MAKING THE BEST OF THEIR OPPORTUNITIES

That the great majority of the British Miner-Harvesters, who were brought to Canada some weeks ago to help harvest the Western Grain crop and with a view of settling them afterward in Canada, are an excellent type, and are doing their best to make use of the opportunities afforded them to earn some money and to establish themselves in Canada, is the opinion of Dr. W. J. Black, Director of Colonization for the Canadian National Railways.

This opinion was expressed by Dr. Black when he returned to Montreal after a tour of the West, in which he took particular pains to investigate the conditions surrounding the British Miner-Harvester's movement in the Prairies, the manner in which these Harvesters were being treated and how they were adapting themselves to farm work in this country.

Only about ten percent, Dr. Black says, had shown themselves unworthy of the opportunities presented to improve their position in life, and he emphatically declared.

"Some of the finest men we have received from the old land in many years are to be found among the British harvesters, who have come to Canada this year."

Dr. Black then proceeded to say that it was easily to be realized the percentage of the harvesters who are not making an effort to avail themselves of the opportunities offered, are representatives of the element of the unemployed in Britain who do not wish to work.

In refutation of the statements made that there were not sufficient vacancies for all of the British harvesters brought out, is that "On Friday, September 14th, there were in Saskatchewan nearly 2,000 applications for men at \$6.00 per day, for which there were no men available."

Dr. Black quotes letters being received at Winnipeg office of the Canadian National Railways Colonization Department from many of these young men, a few of which suffice to show that there were well pleased with their venture, satisfied with the country, and had every desire to stay here.

SNOW ARRESTED IN DORCHESTER, MASS.

Bucket Shop Proprietor Awaiting Trial in Houlton

Later developments concerning the alleged criminal activities of Percy K. Snow at Houlton and vicinity show that people of Aroostook county and vicinity lost about \$30,000, by his alleged fake transactions, and that he was not particular as to where the money came from, accepting it from widows, farmers and people who could ill afford to take a chance on the investments he offered.

Snow is 34 years of age, instead of 50, as first reported, and he came from Nova Scotia. He had worked in Beverly, Mass., as a mechanic and had been connected with brokerage houses in various places.

When he made his escape from the hospital in Houlton, just before his case was to be called for trial in the Supreme Court, he left his clothes there and hired an automobile for a drive to Danforth, where he boarded a train, having bought a ticket to Boston. After a visit to his sister, Mrs. Edward Goodwin, in Dorchester, he departed for Texas, where he had previously been located for a time.

Frank J. Rogan, of Bangor, investigator retained by the Maine attorney general's office, located Snow in Texas and had him under surveillance there. Mr. Rogan secured information, at about the time he was making preparations to go to Texas after him, that Snow had left for the east. Then a watch was set at his sister's house in Dorchester, Mass., and on Saturday night last Mr. Rogan and two Boston police officers captured Snow on the sidewalk in front of the house. It was found that the fugitive had his effects packed for a return to Texas with the plan of settling there.

The report that Snow was home sick, accounting for his return east was incorrect. On the contrary he had made all plans to return to Texas at once. He appeared to have plenty of money for long trips and living expenses, and is said to have been a free spender, and has a wife and three children.

An effort has been made to get bail for Snow at Houlton, as it is regarded as a hopeless task to secure his release, there being many charges to be brought against him. His release on bail in one case would only lead to his arrest on another, and so on until the number of cases against him is exhausted with heavy bail to be imposed in each case, owing to the serious nature of the charges against him, involving a total sum of \$300,000, as far as now known. It is said that several Aroostook county farmers were financially ruined by trusting Snow and his alleged investments.

THE POTATO MARKET

Maine shipped one hundred and sixty eight cars of potatoes Saturday and the total from the United States was nine hundred and seventy nine cars on Monday. The market was about steady at shipping points in Maine. Growers received sixty to seventy five cents per barrel for cobbler and seventy five cents to one dollar for Green Mountains. Digging was heavy in Aroostook County Monday afternoon and haulings to storage increased. Boston had one hundred and ninety cars of potatoes on track Monday and the price on one hundred pound sacks cobbler ranged from one dollar and five cents.

