FEDERAL ELECTION CAMPAIGN ENTERING FINAL STAGES

GOVERNMENT PARTY HAS TWO ROUSING RALLIES AT GRAND FALLS, HARTLAND

Meetings are Addressed by Senator Copp, Hon. P. J. Veniot, Albion R. Foster, Hon. W. P. Jones and Others; Candidate Asks for Support on His Record

NEXT MONDAY WILL BE NOMINATION DAY

Both Sides are Holding Organization and Committee Meetings; Officials are Completing Their Preparations for Polling Day.

With the Federal election campaign entering into its final stages both Liberals and Conservatives in Victoria-Carleton have started their public meetings. Rousing meetings were held by the Liberals this week at Grand Falls on Wednesday evening, and at Hartland on Thursday evening. The Grand Falls meeting was addressed by Hon. P. J. Veniot, postmaster-general, Senator A. B. Copp, J. W. Niles, M. L. A., Dr. L. J. Violette, M. L. A., Mayor F. W. Pirie, and Albion R. Foster, M. P., the candidate. Speakers at Hartland were Senator Copp, Hon. W. P. Jones, K. C., and Mr. Foster.

Both sides are holding organization and committee meetings regularly, while the officials are putting the final touches to the preparations for polling day. Nomination Day proceedings will be held next Monday.

At Grand Falls the Postmaster-General, in a fighting speech, dealt with the achievements of the King Government and told of how the Maritime Provinces had benefited in the last few years. He reviewed the record of the Government, told of its taking over the branch railways, relieving the hardships of the Dominion of the burden of operation, and enriching the provincial treasuries to the extent of millions of dollars. Hon. Dr. Veniot also referred to the Duncan Commission.

Mr. Foster dealt with matters pertaining particularly to this portion of the province and asked for the support of the people on his record as their representative, promising to do, as he had done in the past, he said, all he could for the benefit of the people of this part of the country.

Senator Copp took up the various issues in the campaign and compared the platform and policy of the Government and their record of the last few years in office with that of

Charge Against Wiggins to Be Allowed to Drop

The case of Dawson Wiggins, charged before Magistrate Melville, at Florenceville, with selling liquor illegally, has been dropped, owing to lack of evidence. The case, which has been attracting considerable attention, was brought when several young men got in trouble with the Maine authorities, and reported that they got their liquor on the New Brunswick side of the line from Wiggins.

Wiggins was arrested by the provincial police, but when the witnesses were summoned they refused to attend, and the police had no power to make them do so, as they reside in Maine. The charge has therefore been dropped.

HOULTON ROAD MAN DIES SUDDENLY OF HEART DISEASE

Trustees Claim Scholars Should be Going to Hartford School

The Woodstock schools will re-open after the summer holidays on Tuesday September 2, it was decided at a meeting of the Board of School Trustees held in the office of R. P. Hartley on Monday afternoon.

In future if pupils who are inmates of the Municipal Home are to attend school in Woodstock a fee of \$25 each must be paid for their tuition. This decision was reached by the board on information that the home was in the Hartford school district. The secretary was instructed to advise the secretary of the municipality to this effect.

The board adjourned until this evening when it will meet in the town council chamber.

CATTLE PASS TEST

Bathurst, July 16.—For the fourth consecutive year, the Gloucester Lumber and Trading Company's fine herd of Ayrshire cattle at their model farm, West Bathurst, has passed the tuberculosis and blood test. Dr. A. C. Lundie, who conducted the examination, stated that out of the entire herd there was not one reactor.

Their Pastor Asked to Stay By U. Baptists

At a meeting of the official board of the United Baptist Church held here on Wednesday evening it was unanimously decided that the pastor, Rev. A. L. Tedford, be earnestly requested to reconsider his resignation.

Rev. Mr. Tedford tendered his resignation to the congregation several weeks ago, stating that it would take effect during the latter part of the present month. He has been in charge of the church for about two years, succeeding Rev. Mr. McLatchey.

His ministry in Woodstock has been most successful and expressions of regret at its approaching termination were widespread, resulting in the above action being taken by members of the board.

TOWN COUNCIL DECIDES TO GET LEGAL OPINION FROM ATTY.-GENERAL ON MATTER

H. H. McLellan Says Old Building is Serious Conflagration Hazard, Costing Residents in Vicinity Hundreds of Dollars for Extra Insurance.

RIGHT OF TOWN TO PROCEED IS QUESTIONED

Attorney-General to be Queried as to Whether Amendment to Towns Incorporation Act Applies to Woodstock; Other Business is Transacted.

A discussion relative to the demolition of the old Vendome Hotel building occupied most of the time at the meeting of the town council on Friday evening. It was finally decided that the council would get the opinion of the attorney-general and if he considered that it was within their right that they would order the building removed.

H. H. McLellan, Saint John, prov. that he had been trying for seven years to get the building taken down. It constituted a menace to should break out there he doubted he would be able to cope with it. Residents hundreds of dollars a year in extra insurance premiums because of it. He himself had no authority to destroy the building, Mr. McLellan went on, as the owners were resident in the state of Maine which placed them out of his jurisdiction.

An amendment had been passed to the Towns Incorporation Act, he said, which gave town councils the right to order the removal of dangerous buildings. Two years ago Woodstock council had taken steps to have the Vendome structure taken down, but had never completed them. He asked that they either renew the order and have the town manager see to the demolition of the place, or pass a resolution calling on the fire marshal to do so. The latter course would be more expensive, however, than having the town manager attend to the matter.

If the building were removed Mr. McLellan believed that insurance rates in the block would be reduced from ten to twenty per cent. If the council would not act in the matter he disclaimed all further responsibility for anything that might happen.

J. C. Hartley said that the reason the town had not taken the building down two years ago was that a question had been raised as to whether they might not be held liable for damages. The act under which they were asked to proceed was an amendment to the Towns Incorporation Act, whereas Woodstock had been

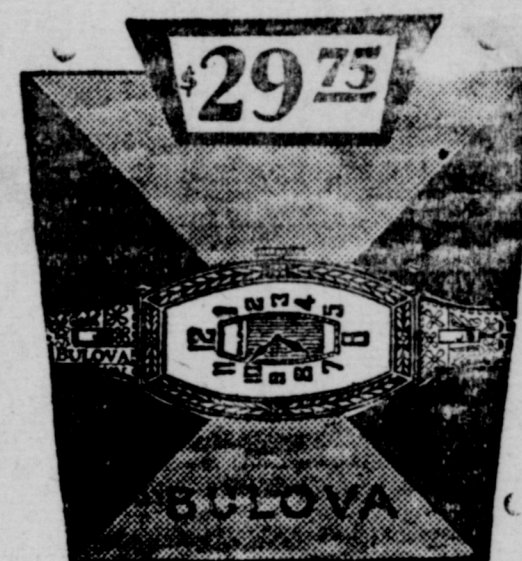
