FAMILY OF SEVENTEEN COMING TO CARLETON

Mr and Mrs. Morgan Walters and Fifteen Children on Way from
Wales to Settle on Farm Near Woodstock.

A family of seventeen persons, the parents and fifteen children, are on the ocean now, on their way to settle and make their home on the Thomas McGrath farm at Teed's Mills, near Woodstock. They are Mr. and Mrs. Morgan Walters and their children, five boys and ten girls, the oldest being Elizabeth, aged 24, and the youngest Marget, aged 4. They are coming from Llanelli, Wales, and sailed from London on the steamer Scythia, due at Halifax during this week-end.

The Walters family are coming to Canada under the 3000 family scheme directed by the colonization department of the C. N. R. Arrangements for their settlement are being made in cooperation with the provincial government. Mr. Walters was formerly a professional football player and stands over six feet in height. In preparation for his move to Canada he followed the agricultural correspondence course prepared by the C. N. R. All the

family passed an A-1 medical examination before leaving for Canada. Before leaving their home in Wales Mr. and Mrs. Walters hired an omnibus in which to take their fifteen children about to say good-bye to their friends. There was a large crowd at the station, singing farewell to them. With them is coming the family's pet dog. As a result of the favorable arrangements under which British settlers can come to New Brunswick the total cost to Mr. Walters for transportation of himself, his wife and their fifteen children was only about one hundred dollars with the free passages and assisted passages obtainable.

The arrival of the Walters family will give the village of Teed's Mills the most substantial boost in population it has enjoyed in a long time. Their arrival constitutes some thing of a record in immigration and settlement.

FARMERS URGED TO GO IN FOR MIXED FARMING, LIVE STOCK

Large and Representative Meeting of Farmers Addressed by Officials
of Federal and Provincial Agriculture Depts.

The conditions prevailing in the counties of Carleton and Victoria, consequent upon an over-production of potatoes, leaving the financial depression that such conditions bring about, are not so very different than those prevailing in certain other sections of Canada, was the statement of H. S. Arkell, livestock commission for Canada, in addressing a public meeting of farmers held under the auspices of associated agricultural societies of Carleton-Victoria and with the joint co-operation of the federal and provincial departments of agriculture at the Vocational School here on Friday afternoon of last week. Telling of the experience of farmers in several districts of the west, Mr. Arkell showed that there was no reason for farmers of these counties to be discouraged because of present conditions, and that by intelligent, well directed effort they could be confident of reversing these conditions within a short time, by going in for mixed farming and live stock on a more extended scale instead of depending wholly on potatoes as a cash crop.

Upwards of 200 farmers, representative of the two counties, made a very intelligent and deeply interested audience for the speakers. The result of the meeting is sure to be good, and it is safe to say that every farmer left the meeting with encouragement and renewed hope. The arrangements for the meeting were initiated by William Kerr, of

the N. B. staff of the federal dept. of agriculture, and were carried out very successfully by him in cooperation with officials of the provincial department and R. W. Maxwell, principal of the Vocational School. C. H. Gray, president of agricultural Society No. 4, presided at the meeting.

Harvey Mitchell, deputy minister of agriculture for New Brunswick, was the first speaker. While deploring the conditions that prevail as a result of over-production of potatoes, he said there was little the New Brunswick department of agriculture could do to effectually remedy the present market conditions. Steps had, however, been taken by the minister of agriculture, he said, to provide the only apparent solution to alleviate the present glut. Mr. Mitchell referred to arrangements which had been made with the Hatfield Company of Hartland to operate a potato starch mill in that town which had begun operation.

The speaker, outlining some of the policies of the provincial department, considered that the growing of seed grain was one phase of farming which should prove a profitable project in these counties. With this in mind, he said, that a seed cleaning plant, as a result of negotiations recently entered into by Hon. Lewis Smith, was likely to be established at Bristol in the very near future.

