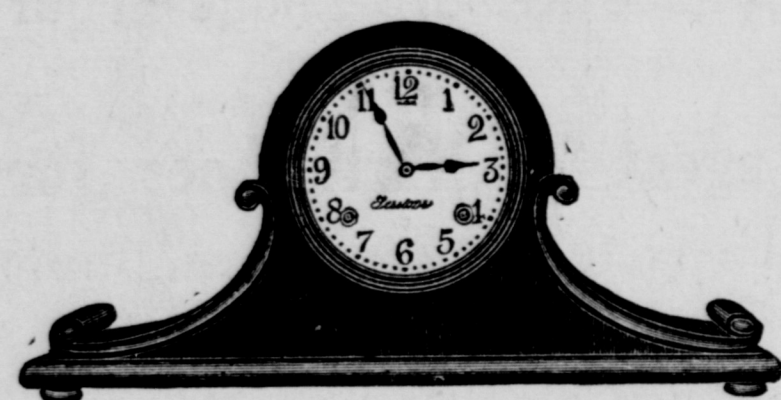

FATAL ACCIDENT TO ST. JOHN MAN

Gordon A. Warman, of Saint John, provincial manager of the Continental Life Assurance Co., was instantly killed about 8.30 o'clock on Monday evening when a C. N. R., southbound freight struck the automobile he was driving at Hilman's Crossing, nine miles from Woodstock.

Mr. Warman was driving towards Woodstock. The train at the scene of the fatality is partly hidden by high banks.

Dr. Rankine was immediately called but death had been instantaneous. The body was brought to Woodstock to the undertaking rooms of J. Vanwart & Son. Mr. Warman was approaching Woodstock enroute from Meductic when the accident occurred. The crossing is somewhat blind from the east side but comparatively clear from the Meductic side, and the only explanation as to why Mr. Warman did not see the locomotive was that a light snow falling at the time, about 8.30 o'clock, must have clouded the windshield of his car. The locomotive had pushed some cars across the crossing and was following them up with a gap between and that Mr. Warman must have seen the end of the cars passing over the crossing and come to the conclusion that the train was past but did not make allowance for the locomotive which was backing up at the time.

His wife and daughter, Miss Pauline, 16 years old student, residing at the home, 59 Peters street, Saint John. Another daughter, Mrs. Karl C. Fraser, resides at 96 Coburg street, also Saint John. Yorkie Murphy, a nephew, is a clerk in the Bank of Nova Scotia, Saint John.

Mrs. Frank Phinney, of Halifax, and Mrs. A. D. Dowell, of Detroit, are other daughters. There are no sons. George E. Warman, of Bas River, Kent County, and Alven Warman, of Molus River, River, Kent County, are brothers. The dead man's birthplace was in Kent County. Three sisters, Mrs. William Atkinson, of Watertown, Mass., Mrs. John Dunn, of Marlboro, Vt., and Mrs. Fred

HIS WORSHIP, THE MAYOR REPLIES TO "CITIZEN"

Woodstock Light and Power Situation Dealt With—
Appeal Board and Minimum Rate Taken Up.

Dear Sir:

While anonymous communications to the press have never appeared to me to be worth a reply I realize that there is considerable misinformation being broadcast in connection with the rates for electric current for the town. For this reason I would ask that this letter be given the same prominence as that of "Citizen" appearing in your last issue.

In October, 1926, the company filed a schedule of rates substantially reducing the rates then in force, but increasing the minimum to \$1.50 a month. A hearing was held and for some months the matter was under consideration by the Public Utilities Board. At length in April last, the Board gave its decision reducing one item by one cent per k. w. h. From this decision the company appealed by way of certiorari. The application for a writ was made to the Appeal Court at the June term and the matter in the ordinary course would come on for hearing at the September term of that Court.

Incidentally, the order of the Board staying proceedings pending the appeal—made without any notice to the town—provided that the rates should, if the appeal failed, be retroactive to the date of such order in April.

Upon receiving the factum on appeal from the company's solicitors, which turned out to be a highly technical document, it was at once apparent that in order for the town's solicitor to file a factum in reply it would be necessary to engage the services of an expert rate engineer. As the town has reason to know, this is an expensive amusement. Then there would be the additional expense of having the case argued. Decision would be reserved for a further two months. During all this time the old rates would be in operation. Then there was no certainty of success. In fact it appeared to me to be very doubtful. The Appeal Court had in June reversed two orders of the Board concerning rates.

Had the company won the appeal the whole thing would have had to be gone through again, the hearing to pay the company's costs. Had we won there was always the possibility of a further appeal.

In these circumstances the council decided that negotiations for a settlement might very wisely be entered into with the company, and a conference was arranged at which all members of the council except Coun. Gilliland, who was away, met the representatives of the company. After meetings extending over two days the rates as published last week were agreed upon, to come into operation on October 1st. These rates are substantially the same as filed.

If these rates do not work out satisfactorily the town or any citizen has a perfect right to apply to the Board for a reduction, with this advantage, that during the course of the proceedings the present lower rates will be in effect rather than the high ones of previous years.

The appeal was not argued, nor was anybody paid to attend nor did anybody attend. "Citizen" seems to think that the appeal was to the Board which is rather ridiculous. It was to the Appeal Division of the Supreme Court.

The time for coming into operation of the new rates was extended to October 20th, by an order of the Board on the application of the company without any notice whatever to the town. This, however, is no more than we have learned from experience to expect from the Board.

In the negotiations for a settlement a deadlock was reached on the question of the rates being retroactive. The company would not agree to it and a settlement could not have been effected had the town insisted. We wanted a settlement, simply because it was the town's money and not our own which would be spent did not, we felt, justify us in continuing this expensive and possibly useless litigation. I hope that attitude on the part of councils has gone for good.

In any case, the rates as filed were opposed chiefly on the increase in the minimum rate. The Board allowed the minimum rate. Under the new rates over one half the services in town will come within the minimum rate, and I feel that the interests of the citizens as a whole will be just as well forwarded by "ruthlessly sacrificing" the refund to the larger users and thus making it unnecessary for the minimum users to pay the extra charge per month for the past six months. The minimum users must continue to pay the increase and the larger users can very well sacrifice something for their benefit.

I trust that this will place the matter clearly before the citizens. Personally, I am absolutely satisfied that the Council adopted the proper course and used good judgment in the interests of the town.

Just one word in conclusion. If "Citizen" were honest in his desire for information, or if any other citizen wishes information, there are eight men—the councillors, the manager and myself—who are always glad to furnish it to him in far less time than it takes to compose a verbose, anonymous letter to a newspaper.
