, if elected, would have served the town with ability and distinction. He further said that this council was fortunate in taking over the management of the town's affairs at this time when they were in such good shape, and thought it possible that this year might be gone through without an overdraft at the bank at any time. He stressed the necessity, notwithstanding our present prosperous condition, of being very careful not to spend any money unnecessarily simply because we had it. He also referred to the policy of the past few years of paying off a certain portion of the bonded indebtedness annually. There was \$7,000 of bonds maturing this year and he felt that the Council would be justified in retiring this amount. He said that the plant for which the bonded indebtedness was incurred would not last forever and future generations would have to pay for a new one. He also dwelt on the necessity of strict collection of taxes to which we owe our present position. While he was not in favor of harsh measures with any taxpayer who could not pay it was only fair to those who did pay that all who could pay should be compelled to do so. He referred to the dust nuisance and expressed the hope that the streets committee would have something to recommend before that season arrived. He also spoke of the necessity of the town obtaining power to remove buildings which added to the fire hazard and stated that he could assure the Council that this matter would be arranged without expense to the town, a provision being inserted in the revision of the provincial statutes making the sections of the Towns Incorporation Act relating to that matter applicable to all towns whether incorporated under that Act or not. In conclusion he said that nobody expected the mayor or council, simply because of their election to those positions, to be endowed with any supernatural wisdom, and urged them to devote to the town's business the common-sense and ability which they used in their own and he felt that the town's interests would not suffer during the coming year.

His Worship then presented his slate of committees as follows:
Finance: Couns. Gilliland, Smith, Campbell.
Water and Light: Couns. Nodden, Montgomery, Gilliland.
Streets: Couns. Churchill, Smith, Montgomery.
Fire: Couns. Smith, Churchill, Nodden.
Police, Licenses, Fines and Sewers: Couns. Campbell, Gilliland, Churchill.
Poor: Couns. Montgomery, Nodden, Campbell.
On motion the slate was adopted and the committees approved as the standing committees for the year.
The Town Manager presented his report, after which various bills and accounts were taken up and referred to the Finance Committee for report on Friday night.
Upon motion the appointment of assessors was deferred until Friday night.
Coun. Gilliland brought up the question of the delay in receiving the decision from the Public Utilities Commission as to rates for light and power, and the Manager read some correspondence in reference to the same.
On motion of Coun. Gilliland, seconded by Coun. Smith, the mayor was instructed to write the chairman of

N. B. POTATOES ALL GRADED

Declaring false the rumors circulated that New Brunswick potatoes shipped to the Cuban market were being discriminated against by buyers there, C. W. Clark, Woodstock, who, together with other members of the Associated Potato Shippers held a meeting here Wednesday afternoon, intimated that, on the contrary, all potatoes shipped to the southern market had been carefully graded and marketed in good condition.

During this month, Mr. Clark stated, all potatoes shipped have undergone the government inspection and have been certified Canadian standard, Grade A stock.

At the afternoon's meeting, Mr. Cornell, assistant commissioner of the Federal potato inspection service, and Mr. Vroom, chief of the inspection staff for the Maritime Provinces, were present and outlined the policy of government inspection. Referring to the outlook for potato export trade Mr. Clark stated that the Associated Shippers fully expect to ship a boat load of potatoes a week for the duration of the shipping season. The price being paid locally for potatoes were quoted at \$2.00 per barrel, an advance of 25 cents over the ruling price paid previously. With the American market showing a stronger feeling, Mr. Clarke was of the opinion that prospects for higher prices for potatoes were bright.

REVISED RATES ON C. N. R.

The Editor Carleton Sentinel,
Dear Sir:

Ever since the Transcontinental Railway was built, rates on potatoes originating on that line have been a great deal higher than rates from competitive points on the C. P. R., when destined to the United States. This has been a severe handicap to potato growers and shippers on the Transcontinental, as it has amounted to from 13c to 15c per barrel, during the past eight or nine years.

Since 1918, we have been pressing the C. N. R. for an adjustment of their rates to a competitive basis with the C. P. R., and we have just received a letter from Sir Henry W. Thornton, under date of February 1, stating that our request has been granted, and that the new rates will become effective in the course of a month or two. Sir Henry's letter speaks for itself, and reads as follows:

"Referring to correspondence exchanged with regard to the establishment of rates on potatoes to the United States.

"We have thoroughly studied the situation, and are now arranging to publish the same rates as the Canadian Pacific from all competitive points to destinations in Grand Trunk territory covered by the Canadian Pacific tariff. This, we feel, should be satisfactory to you, and should take care of your complaint in this connection.

"I would point out, however, that it is necessary for us to submit our proposals to connections for their approval through the recognized channels, and it may therefore be a month or two before the revised tariff can be made effective."

This means a saving of many thousands of dollars a year to the potato industry to points on the Transcontinental and Valley Railways, and we feel that the public, especially those in the northern part of Victoria county, should feel very grateful to Sir Henry W. Thornton for the personal interest taken in their transportation problems.

SHEEP RAISING IS PROFITABLE

"At the present time there is possibly no more profitable line of livestock, or one in which less labor or equipment is involved, than sheep raising, particularly as it applies to the small farm, or as part of a mixed farm."

Such is the statement made by Mr. George B. Rothwell, Dominion Animal Husbandman at the Central Experimental Farm at Ottawa, in an introduction to a booklet entitled "Sheep for Mutton, Wool and Money" which has just been issued by the Bank of Montreal for free distribution through its local branches.

The booklet, a copy of which has been received for review, gives within its 50 pages a wealth of information regarding the keeping of sheep, and this information is illustrated by close upon 150 photographs and drawings which in themselves form a comprehensive guide to the various breeds and types, and to the methods by which small flocks may be made profitable.

The information given in the booklet is straight and to the point. It tells how to select the most profitable types of the various breeds, how to raise the young, how to keep the flock in health, how to feed and house them—in fact, practically everything that the average owner of a small flock needs to know. A feature is a photograph showing the various grades of Canadian wool, with a description including both the Canadian and American terms for the grades.

The fact that the booklet is distributed gratuitously to applicants at the local branch of the Bank indicates a realization by that institution of the fact that anything which makes for the profit of the individual, makes also for the welfare of the whole community.

INTERESTING LECTURE

Supposing Florence Nightingale had saturated herself with this stuff in her youth, do you think for a minute that what was to be the germ of the modern Red Cross would have been born.....

The men who publish these magazines are clever and cunning. They know that in every human there is an element of cheapness. In some of us it fairly jumps out at you, in others it is almost lacking. These men are commercializing this weakness of ours, they are making piles and piles of money by appealing to this part of our nature.

The question is, will we allow them to rob us of our true heritage, the heritage of beauty and truth, or will we stop this conspiracy to stunt our mental growth?"
