Orders for Canadian cheese cabled from Great Britain, demonstrate its popularity overseas and the confidence placed in our grading methods, according to Doctor J. A. Ruddick, Dominion Dairy Commissioner, who states that the British demand for Canadian cheese is at the peak.

Between four and five thousand bags of Garnet wheat are being shipped from Port William to be tested by millers in Great Britain. Reports of the reception given these samples will be available before this year's crop is ripe, government officials expect. If these prove favourable the future of this early ripening variety should be assured.

Beef grading in Canada will be established shortly under regulations framed by the Dominion Government, R. S. Hamer, chief of the cattle division of the Department of Agriculture, announced at the annual meeting of the Ontario Cattle Breeders' Association in Toronto the other day. The proposed system will be a voluntary one and will be confined to municipalities with facilities for inspection and grading at the time of the slaughter. The aim in view is the stabilizing of the market and the breeding of better cattle.

YOUNG MINISTER WAS SURE OF RECEIVING "GRACE" ANYWAY

Preacher's Talk about "Grace" Caused Amusing but Embarrassing Situation at Ordination of Young Minister.

Writing in the Maritime Baptist Rev. O. S. Wallace tells of an amusing circumstance in connection with an ordination at which he was present, when a preacher unconsciously caused much amusement, as well as embarrassment to the minister being ordained and his fiancée. He writes:

It was the summer vacation of my Junior year at Acadia. I was visiting my Whidden cousins in Antigonish. The young pastor at Port Hawkesbury (H. P. Robinson) was to be ordained. These passages were really eloquent. At any other time I should have admired them for their excellence; but on this occasion I was moved—and to tears—by the reiterated promise, "I'll give you grace."

BEAUTY AND CANCER RARELY GO TOGETHER

Declares Eminent Specialist, Who Lauds Beauty Parlor.

TORONTO, Ont.—Beautiful women rarely contract cancer of the skin.

No less an authority than Dr. Joseph Colt Bloodgood, renowned cancer specialist, of Johns Hopkins University, says so.

But Dr. Bloodgood, who lectured last evening under the auspices of the Canadian Social Hygiene Council, does not claim that beauty itself is responsible for this comparative immunity.

Instead, he awards the palm to beauty parlors.

"Beautiful women," he says, "do not neglect a mole, wart or naevus. If an irritation appears on the skin, they give it immediate attention. The daily care of the skin and their cleanliness prevents rough areas appearing or the accumulation of dirt on rough areas. Ignorance and dirt are the chief causes which allow local lesions on the skin to become cancer."

Dr. Bloodgood assails the popular belief that cancer is, to its victims, as inevitable as death and taxes, and his citation of the comparative immunity of beautiful women from one variety of the affliction, merely in proof, of the fact that cancer is preventable, he points out.

"Fear the beginning and not the end of cancer," he urges. In all forms of cancer, fear of the disease comes too late."

To the press, Dr. Bloodgood gives great credit for the increasing public awareness of the danger of allowing innocent-seeming but possibly cancerous manifestations to develop unchecked.

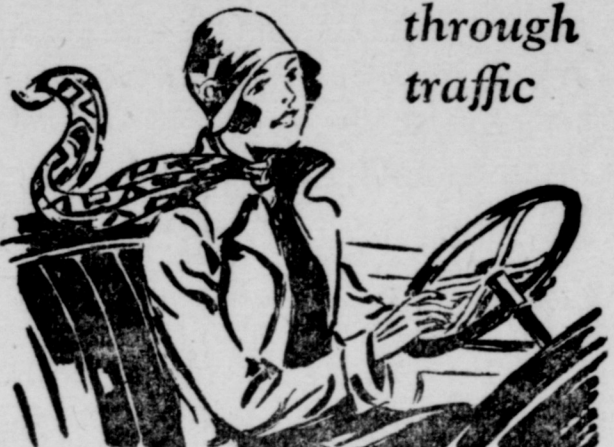

SIDE SADDLE IS BEING SET ASIDE

LONDON. — Women horseriders are forsaking the modern astride seat for the old-fashioned side saddle. The return of the old fashion is encouraged actively by prominent organizers of horse fairs. The authorities of the Richmond Royal Horse show, one of the most popular events of the kind in the kingdom, have ruled that for the meeting in June women must not ride astride at the parades or in the classes of hunters and hacks.

