WOODSTOCK EXHIBITION OPENS ON MONDAY NIGHT

Freedom From Fire Alarms During Past Summer Sets New Record in Woodstock

Only One Outbreak in Two Months and No Night Alarms in Seventeen Weeks; I. C. Churchill Gets Vendome Contract; A. E. Jones Threatens Action Against Town.

Woodstock has been free from alarms of fire during the past summer than for any similar period in its history, according to a report submitted to the council by G. M. McPhail, town manager, at the meeting on Tuesday evening. During the last month there were no alarms of any kind, there has only been one alarm in the last two months, and there have been no night calls to the department for seventeen weeks. During August there 18 arrests, 11 for drunkenness, six for speeding, one for assault, and one for theft.

Tenders were opened for the demolition of the Vendome hotel building, and the contract awarded to I. C. Churchill, who offered to pay the town \$50 for the privilege of removing the building and keeping the material. Mr. Churchill's tender was exactly the same as that of John Lenehan and the decision between the two was made by flipping a coin. Other tenders were: Elijah Bragdon, who offered \$25, A. W. Bragdon and Asa Bragdon, who offered \$25, Fred M. Moore, who offered to tear the building down for the material and W. D. Steeves who asked payment of \$50.

Releases were produced from Beatrice Palmer and Bertha Walker, the owners, allowing the town to proceed with the work without any claim from them.

The matter of payments in arrears under the town housing scheme was brought up. It was reported by the town manager that payments were now being made and it was decided to let the matter stand, with the understanding that foreclosure proceedings would be taken against any of the property holders who failed to carry out their agreement.

A letter was read from the legal firm of Jones & Jones alleging that a retaining wall owned by the town at the end of the bridge across the

WOODSTOCK AND ORONO SPLIT IN DOUBLE HEADER

HOME TEAM DROPS FIRST
GAME 7-3, BUT WINS

The Woodstock baseball team split a double header with Orono, Me., nine at the Island Park diamond on Monday, losing the afternoon contest 7 to 3, but pulling out a victory in the evening game, which went the full nine innings, by a score of 4 to 3.

The home team put up a good battle in the first encounter until the ninth when they went into the air and indulged in a comedy of errors which allowed their opponents to break a 2 to 3 tie by pushing four runs across the pan, enough to give them the decision by a comfortable margin.

Blair pitched for the losing team and performed very creditably, shaky support being responsible for his defeat, his team making no less than seven errors behind him. A lengthy blond answering to the name of Bragley was on the mound for the winners. He had all kinds

POTATO MARKET CONTINUES DULL DURING LAST WEEK

DEMAND IS SLACK AND WEATHER CONDITIONS UNFAVORABLE; NOT MUCH HAULING

The potato market continued dull during the last week, 90 cents a barrel being the prevailing price with a few sales ranging as high as \$1. Loading in the Woodstock area was not at all brisk, and at present shipments are averaging only six or seven carloads a week. There was some demand both from Cuba and Upper Canadian points, but not enough to cause any great rush of orders, and the shipping season is considerably behind last year at this time.

Weather has been very unfavorable and serious loss is feared unless cool weather arrives. The last two weeks have been mostly fine and very hot. Heavy showers on Wednesday, followed by more hot weather made the situation worse and already a considerable amount of rot has been reported. The temperature was much cooler yesterday and it is thought that more cool weather is in prospect.

Meantime there is not much hauling, farmers being busy with harvesting other crops, and most of them disposed to wait and see if prices will go higher.

SHIPPERS WILL ASK REDUCTION IN FREIGHT RATES

DELEGATION WILL WAIT ON
MEETING OF GOVERNMENT
AT FREDERICTON

Perth, N. B., Sept. 3.—Desiring immediate action, the Associated Potato Shippers of New Brunswick, who met at Florenceville yesterday, will send a delegation before the next meeting of the Provincial Government, which may be held at Fredericton the latter part of next week, in an attempt to have them take some steps to ensure lower freight rates on potato shipments from New Brunswick. It was announced here to night by J. E. Porter, of Perth, secretary of the organization.

Invitations to have representatives present at the meeting with the Government will be extended to potato growers and shippers in various parts of the province, and also to Prince Edward Island men interested in the potato industry.

NUMBER ENROLLED IN NINTH GRADE BREAKS RECORD

64 ALREADY IN ATTENDANCE, PRINCIPAL REPORTS; OTHER MATTERS DISCUSSED

Enrolment in Grade 9 in Woodstock High School is the largest on record, Principal F. E. MacDiarmid told the Board of School Trustees at a special meeting held in the Fisher Memorial School last evening. There are 64 pupils already in attendance. In the town of Woodstock 43 scholars were successful in their entrance examinations and every one of these is now enrolled. Of those who wrote the papers unsuccessfully all are taking the Grade 8 work again except one. After some discussion the trustees decided that it would be impracticable to divide the class and it was decided that it should remain under one teacher.

The board were advised that Miss Jessie Samphier had been engaged as a substitute teacher in the Broadway school, owing to one of the regular teachers being unable to take her work on account of illness. The trustees directed that a contract be entered into with Miss Samphier for the present term.

It was decided to close the schools at 12 o'clock next Tuesday, which is children's day at the Woodstock Exhibition, in order to give the pupils chance to attend the fair.

Several matters of routine business were dealt with including the passing of a bill of \$450 from Enoch Steeves for constructing a new chimney in the Broadway school.

L. Atherton, chairman of the board, presided. Others present were: J. H. DeWitt, A. L. Slipp, Mrs. G. C. Campbell, H. G. Noble, F. C. Squires, R. P. Hartley, F. E. MacDiarmid and Byron Carr.

Opening Ceremony Is Scheduled For Early in Evening

Cattle Entries Exceed All Records and Officials are Compelled to Refuse Some Herds; Space in Main Building is at a Premium; Big Crowd Expected.

The Woodstock Exhibition will be officially opened on Monday evening at 7.30. Prior to the opening ceremonies the gates will be opened at 6 p. m., and at 7 o'clock the band will parade from the post office to the exhibition grounds. The big fair will then be declared formally under way. There will be a fireworks display at 9 followed by dancing. For the last few days the main building and the surrounding grounds have hummed with activity as the various exhibitors prepared their offerings for display to the public. The exhibits will be more numerous and varied than ever before. All booths in the main building have been taken and space in other departments has not been sufficient to meet the demands made upon it.

The number of cattle entered has smashed all records. Entries were received in the order that they arrived and all accommodation was booked several days ago. It was found necessary to refuse the entries of several exhibitors for lack of space, including the famous McIntyre herd from Sussex.

Opening on Monday night the fair will continue for four nights and three days. There will be horse racing and airplane stunts every afternoon, vaudeville every afternoon and dancing and fireworks each evening.

The main building is gay with flags and bunting and presents a most attractive appearance. In the centre are the automobile and agricultural displays. On the corner near the side entrance is the booth of the Vocational School. Next is the display of the Maritime Tuberculosis Educational Committee, then a double booth of the Woodstock Woodworking Co. Exhibits of the Progressive Leather Goods Co., Beatty Bros., and J. Clark & Son, come next, after which is a large end booth sponsored by the Carleton County Branch of the Fish and Game Protective Association. Other exhibitors on the lower floor are Creighton & Ridley, T. W. Billington, Jones Music Co., Manzer's, E. H. Burt, Stewart & Stewart, R. E. Holyoke, Woodstock Creamery and George W. Gibson.

Upstairs are Provincial Women's Institute, Harvey Studio, Woodstock Electric Co., LaF. N. Rogers Co. and Dominion Department of Agriculture.
