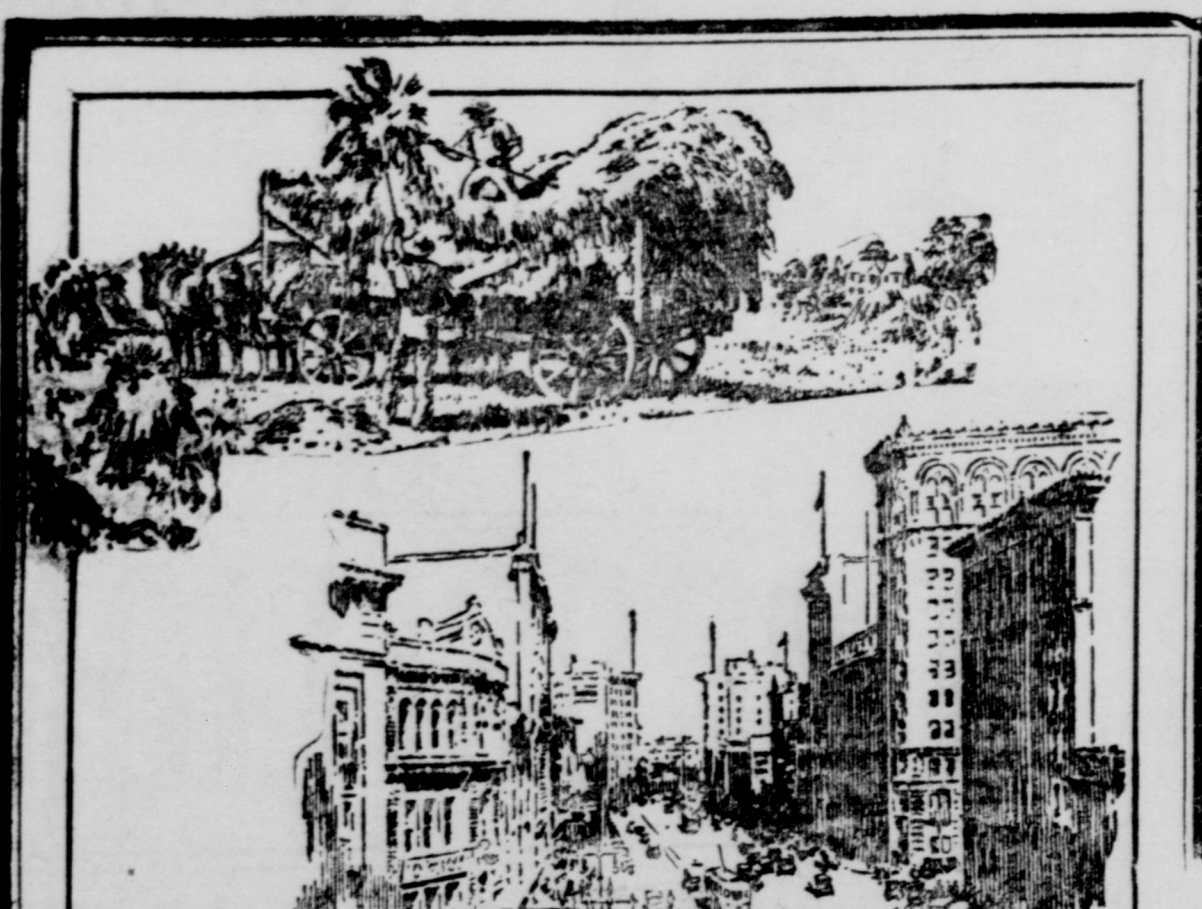

GASOLINE TAX REBATE

A tax of 5c. per gallon is imposed on every gallon of gasoline sold in the Province. If this gasoline is used for any purpose other than in a Motor Vehicle on the Public Highway the tax is rebated to the purchaser on receipt of application made under affidavit on approved form accompanied by receipted invoice from the party from whom Gasoline was bought.

Amendments were passed this year as follows:

"After May 31st, 1930, no claim for rebates will be considered in respect of gasoline purchased prior to November 1st, 1929.

"Any claim for rebate must be submitted within two months after the end of the fiscal year in which purchase was made."

