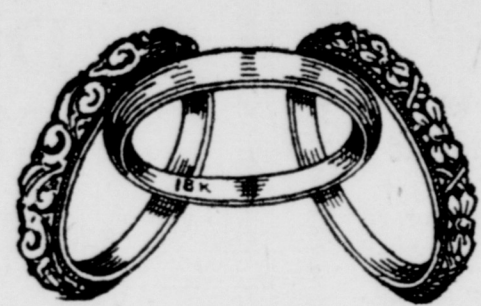
Dr. W. D. Rankine of Woodstock has honored memory of his son and daughter.

The new stained glass window installed in the memorial Hall of the University of New Brunswick above the platform Dr. W. D. Rankine of Woodstock in memory of his son and daughter is an exceedingly beautiful work of art. It was produced by a prominent firm of makers in London, England, and depicts the Triumph of Good over Evil as taken from Milton's Paradise Lost.

The coloring is magnificently rich. The scene represents the fallen Angels being driven out of Heaven into Hell. At the top of the window is Heaven where Christ drives in a chariot. Satan and his followers are seen rushing tumultuously downwards, fear and anger on their faces, while from the base of the window the flames of Hell leap up to greet them. The Rankine window is a wonderful addition to the beauty and grandeur of the Memorial Hall. It is the third stained glass window to be installed, the others being memorials to the late Earl of Ashburnham and to the late Lieut. G. P. O. Fenwick. Four side windows are still unsupplied with pictorial panes.