Several women notable for their skill in horseriding express appreciation at the return to old conditions.

"The astride seat is not for women," declares Mrs. Victor Adamson, who holds many riding prizes. "It is too cumbersome and very uncomfortable. Nothing looks more beautiful than a woman riding side saddle, but how many women look well astride—even the best of them?"

"Women have not the same grip as men, and to ride astride means special development and a great deal of practice. The side saddle seat is far more easily acquired, more artistic, certainly more womanly, safer and less exhausting."

Horace Smith, from whose riding school in Cadogan place many London children and women learn to ride, said that the tendency to revert to the side saddle was interesting rapidly.

"Nineteen out of twenty pupils are now taught the old style," he said. "And the little girls almost solely learn to ride as their grandmothers did."

"There are, of course, many girls who ride astride, but the people who lead the fashion are definitely against it nowadays."

\$1 MORE A WEEK KEPT JOB FOR HUDSON PRESIDENT

Was Given \$15 a Week When He Asked Only \$14.

William J. McAneeny, the newly-elected president and general manager of the Hudson Motor Car company, began modestly in the automotive industry, like many another present principal executive. When he was mustered out of service as private in one of the New York regiments serving in the Spanish-American War, he sought employment with the Riker Motor Vehicle Company at Elizabethport, N. J.

After the interview with the prospective employer had reached the stage when the matter of salary came up, McAneeny was asked how much money he thought he ought to have. The job was that of purchasing agent, and the seeker after it announced that he felt that \$14 a week was perhaps within reason. The Riker executive broke all precedents by saying that he would make the salary \$15 on the ground that if McAneeny was not worth that, he was not worth anything to the company.

That was nearly 30 years ago, when \$15 was a lot of money, in any business. Mr. McAneeny stayed with the Riker, organization for about four years and then left to become purchasing agent of the Electric Vehicle Company, Hartford, Conn.

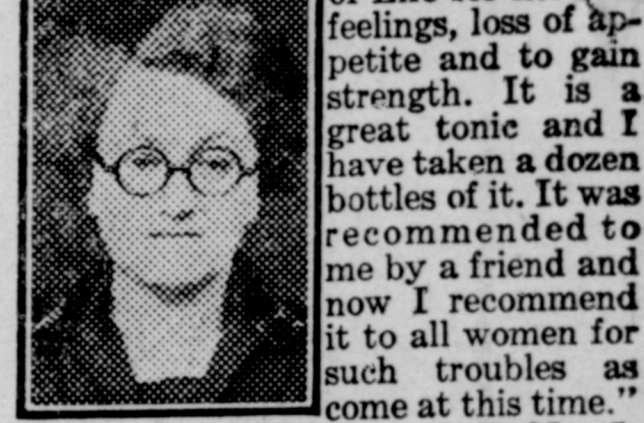
Later, in 1909, he began his experience with Hudson, which culminated in his election as president and general manager last week.