In other words rebates on gasoline purchased prior to November 1st, 1929, must be applied for before May 31st, 1930, and rebates on gasoline purchased in the fiscal year commencing November 1st, 1929, and ending October 31st, 1930, must be applied for before December 31st, 1930.

Users of gasoline are requested to carefully read these Amendments and govern themselves accordingly.

Changes in Staff Are Announced by Bank of Montreal

MARITIME SUPERINTENDENT IS RETIRING AFTER HALF CENTURY OF SERVICE

Halifax, April 21.—A. E. Nash, of Halifax, Superintendent of Maritime Branches of the Bank of Montreal, is retiring from the service of the Bank in July and going on pension after an active banking career of close upon half a century. Mr. Nash joined the staff of the Bank in Ottawa 48 years ago, and in later years served as Assistant Manager of the branch at St. John's, Nfld., and Manager at Sydney, C. B., and Quebec. He came to Halifax in 1914 as Manager of the Bank's office here, and was promoted in 1922 to the position he is now vacating.

Edward Pope, the present Manager of the Halifax office, will succeed him as Superintendent for the Maritime Provinces, and at the same time retain his position as local manager. Mr. Pope is a son of the late Sir Joseph Pope, former Secretary for External Affairs, Ottawa, and a grandson of the late Hon. W. H. Pope, of Charlottetown, one of the Fathers of Confederation. He is also a grand-nephew of Premier L. A. Taschereau of Quebec. Mr. Pope was born in Ottawa, and he entered the service of the Bank of Montreal in 1905. He became accountant of the Kelowna branch in 1910, and later was assistant to the Chief Accountant at Head Office in Montreal. In 1918 he was appointed Accountant at the Ottawa branch, and a year later, when the Bank opened its office in Paris, France, Mr. Pope was transferred to that office as Assistant Manager. He returned to Canada three years later as Manager of the St. Roch branch in Quebec, and held that position from 1922 until 1929, when he came to Halifax as Manager.

The appointment is also announced of C. D. Hart as Inspector in the Maritime Division with headquarters in Halifax. Mr. Hart, who was born in Campbelltown, Scotland came to Canada in 1909 and for a period of seven years was employed at various points throughout Canada. In 1916 he enlisted for overseas service and upon his return in 1919 served at several points in Western Canada. In 1926 he was appointed Manager of the Drumbo, Ont. branch after which he was also Manager of the Thamesville office. He was appointed as Inspector with headquarters at Montreal just a year ago. Mr. Hart will take up his new duties in Halifax in the immediate future.

RE-INSERT PENALTY COMMONS

London.—The House of Lords, by a vote of 45 to 12 reinserted a clause providing the death penalty for cowardice and desertion in the Army bill. The House of Commons early this month approved a Labor amendment in the bill abolishing the death penalty for desertion on active service and cowardice in certain cases.

The bill will be returned to the Commons for consideration of the Lords' amendment. The House met Thursday to receive the bill.

Mr. Teed Explains Liquor Purchase

SAYS BUYING OF QUANTITY OF WINE AT FREDERICTON WAS LEGAL

Recent reports from Minto were to the effect that a mercantile firm of that community had purchased under special permit a truckload of liquor at the N. B. Liquor Control Board store at Fredericton for consumption by their customers. The reports arose as the result of a drunken brawl in the home of John Boyce at Avon, on Thursday. Boyce was fined \$50 by Magistrate Daniel Palmer in the South Minto court the following day. William Williams was fined \$8 and two others, Joseph Lawrence and Rollie Robinson, were sent to the Gagetown jail for one month.

It was first reported that action would be taken by the authorities against the mercantile firm, Paul Brothers, but, as developments show, no action will be taken.

No special permit, as reported, was issued. The Telegraph-Journal found out last night over the long distance telephone from Woodstock, when talking with E. R. Teed, a member of the Liquor Control Board.

Mr. Teed said an order for 12 gallons of wine was telephoned to his office at Fredericton recently from Minto, but he refused to ship this quantity to one person. He was told that the wine was for 12 different families but he informed the party that it made no difference, they must come to Fredericton for it. He sent one gallon to the Minto party ordering. Later, as it developed, one party came to Fredericton with a written request from each of the families wanting the wine and the amount was given to him, in this case, the party making the purchase acted as a messenger for the other families.

