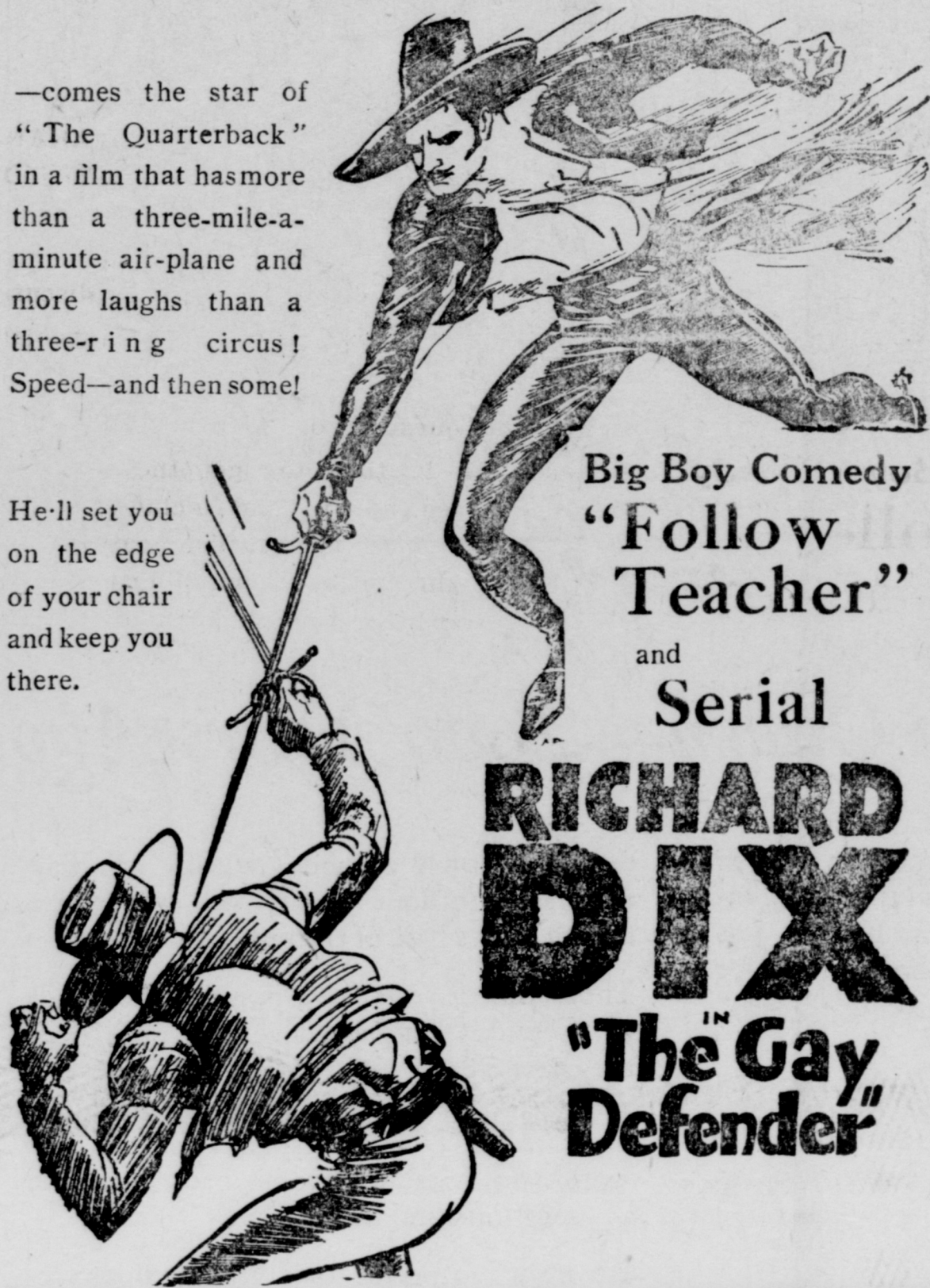

WANT TO SECURE INDUSTRIES HERE

IN ANSWER TO ANONYMOUS LETTER, COUNCIL PUTS OFFER ON RECORD

At the special meeting of the town council Tuesday evening Mayor Campbell read a letter asking what inducements the town would give an industry that would employ 20 to 25 persons the year around. The letter asked that reply be made thru the news columns of the local paper, and was signed "One Interested."

