STRONG OPPOSITION TICKET NAMED IN VICTORIA

Niles and Pirie Are Standard Bearers For Coming Battle

Candidates Are Chosen at Enthusiastic Convention; Hon. W. P. Jones, the Candidates, Hon. J. E. Michaud, Dr. Violette and James Burgess Heard in Addresses.

OPPOSITION CHIEFTAIN HAS BUSY WEEK

Has Already Spoken at Two Meetings, and Will Address Two More; Will be at Albert This Afternoon and at Fredericton Tomorrow.

J. W. Niles, M. L. A. and Fred Pirie, prominent Grand Falls farmer and business man, were nominated as candidates for Victoria county at a largely attended and enthusiastic convention of the Opposition party for the county yesterday afternoon. The ticket is regarded as an exceptionally strong one as both men are well known and possess the confidence of the electors of Victoria county. The convention was addressed by the two candidates, Hon. W. P. Jones, K. C., leader of the Opposition party in New Brunswick, Hon. J. E. Michaud, Dr. Violette and James Burgess.

Mr. Jones was heard in a ringing denunciation of the mismanagement of the Baxter government, their broken pledges, their disastrous handling of Grand Falls and their wasteful plan of hard-surfacing the roads without any definite data to proceed on. Mr. Niles assailed their handling of the revenues and their increase of the public debt and the other speakers also accused the administration of incapable government and mismanagement of the public business intrusted to them.

The week has been a strenuous one for the Opposition chieftain. Mr. Jones spoke on Tuesday at the convention in Hampton. Yesterday he was at Grand Falls. Last night he left for Fredericton en route to the convention for Albert county today, and tomorrow he will address a similar gathering of York county delegates at Fredericton.

R. W. Maxwell was a visitor to Fredericton on Wednesday.

School For Infantry Is Opened Here

A provisional school of Infantry was started in Woodstock Armory on Monday evening. Lectures will be given three nights a week and the course will continue for five weeks. It is being given for the benefit of officers and non commissioned officers who are unable to get away to permanent schools for training. Officers and N. C. O's of the Carleton Light Infantry from A Company, Woodstock, and C Company, Hartland, are in attendance. Sgt. Major Simonds R. C. R., is in charge. Capt. Percy Flynn, of the headquarters staff, M. D. 7, was in Woodstock on Monday in connection with the opening of the school.

Woodstock Troops Ordered to Train

Orders have been issued for the training of all troops in Military District No. 7 at Sussex, starting on June 23 and ending on July 5. The units from the Woodstock garrison which will participate are the Carleton Light Infantry under command of Lt. Col. H. G. Wood, M. C., and the 1st, Brighton Field Company, Canadian Engineers, under Capt. G. M. McPhail. Troops from here will entrain on the morning of June 23. Mobilization of the companies of the Carleton Light Infantry will take place at once.

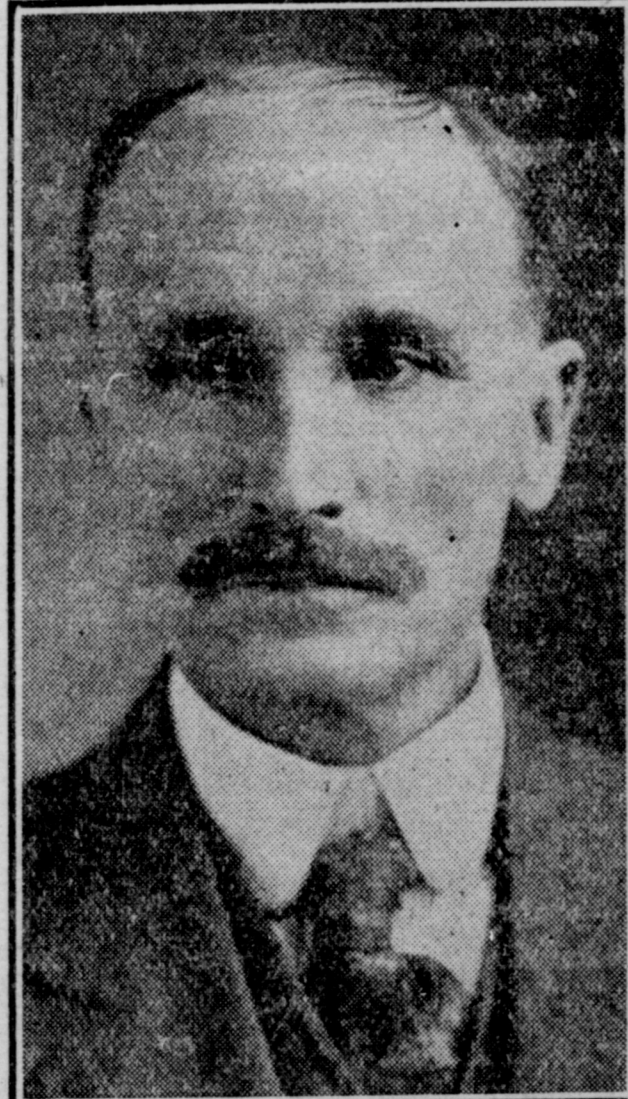

CLERGYMAN IS HEARD IN DENUNCIATION OF PRESENT GOVT. POLICY

Baptist United Pastor Tells Congregation Why He Takes Issue With Baxter Government; Speaker Says He Holds No Brief For Any Party.

A scathing denunciation of the sale of liquor under government control and a stinging criticism of Premier Baxter for violating his word to the temperance people of New Brunswick was delivered by Rev. A. L. Tedford in the United Baptist Church on Sunday evening. Mr. Tedford told his congregation that he held no brief for any party. He had been accused, he said, of entering politics and taking sides with rummies and bootleggers. He wished to make his position clear. He had no intention of going into politics but was supporting the opposition ticket, two of whom had been chosen after they had been recommended by the temperance people and the third member of whom had their approval.

Rev. Mr. Tedford's sermon was as follows:

Hab. 2:15—Woe unto him that giveth his neighbor drink, that puttest thy bottle to him, and makest him drunken also.—This text was spoken over 25 1/2 centuries ago. A clear utterance of Jehovah, with the pronouncement of His curse upon the rum business, and all who join compact to place the bottle before his neighbor. And neighbor in the parable of the good Samaritan covers the vast field of human contacts.

It is a difficult position I find myself in tonight and during this pre-election period lest my attitude and motives be misunderstood. But if I did not take a stand and make a pronouncement upon the present situation it would follow me all the days of my life in lasting shame. It was said of Daniel Webster, that he died of disappointment because he failed to be elected President of the United States, but a deeper disease had settled itself into the great man's soul, for, ever was that day with him when he, false to his ideal, gave his voice to a law against the poor runaway slave, and it ever ate like a canker into his soul.

Some months ago I spoke on the liquor question, upon which address many commented, and it was asked, "What is the remedy?" I will confess at that time I could see no solution. A month ago I could not have given my personal conviction, save in a general way maintaining the principle of prohibition. But a rift has come in the clouds and I am under bond to my convictions concerning a great moral issue.

The problem of my position is greatly increased because the liquor question has always been made a party policy and I do not believe in a clergyman mixing up in the political game, nor will I go into politics and whatever influence I may wield will be for men and measures not for party or fiscal policies, but I will stand for