This is perfectly legal under the Liquor Act, Mr. Teed said. The party making the purchase was paid by the families concerned for the amount of wine purchased for them and did not purchase it to sell it again later, to anybody who happened to want it.—Saint John Telegraph-Journal, April 21.—Editor's Note.

Editors note—The Minto district has been a source of some worry to the Liquor Commission. In the first place vigorous protests were received

from residents of the district against establishing a store there on account of the great numbers of foreign laborers employed in the vicinity. When a store was finally opened it had only been in operation a short time before it was destroyed by fire. A second store was opened but again fire broke out and the building was burned to the ground. A chimney was left standing in the ruins and when a commission employee was making ready to clear the site after the fire this fell and killed him.

Altogether the functions of the Liquor Commission in that locality have not been very pleasant reading.)

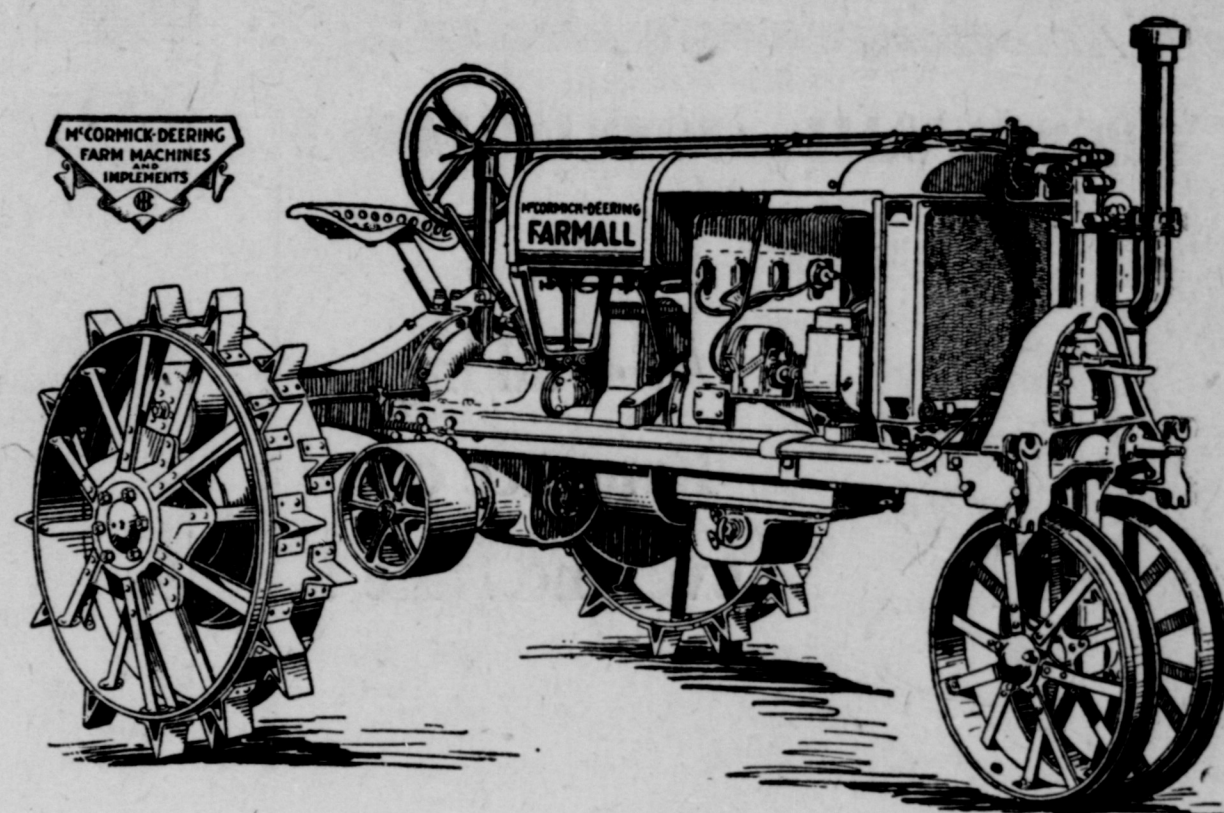
