Big Airship Is Welcomed At Montreal

R 100 COMPLETES TRANS-ATLANTIC FLIGHT FROM CARDINGTON, ENGLAND

Montreal Aug. 1.—Winging her stately way westward from her aerodrome at Cardington, England, The British dirigible R 100 arrived over Montreal last evening but did not land until this morning on account of poor weather. It was the first air flight ever made between Europe and the St. Lawrence Valley. The huge airship found this city en fête in honor of her arrival. All last evening eager, laughing crowds thronged the streets, waiting to catch a glimpse of the dirigible, and as it became known that she was in the vicinity a dense mass of humanity packed itself around the landing field.

Radio reports kept Montreal and the rest of the country advised of the position of Captain Ralph Booth, her young commander, and his precious freight of lives, all through the day, and all preparations for her reception had been completed at St. Hubert's Field hours before her arrival.

At 10.30 on Thursday the R 100 was about 250 miles east of Quebec. Shortly before that she had passed over the C. P. R. liner Empress of France about 50 miles further east. The flight took slightly under three days, the dirigible having left Cardington at 9.45 p. m. Eastern Standard Time on Monday.

N. B. Will Have Open Season On Partridge

There will be an open season on partridge in New Brunswick this year according to a statement issued by the Department of Lands and Mines. The open season will start on October 1 and end October 15. The bag allowed each hunter is a maximum of six per day or twenty for the season. Non residents desiring to hunt partridge must take out a license at \$25 unless they are holders of a Moose and deer license. Residents who are not holders of moose and deer licenses must take out a license costing one dollar. The number of birds killed must be reported to the chief game warden not later than December 10, on penalty of fine imprisonment or both.

CONSERVATIVES GAIN FOUR SEATS IN MARITIME PROVINCES AND CUT DEEPLY INTO FORMER LIBERAL BLOC IN QUEBEC BUT MAKE LITTLE PROGRESS IN ONTARIO AND LOSE IN B. C.

Will Have 138 Seats in Commons as Compared with 86 for Liberals and 20 for All Other Parties With Results in One Constituency Still Doubtful; B. F. Smith Elected in Carleton-Victoria.

H. N. P. J. VENIOT ONLY LIBERAL WINNER IN NEW BRUNSWICK

Province Returns Ten Conservatives; Two Ministers are Successful and One is Defeated in Maritimes; Surprises Sprung in Kent and Madawaska-Restigouche; One Liberal Gain in Nova Scotia; Both Leaders Elected.

The general election on Monday netted, who will go into the next parties is: Conservatives 138, Labor 3, Independent 2, with one Liberal majority, although deficits in the Liberal bloc in Quebec. McLean, held here on Saturday, evidenced the deep sorrow in her death and the high regard in which she had been held. Many came from long distances to pay a last tribute of respect. The funeral service was held in the United Church at Bristol and was conducted by Rev. M. H. Manuel, of Marysville, assisted by Rev. Mr. Rockingham, of Black's Harbor; Rev. Mr. Howe, of Bristol; Rev. 2 Lives Lost By Drowning Wednesday

ANTOINE BELANGER LOSES LIFE AT EDMUNDSTON; HELEN MCWAIDE AT COLDSTREAM

Two drowning accidents occurred on Wednesday, Antoine Belanger, son of Canadian Immigration Inspector Belanger losing his life at Edmundston, and Helen, ten year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roy McWaide, Central Falls, R. I., perishing at Coldstream. Both bodies were recovered shortly after the accidents happened.

With several companions, Belanger was diving off a boom of logs about 60 feet from the shore. A deep bruise noticed on the head when the body was recovered indicated that he had struck a submerged log or other obstruction in diving. He came up once after diving and called for help. Two companions rushed to the spot and caught him by the head, but he sank and did not come up again.

The pulmotor was rushed from the Fraser Companies, Ltd., mill and Dr. Sormany, Dr. Lockhart and Chief of Police Savage, of Edmundston, called. They worked over the body for two hours but their efforts to revive the young man were in vain.

Belanger is survived by his parents and several brothers and sisters. The little McWaide girl was drowned while bathing here only a few rods from the residence of her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Enoch Estabrooks, with whom the McWaide family are visiting. The death of the little girl has greatly shocked the whole community.

Helen was the eldest daughter and when she had been given permission to go in bathing she was accompanied to the shore by her younger sister, aged five, who remained on the bank. The little tot returned to the house to say that Helen was under the water. The alarmed mother rushed to the assistance of the child and with the help of friends endeavored to rescue the little girl after she had been brought to the shore. Medical help was also called but proved of no avail.