Bristol, N. B., April 8.--Early Sunday morning, April 7, at the home of her son, Ernest Dyer, there passed away one of the older inhabitants of the village, Mrs. Ellen Dyer. She was 88 years of age, and had been an invalid for six years. Her husband, the late Thomas Dyer, predeceased her 35 years ago. She was the daughter of George Grantham, one of the pioneers who came here from South Carolina and settled at Aroostook Junction. She was the last of a family of five.

Three sons survive her, Ernest of Bristol, Guy of Wicklow, and Isaac of Simonds. Two grand-daughters, Anita Dyer and Lillian Murray, are in Dallas, Texas. Mrs. Henry Adams and Mrs. Jack Bell of Connecticut, and Mrs. Merritt Stokes, of Braintree, Mass., are also grand-daughters. Floyd Dyer of Conn. and Fred Rogers of Detroit are grandsons. Three others live here. She has also six great-grandchildren.

The funeral took place Tuesday afternoon, the service being conducted by the Rev. George Tilley. Interment was in the United Church cemetery, of which church the late Mrs. Dyer was a member.

She leaves a large number of relatives and friends, who will always remember her cheerful, optimistic outlook, which was unchanged by sorrow or illness.

DECIDE TO BUY ROAD MACHINE

COUNCIL WOULD NOT WAIT TO
FIND BASIS OF GOVERNMENT
ASSISTANCE.

At Friday night's regular meeting of the town council it was decided, on motions of Couns. Montgomery and Churchill, to purchase the road machine for which the council has been negotiating, and the town manager was instructed to buy the machine immediately.

Coun. Churchill said if the machine was not bought there would be \$1000 worth of gravel to go back. There was no chance of getting the use of a government machine early. The machine now owned by the town was not suitable, and it would be economy to buy this one. Coun. Johnson thought that Coun. Churchill as chairman of the street committee had kept up the work very well without this machine, and he would prefer to wait a year to see how this machine works on highways. Coun. Churchill said it would work as well on the town streets as on the country roads. It would do all the unpaved streets except the road to Upper Woodstock.

Coun. Jones asked what about the government's undertaking to assist to the extent of 50 per cent. of the cost of town streets? Town Manager Allan said he understood the act had gone thru, under which the government would pay up to 50 per cent. of the cost of the main highway running thru the town. Town solicitor Hartley said he had written for a copy of the act, but had not yet received it. Coun. Montgomery said it would not be satisfactory to depend on the government machine. It would come when not wanted, and not be available when wanted. He thought the council should go ahead and purchase the machine. Coun. Smith thought it would be economy to do so.

Couns. Johnson and Jones moved an amendment that the council delay action a few days to give time for a reply to the letter Mr. Hartley had written asking for a copy of the new act. The amendment was defeated, and the motion carried, 3-2.

BASKETBALL GAMES ARE UP IN THE AIR

DISPUTE WITH OTTAWA BRITANNIAS OVER EXPENSES DELAYS SEMI-FINALS.

As The Carleton Sentinel goes to press the semifinal basketball play-off, between the 83rd Battery team of Woodstock, junior Maritime champions, and the Ottawa Britannias, champions of that section of the league, is up in the air. It is not known whether the local boys will go to Ottawa, or the Britannias come here.

The arrangement at first was that the games would be played in Ottawa on Friday and Saturday of this week. The Britannias, however, refused to give the local champions a guarantee or pay their expenses to Ottawa. A telegram was sent Wednesday on behalf of the Battery team offering to accept a percentage guarantee and go to Ottawa, or give the same for Ottawa to come here. Up to a late hour Thursday afternoon no reply had been received to this offer. The games have necessarily had to be postponed, and unless expense arrangements are agreed on either way, and new dates set, there is a possibility that each team will claim default by the other. The winner of these games was to proceed to Toronto to play the Elizabeth Juniors in the finals for the Dominion title.

A press dispatch from Ottawa says that "Ottawa and district feel, however that they are being asked too much, in bringing the Maritime title-holders here as they had to bring them and pay their expenses. The season so that they feel that it is to the Maritime team to bring the Britannias down to Woodstock". The offer of a guarantee to the Britannias to come here covers this objection.
