

Contracts For 5 Bridges Given

NEW STRUCTURES AT MEDUCTIC AND BIG SHIKTAHAWK ARE INCLUDED

Fredericton, N. B., May 16.—Five contracts for construction coming under the supervision of the bridge division of the New Brunswick Department of Public Works were awarded today by Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works.

The largest of the five contracts is that for construction of the Big Shiktahawk River (Mouth) Bridge on Trans-Canada Highway (No. 2) in parish of Kent, Carleton County, which goes to Frank L. Boone, Devon, at approximately \$35,000.

Included in the list are the sub-structures for two new twin bridges of modern type to be erected on two of New Brunswick's scenic highways. One will be the sub-structure for the new Eel River (Mouth) Bridge on Trans-Canada highway (No. 2) in parish of Canterbury,

York County, which will consist of four concrete piers two of which are to be on pile foundations, and two concrete U. abutments with earth and stone embankment approaches thereto. This sub-structure will support steel spans with the roadway 65 feet above the bed of the stream and the contract has been awarded to Smith & Williamson, Saint John, at approximately \$18,000. The mate to this structure will be the Stoney Creek bridge on Highway No. 14, Parish of Coverdale, Albert County, the sub-structure of which will carry the five steel spans 72 feet above the bed of the stream; that contract has been awarded to Whitman Brewer, of Devon, at \$15,000.

The other two contracts awarded

are for concrete arch culverts with roadway embankments, one being at Grand Bay on Trans-Canada Highway (No. 2) in parish of Westfield, Kings County which goes to Smith & Williamson, Saint John, at approximately \$5,500, and the other being Knox Concrete Arch Culvert and Roadway Embankment on No. 9 Highway, parish of Sheffield, Sunbury County, which was awarded to Douglass & Wood, Fredericton, at approximately \$6,500.

Important improvements in the alignment of highways and general motoring conditions will result from the construction of the five new bridges provided for in these contracts.

NEW USE FOR WHEAT

With the present uncertainty which prevails in the wheat market the Dominion Department of Agriculture finds that farmers are paying more attention to the marketing of grain crops through live stock. Some important and interesting results have come to light, and not the least interesting is the experience of an Alberta farmer who had a light crop which he could not sell at the elevator. He had a flock of poultry and started feeding the wheat to them and marketing it in the form of eggs through the local egg pool. When the winter was over he figured up his costs and found that he had sold the wheat thus fed at an average price of \$5 per bushel. Another western farmer with a modest flock of 150 birds kept his family through out the winter on the income from the eggs, and he states that his gross income for the winter from the flock averaged \$200 per month.

Opposition Has Strong Ticket In York County

MESSRS. CLARK, STAIRS, FOLKINS AND DURLING ARE NOMINATED BY CONVENTION

Fredericton, May 18.—Opposition candidates for York county in the provincial election will be Mayor W. G. Clark, of Fredericton; Ernest Stairs, of Southampton; Dr. G. C. Folkins, of Stanley, and Stewart Durling, of Canterbury. They were nominated yesterday at the Opposition party, held here in the court house, and attended by delegates from every parish of the constituency. The rally was a large one. W. P. Jones, K. C., of Woodstock, leader of the party, was the principal speaker. He made a sweeping attack on the Baxter Government and its policies, and pictured Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works, as "a ruthless monarch with the power to collect the people's money and do what he liked with it."

"David Stewart is a czar now," he declared, "but you know what happened to the czar. The same thing is going to happen to Mr. Stewart, but we need not execute him. We will just remove him from office, gently, but firmly." When he made this charge against the Minister of Public Works, Mr. Jones was condemning the \$10,000,000 hard surface road program for which a bill of authorization was passed in the dying hours of the last House session.

McColl-FRONTENAC EARNINGS ADVANCE

The annual report of McColl-Frontenac Oil Company, Ltd., issued last week, showed common share earnings of \$2.12 as compared with \$1.41 during the previous year. The report showed increased profits, improved liquid surplus. Net earnings from operations, together with income from investments for the year ended January 31, 1930, totalled \$2,171,294, as compared with \$1,622,611, reported in the previous annual report which covered thirteen months. Surplus account was shown at \$770,461, compared with \$603,187 in the previous report. Working capital of \$4,648,541 indicated a wide increase over the figure of \$1,876,318 in the previous report.

King Makes His Reply to Critics

SETS FORTH ATTITUDE OF ADMINISTRATION TOWARD PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENTS

Ottawa, May 19.—In a statement issued tonight, Prime Minister Mackenzie King sets forth his own attitude and that of his Government toward the provinces. The Prime Minister's statement came in reply to declarations by Premier G. H. Ferguson, of Ontario, from the platform of the Western Ontario Conservative convention, at London. Mr. Ferguson was reported as saying that the Ontario Government proposed to throw its weight into the election campaign against the Federal Government forces, because of Mr. King's "five-cent piece" statement in Parliament.

The Prime Minister summarizes his attitude and that of the Federal Government towards the provinces, in his final paragraph, as follows: "In order that there may be no further misrepresentation of my attitude, or that of the present administration towards the Governments of any of the provinces, whether they be Conservative, Progressive or Liberal, may I say that so long as I continue to occupy the position which I now hold, my own attitude and that of the administration towards the provinces of our Dominion will continue to be in the future what it has been right along, namely, one of an honest endeavor to avoid and to remove all possible sources of controversy between the provincial and federal Governments, and in financial matters to be scrupulously fair, and insofar as the public interest may permit, generous, in the treatment alike of one and all, wholly regardless of the political complexion of the particular administration in office in any of the provinces."

Mr. King asserts that he cannot give his attention to Parliament, which is still in session, and conduct a campaign outside, or he would be glad to reply to Mr. Ferguson from the public platform.

The Prime Minister declared that his statements in the House of Commons had relation exclusively to "a then existing situation, and was not to be understood or interpreted as having any other possible application."

AUTOMOBILE RACES ARE CONCLUDED

Paris, May 19.—A Hudson Great Eight Roadster and a New Essex Challenger Roadster were awarded highest honors at the completion of the nine day Tour de France, most celebrated and gruelling of the annual automobile tests staged on the continent.

The Hudson Roadster won the gold medal and the coveted Ansaldo Trophy, giving the Hudson Motor Car Company possession for the second year in succession. In addition to these first prizes, the Hudson and Essex also won the Lunlop and Spido Cups offered the two leading cars manufactured by the same company.

In each case, the Hudson and Essex survived the tests without a single penalization, the second successive year they have done this in the tour.

The Tour de France, consists of a nine day run of approximately 310 miles per day, with intermediate days in the various French provinces devoted to speed contests, hill climbs, starts with cold motors, brake tests, acceleration tests and other events designed to bring out the full qualities of the cars. The Gold Medal is awarded the car finishing all of these tests with the fewest penalizations.

The Ansaldo Trophy, declared to be one of the most beautiful trophies offered the automotive industry, is awarded to the winning car in the starting from cold motor, braking and hill climbing tests.

This year 87 cars from every country started the long grind, the largest number of entries in the long history of the race. Thousands of spectators were assembled at every control point to cheer the contestants according to the cable.

The conditions were more severe than in any previous year and most of the run was staged through heavy rains and fog.

Andre Morel drove the Hudson to victory, with Colas, a Hudson Essex dealer from Lyons, piloting the Essex Challenger.