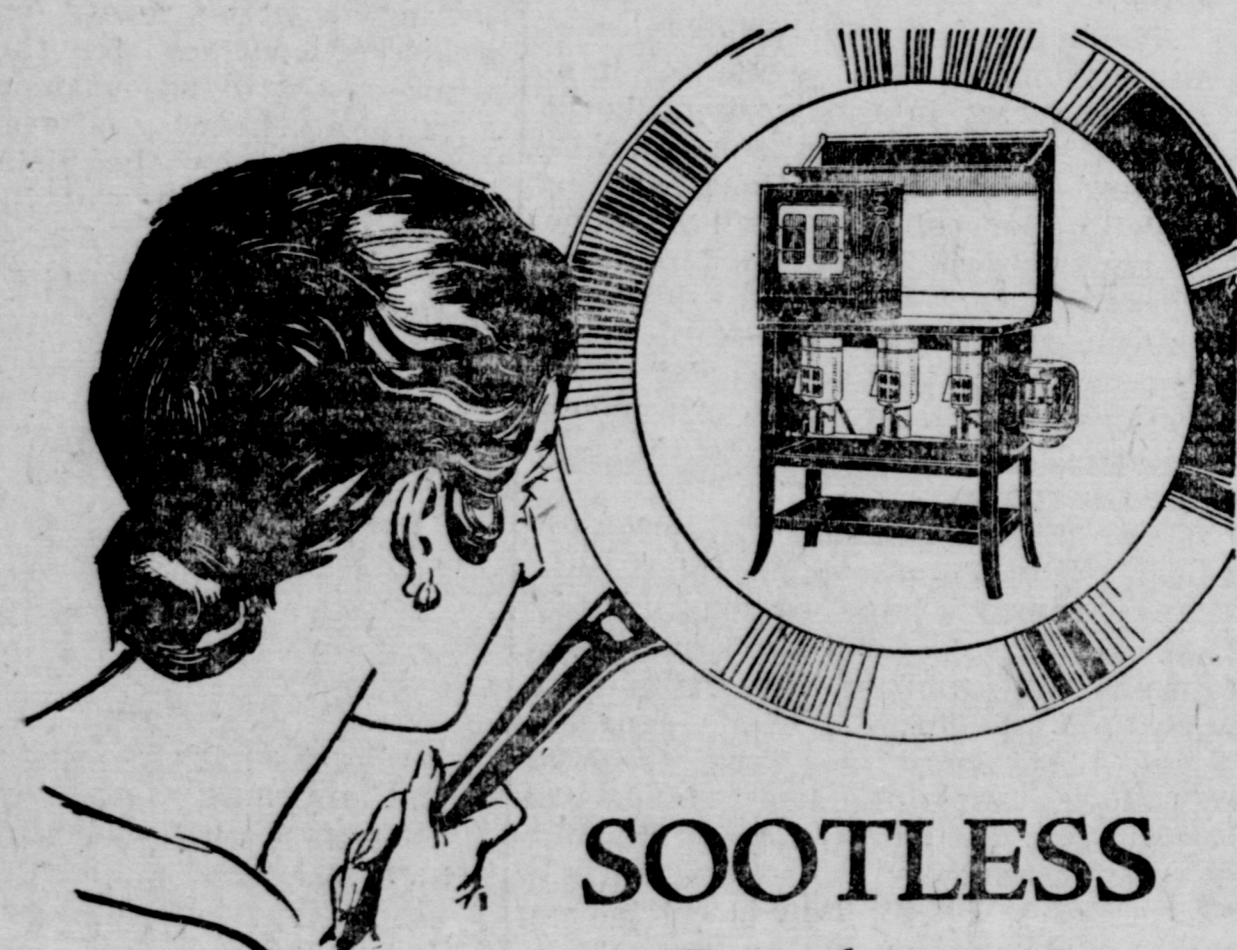

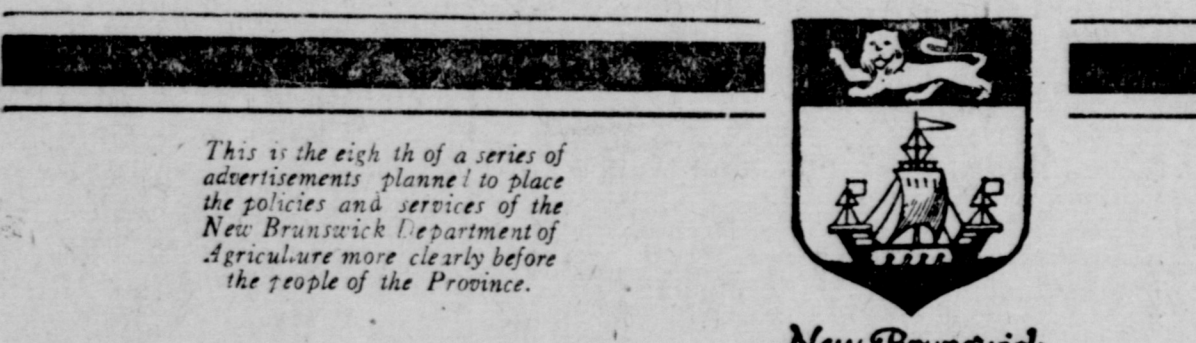