OPPOSES GAMBLING

While appreciating the educational value of exhibitions and the good they were doing in the promotion of agriculture generally, Hon. Lewis Smith, Minister of Agriculture for New Brunswick, in speaking at the opening of the tenth annual Woodstock Exhibition, deplored the prevalence of gambling at all fall fairs. He expressed the hope that directors of other exhibitions would do all in their power to eliminate this feature in future programmes in the interests of their patrons.

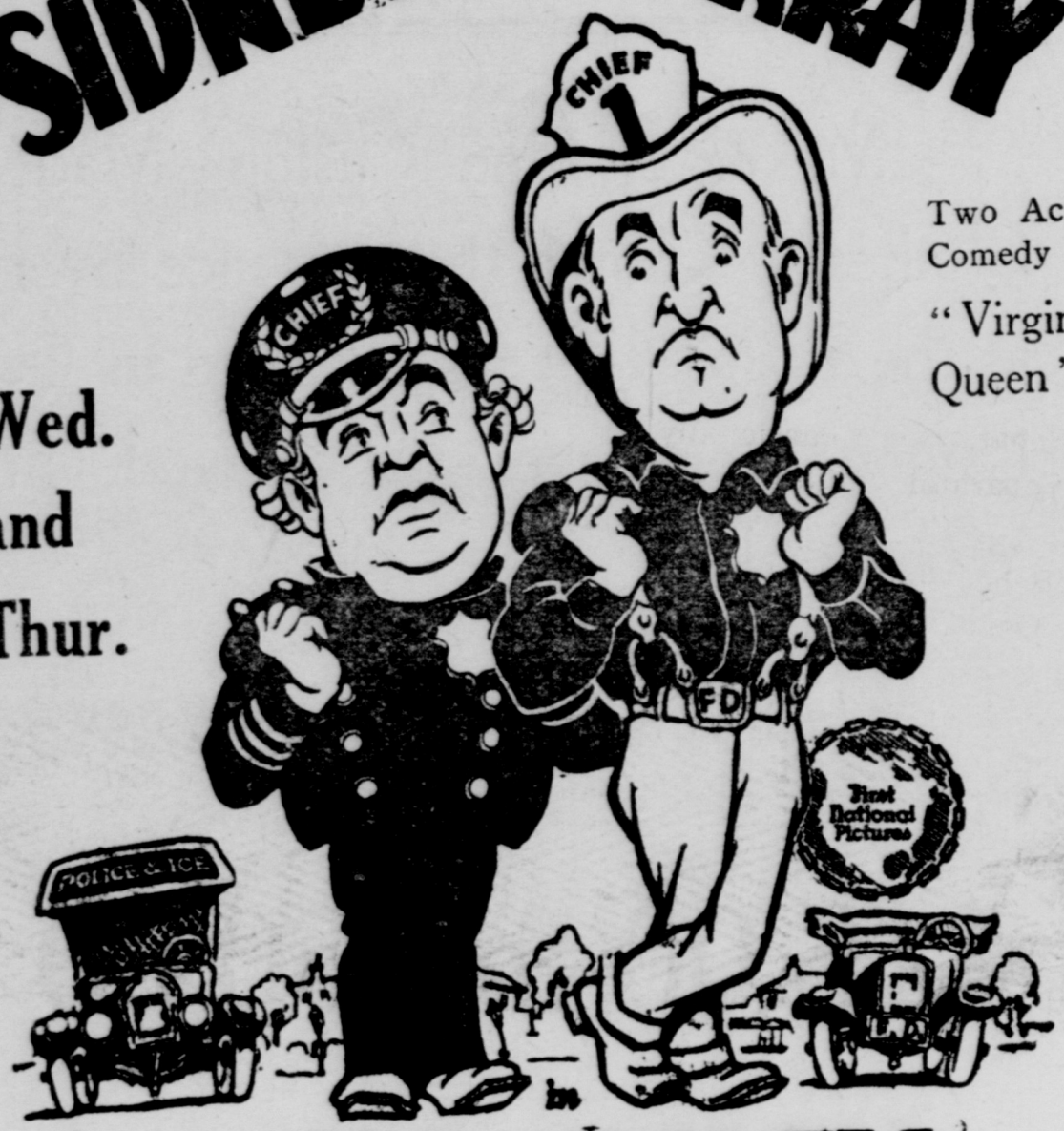
