Rev. A. J. Back, of Woodstock, was named moderator of the Saint John Presbyterian Church in Canada at the annual meeting held in the morning and afternoon sessions on Tuesday in the rooms of St. John and St. Stephen church with the retiring moderator, Rev. Dr. Wardlaw Taylor, of St. Andrews, was nominated for moderator of the General Assembly to succeed the late Rev. ENCOURAGING REPORTS

Most encouraging reports were heard showing a 12 per cent increase in membership within the Presbytery an 18 per cent increase in missionary giving and a 25 per cent increase in the total contributions for all purposes, the full amount being over \$70,000 in the year that had just closed.

The Presbytery in 1927 gave to the funds of the general board of missions more than was received from the board in all of congregations within its bounds. This statement was taken as implying that the Presbytery was self supporting.

The Presbytery made plans for a rally of young people and Sunday School workers to be held some time next autumn either in St. Andrews or Fredericton.

It was reported recently that the investment house of H. B. Robinson & Co. Ltd., of Montreal, has underwritten the securities of Enamel and Heating Products Limited, which will take over as going concerns The Charles Fawcett, Limited, of Sackville, and The Amherst Foundry Co. Ltd., of Amherst. An offering of shares to the public will be made in the near future. In this connection it is interesting to note that Mr. H. B. Robinson is a Maritime Province man, who has made good in his chosen work. He was born in Rochester, being the son of the late J. M. Robinson, a prominent Saint John banker. Entering the Bank of Montreal in 1897 Mr. H. B. Robinson served several years in Saint John and Winnipeg. Leaving the bank he proceeded to study the bond business in the United States. He returned to Saint John in 1902 and became associated with his father's business, leaving in 1911 to open a branch in Montreal. He went overseas with the Fifth Royal Highlanders of Canada. Returning to Montreal in 1919 he organized H. B. Robinson & Co. Ltd., of which he is the president. Mr. Robinson has been interested in many successful floatations including Viau, Bessit, Gurdas and National Distillers. He is a man of keen business acumen and has had long and successful experience along financial lines. It is most gratifying that Mr. Robinson is taking an interest in Maritime Industries at this time.

REPORT OF TOWN MANAGER

Woodstock N. B.,

To His Worship the Mayor & Councilors,

Woodstock, N. B.

Gentlemen:
I submit herewith the report, covering details of administration coming under the authority of the Town Office between the dates January 31 and February 29, 1928.

ADMINISTRATION: Water bills for the period ending February 29, have just been mailed. A list of delinquent taxpayers owning property, who are making no apparent effort to meet their obligations, has been prepared and is in the printer's hands. The various committees have been over the budget and have cut large sums from the total, but I believe some more paring is necessary. The Finance Committee has met several times and has gone over the whole list of names of those with tax arrears.

FIRE: There have been eight alarms and seven hundred and fifty feet of hose has been wet.

STREETS: Little snow plowing has been done, but considerable difficulty has been experienced in keeping open the Coteau basins, due to the continual changes from thawing to freezing temperatures and the reverse.

SEWERS: No sewer trouble has been experienced.

POOR: The last month has been a very trying one in this department.

WATER: All has gone well. Hydrants have required constant attention.

POLICE: Comparatively few arrests have been made. The Chief has been engaged to a large extent on tax collection. We have called again to find a dog catcher.