There was some comment from the councillors and his worship about a person making such a proposition anonymously, but all expressed a desire to encourage the establishment of industries. On motion of Couns. Smith and Johnson it was decided that the council go on record as willing to give a free site, exemption from taxes up to ten years, and a very low water rate, to any new industry meeting with the approval of the council.

WANT TO ENCOURAGE TOURIST TRAFFIC
Provincial Bureau to be Organized, and Government Wants Town Bureaus.

In the town council Tuesday night, on the question of the town taking an advertising space in tourist edition of the Saint John Telegraph-Journal, Town Manager Allan stated that he had been informed in Fredericton that the government was starting a tourist information bureau, and wanted all towns to have such bureaus also. The government would pay the cost of incorporation of the association, and assist local associations in carrying on their activities by furnishing literature, etc.

To Coun. Jones Mayor Campbell said half the space the Telegraph-Journal had proposed would cost \$21. Coun. Jones thought the ad. would benefit the town, as the edition would be widely circulated. He moved that space to cost \$21 be taken. The motion was not seconded. Mayor Campbell spoke of the benefit to the town by encouraging tourist traffic, and he thought the C. P. R. telegraph office would be a suitable place for a tourist information bureau.

TO DELAY PURCHASE OF ROAD MACHINE

Council to Await Government Action. --- Installation Purchase of Water Meters. --- Other Business at Special Council Meeting.

At a special meeting of the town council Tuesday evening Mayor Campbell was in the chair and all the councillors present except Couns. Churchill and Kennedy.

The mayor brought up the matter of proposed purchases of road machine, and asked Town Manager Allan for report on interview with members of the government at Fredericton in regard to what action the government intended in respect to assisting towns in building and maintenance of streets. Mr. Allan said the delegation from the Union of N. B. Municipalities had been informed that the government intended to contribute 50 per cent. of the cost of new construction and maintenance of certain streets. Connell Street would not come within this, but Broadway, the Houlton Road and all of Main Street would.

Coun. Johnson moved that amount for road machine be taken out of estimates. not seconded. Town Manager Allan said he had a private interview with Hon. D. A. Stewart, minister of public works, and told him the town was thinking of buying a road machine, but might not want to do so until the government's policy was definitely known.

Mr. Stewart said the machine could be used on other streets. He would not give advice, but was very much in favor of such machines. Coun. Montgomery favored going ahead with the purchase. The machine could be used on other streets. Coun. Smith thought it hardly fair to cut out the appropriation in the absence of chairman of street committee. The matter might be laid over until the legislation was passed, when the government policy would be definitely known. He made a motion to this effect, which was seconded by Coun. Jones and passed.

On motion of Couns. Montgomery and Smith, the poll tax was fixed at \$6.50, the same as last year, after Coun. Montgomery and the Mayor had suggested that there might be a reduction. On motion of Couns. Johnson and Montgomery property owners will be given the privilege of paying for water meters half cash and the other half when paying the first six months' water bill. Coun. Jones thought this was hardly fair, as it should apply to tenants also, but Coun. Smith

pointed out that a tenant could take advantage of the provision by arranging with his landlord.

After some discussion of the advisability of getting a new town scale, for truck weighing, the present scale being for wagons, Town Manager Allan was authorized to send the present scales away to be repaired the Fairbanks-Morse Co.'s estimate of cost of repairs being \$150 to \$200. Coun. Jones suggested that some independent qualified person be got to inspect the scale and report on cost of repairs.

