PROVINCIAL ELECTION CAMPAIGN GATHERS SPEED

PEOPLE CALLING FOR GOVERNMENT TO SELECT DATE

Feeling of Resentment at Delay
is Becoming General

OPPOSITION CHANCES KEEP GETTING BETTER

Government is Making Strong
Bid to Secure Madawaska
Vote.

The election campaign is gathering speed as the days go by and prospects for the return to power of the Opposition party are daily growing brighter. The failure of the government to set a date for the election is being generally resented even by those who are more or less favorable to their interests. The feeling is general that it is up to Mr. Baxter and his associates to put an end to the uncertainty by stating the time which they will hold the election. It is felt that they have clung to office as long as the law of the land allows them and that now they are putting off from day to day the reckoning which they know must eventually come.

Meantime both parties have their tickets in the field in most of the counties, and those in which nominations have not yet taken place intend holding their conventions within the next ten days the majority of them within the next week.

The northern part of the province is reported to be solidly favoring the Opposition while substantial gains for them are being confidently predicted for the southern part of the province and the Saint John river valley.

Teachers Seeking Positions In Woodstock High School Must Hold Degree Board Rules

Teachers appointed to teach in Woodstock High School from now on must hold a degree equal at least to that of Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science. This decision was reached at a meeting of the Board of School Trustees held on Friday evening. The matter was brought up by Arthur L. Slipp who said that he considered some of the teachers who had been employed in the schools had not been qualified to perform their duties properly. He therefore moved that in future no applicants having less than a B. A. degree should be considered for positions in the high school.

At the suggestion of Mrs. G. C. Campbell Mr. Slipp changed his motion to include the B. Sc. degree. The motion was then passed practically without discussion.

FIRE STARTED AND OTHER DAMAGE DONE IN WOODSTOCK BY VIOLENT ELECTRICAL STORM ON SATURDAY

Residence of Herbert Brewer is Struck and Damaged; Fire Alarm and Telephone Systems are Disarranged; Firemen Have Difficult Time.

Several houses were struck by lightning, one fire started and considerable other damage done by a short but violent electric storm which passed over Woodstock on Saturday afternoon. Several narrow escapes from death or serious injury were reported. During the height of the storm a bolt struck the roof of the residence of Herbert Brewer, Queen street south, and set it afire.

The same bolt followed the wires into the residence of J. Fred

Sanborn next door and tore a telephone from the wall and knocked the plaster off the ceiling of one of the rooms. It also snapped the wires leading into the home of Mayor G. C. Campbell and blew out the fuses in the house of Harry King.

The lightning put the fire alarm system out of commission and threw out the entire telephone system on the Broadway side of the town, several days being necessary

BOARD OF TRADE APPROVES CHANGE ON VALLEY LINE

RESOLUTION O.K.'S TRI-WEEKLY SERVICE; WANT TO SEE AIRSHIP

The Woodstock Board of Trade is satisfied with the tri-weekly service between Centreville and Fredericton on the Valley Railway according to a resolution passed by that body, at a meeting in the town council chamber last evening. Copies of the resolution were directed sent to the Canadian National Railways and other interested parties.

It was decided to ask the Dominion Government to have the dirigible R 100 fly down the Saint John river valley passing over the principal towns on its return flight to England. It was suggested that if this route could be followed that school pupils be let out early to see the airship.

The matter of the suggested National Park site at Mount Carleton near the Victoria-Restigouche boundary was also discussed.

ACCIDENT VICTIM ON HOULTON ROAD DIES AT HIS HOME

Steps From Behind Grader Into
Path of Passing Car.

LEG IS FRACTURED AND RIBS BROKEN

Injured Man Taken Home and
Dies Early on Tuesday
Morning.

Odbur Sharpe, aged resident of the Houlton road, died early Tuesday morning at his home as a result of injuries received when he was struck by a motor truck the previous day. The unfortunate man was working on the road about three miles from Woodstock at the time of the accident. He stepped out from behind a grader at the moment that a truck driven by George Ransom was passing. The truck according to eyewitnesses was going at a moderate rate of speed when Mr. Sharpe walked right into its path and was struck and knocked down.

Dr. J. F. L. Brown was hurriedly summoned and the victim removed to his home. Examination showed that in addition to a broken leg several ribs were fractured and other injuries sustained. Owing to his advanced age it was feared from the first that he would not recover and death came shortly after the following midnight. He leaves no immediate relatives.
