APPLE WEEK

Ottawa, Oct. 4.—"Apples for
health" is the slogan decided on for
this year's celebration of Canadian
National Apple Week to be held un-
der the auspices of the Dominion
Department of Agriculture in co-
operation with the Canadian Horti-
cultural Council.

The Hon. W. R. Motherwell an-
nounces that Apple Week will be
celebrated in Western Canada from
October 24 to October 29, while in
the Eastern Provinces the dates will
be from November 14 to November 19,
the change being due to the fact
that Canada's agricultural jubilee
is to be held in connection with the
Royal Agricultural Winter Fair at
Toronto, and it is desired to have
every branch of Agriculture recog-
nize the jubilee together.

Referring to Canada's agricultural
jubilee to-day, Hon. Mr. Mother-
well stated that from all sides as-
surances of co-operation were forth-
coming, and that the Federal and
Provincial displays being planned
will be of a most comprehensive
nature and do justice to the over
eight billion dollar industry that has
been built up in the Dominion.

It is officially announced that a
preliminary campaign will be inau-
gurated this fall to offset the inroads
made by the California fruit growers
with their products, to popularize
the Canadian apple and to bring this
fruit back to the place in public
favor it held for many years.

REGULAR MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL

The Council met in the regular
session on Monday night, at 8
o'clock, with the Mayor and follow-
ing Councillors present:—Messrs
Gilliland, Smith, Nodden, Campbell
and Montgomery.

After the minutes of the last
meeting had been read and approv-
ed on motion Mr. F. C. Brown was
heard before the council in regard
to a claim of the Town for frontage
tax on building on Main Street, re-
cently purchased by him.

On motion Mr. Kilburn Currie was
heard before the Board in reference
to the frontage tax on his property
on King Street.

On motion of Councillor Campbell,
seconded by Councillor Montgomery
it was decided to refer these mat-
ters to the Street Committee, with
instructions to report at next
meeting of council.

The report of Manager Allen for
the month of September was read.

The report of the police magis-
trate for September was read by the
Town Manager and this was also ac-
cepted and ordered to be placed on
file.

The bills and accounts were read
and referred to Audit Committee.

Councillor Montgomery brought up
the subject of the Town paying for
lights on private lines and made a
motion to the effect that no lights
be placed and paid for by the Town
on any private lines which was
seconded and carried.

The matter of J. H. Thompson's
request regarding taxes on a garage
to be built on his lot on King Street,
was discussed and referred to
Finance Committee to look into and
report later.

On motion, the \$10.00 fee to be-
come a member of the Union of
Municipalities of N. B., was ordered
to be paid.

The Town Manager, was authori-
zed, after some discussion, to have
the lock-up put in better condition,
and also to have the entrance to the
Town Hall and the office of the
Chief of Police cleaned up and
painted.

The peony plants given by H.
R. H. the Prince of Wales to the
Town were handed to Councillor
Campbell to look after the planting
of them at some suitable place
within the Town.

The matter of Mr. Spencer's taxes
and license was taken up and
given into the hands of the Finance
Committee to look into and re-
port at next meeting.

The Manager and Police Com-
mittee were given instructions to
engage all the special Police
necessary to keep order in the
Town.

The meeting then adjourned till
Friday at 8 o'clock.

INAUGURATION OF RATHBONE BIBLE CLASS TO BE HELD

Somewhere in New Brunswick,
likely in Saint John, the date De-
cember 14 will see a gathering of in
the vicinity of 1,500 members of the
Knights of Pythias, the event to be
the inauguration of what is known
as Rathbone Bible Class at which
special work will be carried out with
a large number of candidates. The
occasion, it is anticipated, will be
a red letter day in Pythian circles
in this province, and will be mark-
ed, in addition, by the appearance of
which formerly belonged to Justus
the famous Rathbone Bible, the Book
Rathbone and which was used by
him in pledging the candidates in
founding the Pythian Order.

The Bible, which is now perman-
ently in the keeping of the Keeper
of Records and Seals in the Sup-
reme Lodge of the Order, will be
brought to this province by the pre-
sent holder of that office, Harry
Love of Minneapolis, who is com-
ing here for that particular purpose.

Decision as to the place in which
the special gathering will be held
will be made at a meeting of promi-
nent Pythians to be held in Saint
John today, at the Victoria Hotel.
The meeting will be attended by
Lew P. G. Stratton, of Moncton,
Pythian Grand Chancellor of Mari-
time Domain; A. P. Gorbell of Mon-
cton, Grand Keeper of Records and
Seals; Frank Hamm, West Saint
John, Grand Inner Guard; C. H. I.