Manager Allan said Mr. Lindsay had informed him that to change the present gooseneck street light fixtures to fixtures for globes would cost \$25 each, or \$2100 for the 85 lights, and 100 c. p. lamps, as now used, would not be strong enough for globes. No action. Manager Allan brought up the matter of tenders for coal. Mr. Dibble's tender, 5 cents lower, had been received after the other tenders had been published, and he wanted instructions as to what action to take. There was some discussion of the mix-up but no action was taken, the council evidently thinking the manager should settle it among his other troubles.

The manager was authorized to pay \$400 of the \$1200 grant for the library immediately. Town Solicitor Hartley advised the manager, in regard to cutting trees in front of properties, that if a tree was dangerous the town had the right to cut it down for public safety. Necessary cutting for fire alarm wires could also be done, but let the Electric Light Telephone and Telegraph Cos. take the responsibility of what cutting they found necessary for their own purposes. After some discussion it was decided that tank be returned to K. F. Dalling and that he pay one-half the cost of moving hydrant and tank. No action was taken in regard to claim of Mr. Strong for \$11.75 for damage to his car caused by a sleigh slide-slipping on the street. Mr. Balmain was given charge of the property book at \$50 for the year. Offer of Donald Munroe to put book of bylaws in good condition and sell it to the town for \$50 was left to full meeting of council.

Report of other business done by the council will be found in other columns.

WOODSTOCK WINS BUT NOT THE TITLE

W. H. S. BEATS SAINT JOHN BUT LATTER WINS THE CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES.

Woodstock High School defeated Saint John High 29-21 in a fast and interesting game of basketball played in the Armoury last Monday evening. This was the second of a home and home series to decide the winner of the New Brunswick championship. Saint John won the first game at Saint John, 51-23, and the series 76-52.

W. H. S. came out with a stern determination to overcome the 31-point lead. Reardon scored three baskets in quick succession. Ferris got a penalty and field throw. Brown sank a penalty, closely followed by Tommy. Reardon and Augherton with field goals. Wilson and Cuthbertson each got a penalty. Saint John were playing open style, but as the locals began to forge ahead they resorted to a defensive game. Tommy scored. Reardon sank two. Ferris and Wilson scored for Saint John with 8 minutes to go. St. John called time out. Ferris scored. Half ended 20-10 with the locals in the long end.

Brown started the second half with a field goal. Ferris scored twice. Tommy and Brown scored. Saint John were playing a strong defensive game. Tommy sank two penalties. Brown was sent to the showers for exceeding his quota of personal fouls. The work of Stevenson, local defence man, all through the game was outstanding. Intercepting passes and holding Ferris down is a pretty stiff job, but Bob worked like a Trojan. Tommy was sent to the showers, being replaced by Gardiner.

All in all it was a fine game. The local team are entitled to much credit for the fighting spirit they showed against big odds. Skinner and Ferris looked the best for Saint John. All the locals played well. The forward line, Reardon, Tommy and Brown tried hard throughout, while Augherton and Stevenson played a stonewall defence game. "Bill" Chandler refereed and called 13 fouls on W. H. S. and 10 on Saint John.

WATER DISCOUNT CAUSES A FLURRY

ANIMATED DISCUSSION IN COUNCIL—ACTION TAKEN—COUN. JOHNSON'S HINT TO MANAGER.

There was an animated discussion at Tuesday evening's special meeting of the town council, over the question of payments of water rates in time to get the discount allowed up to and including the 15th of the month. The matter was brought up by Coun. Johnson, and closed by a remark from him, after Town Manager Allan had made a protest against being imposed upon in regard to office hours, when Coun. Johnson said the manager seemed not to be satisfied, and he knew what he could do,—rather a pointed hint.

Coun. Johnson spoke about the closing of the town office at 5 p. m. on discount days. Some people who had tendered money or checks, less discount, after 5 o'clock, had been refused, and accounts for which checks had been put in the mail that day had not been allowed discount. Coun. Smith said if the money was received that day the discount should be allowed. Town Manager Allan said the rule had been made and should be applied to everybody alike. Coun. Smith thought all money received that day should get the discount, and Town Solicitor Hartley thought a check mailed and postmarked the 15th should get discount. The town needed the money, and checks or money orders received in the first mail next day
