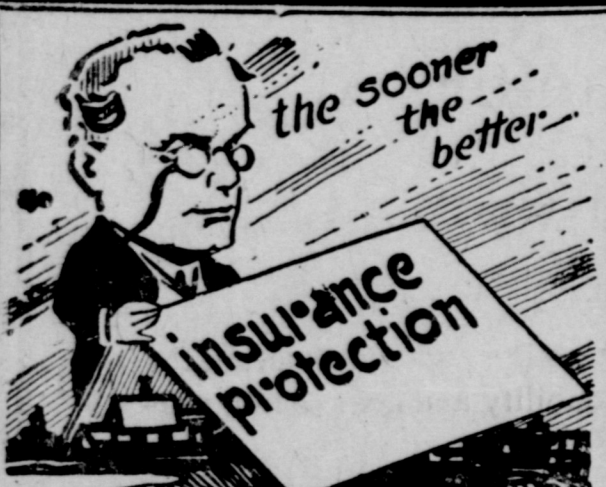

OBITUARY

R. McLAUCHLAN
Donald P. McLauchlan, M.D., a brother of Mr. R. J. McLauchlan, of this town, died at Durant, Mich., on May 7th, in the 82nd year of his age. The late Dr. McLauchlan and his daughter visited Woodstock two years ago. He was a native of King's County. He is survived by one daughter and five sons.

MRS. EUNICE F. CARR
Mrs. Eunice F. Carr, a highly respected resident of Linneus, passed away Sunday morning at the home of her son, Wilmont Estabrook, following a few days' illness. She had attained the advanced age of 86 years and had been a wheel chair invalid during the past three years.

She was the widow of Alexander Carr of Jacksonville, N. B. She had lived at Linneus for the past 22 years and possessed many friends by whom she was esteemed for her sincerity and kindness.

She is survived by two nephews, Wilmont and Alton Estabrooks; also two nieces, Mrs. Harvey Estabrooks of Linneus, and Mrs. Hollis McCready of Houlton. Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at Jacksonville, N. B. Rev. E. C. Jenkins of Hodgdon officiating. Burial was made in the Jacksonville cemetery, beside her late husband.—Houlton Pioneer.

TOWN COUNCIL

The town council met on Friday evening, Coun. Johnston being the only absentee.

Supt. Guthrie of the C. P. R. was heard before the council in regard to alteration in the crossing at Lower Corner. He said the company were now engaged in other places putting in overhead and subway crossings where the traffic was heavy and the expense great. If we put in a subway you would be worse off from a safety standpoint and an overhead would make a very abrupt approach. The trains were running slowly at this point and the company were trying to look to the safety of the public. He asked the Council not to press the matter at this time.

Mr. Willard Hayden appeared before the Council in regard to his taxes. He said the mill was assessed at \$14,000 which he thought was excessive in view of the fact that it was only running about two months in the year. There was a great depression in the lumber business all over Canada and it was felt here. He was trying to put the company on a paying basis and thought he should have some relief. The estate owned a piece of land near the mill which was assessed at \$700,000 and which they would like to dispose of.

Mr. George B. King, a representative of the Junkens Aircraft Company, gave a short address to the Council. He said he came up from Saint John with the intention of looking over the chances for establishing an airport. He was taken up by Mr. Joseph Folkins and out to the Hammond farm at Jacksonville, which he thought would be an ideal spot for an airport. The present landing at Island Park was large enough for small planes but inadequate for the larger airships. Mr. King said he intended coming to Woodstock in June on wheels and later on pontoons. He is an experienced aviator and has travelled in many parts of the world including Russia and Germany.

Mr. Folkins said the present site located for an airport was an ideal one as soon as sufficient work is put on it.

The Town Manager reported that

it would cost between \$400 and \$500 to connect the Wright residence with the water main. He thought it would be less expensive to put in a well. He also reported that the Velvet Ice Cream Co. intend putting on steel shingles on their new ice house at once.

The Finance Committee and a committee from the Agricultural Society met on Friday and decided to redeem the old bonds at maturity and to re-issue the new bonds.

Touching on the question of taxes His Worship said the Council should have a fixed rate of taxation for industries according to valuation and amount of business done. If the Council made a special dispensation for the Woodworking Co. we would establish a precedent which others would take advantage of. A scheme would have to be devised and submitted to the Legislature, which would also cover new industries.

Coun. Dewitt thought that some consideration should be given to the Hayden estate.

Coun. Jones moved that a committee be appointed to look into the matter of adjusting the tax rate, in conjunction with the industries and bring in a recommendation covering same. Carried.

Coun. Jones moved that the Police Committee and Town Manager be authorized to draw up a by-law in regard to the stop signs on the streets. Carried.

The Town Manager was requested to see the building committee of the County Council to get permission for the band to give their weekly concerts on the Court House lawn.

The Town Manager said that Chief Kelly was making out a list of dog owners preparatory to putting into operation the new dog law.

Harry Faulkner, who purchased the lower corner fire hall for the magnificent sum of \$400.00 has presented the Council with a bill for \$15 per month storage on the old horse cart which the Council failed to remove when the sale was made five months ago. The Council thought the bill was rather steep and held it over for further consideration.

Council adjourned.
