C. P. R. BEGINS LARGE SCALE BALLASTING OPERATIONS

OPERATION GIVES WORK TO 200 MEN

JOB STARTS NEAR GRAND FALLS
AND WILL EXTEND 20
MILES

Large scale ballasting work on the Woodstock division was begun by the Canadian Pacific Railway on Tuesday. The work is a part of the railway maintenance program, but would ordinarily not have been undertaken until a later date. W. C. Guthrie, superintendent of the division announced. It was begun at the present time as the railway wished to co-operate in reducing unemployment. In all 220 men are at work. Mr. Guthrie left yesterday to look the operation over.

Ballasting was begun at a point south of Grand Falls and if weather conditions permit will be continued for about 20 miles, six to eight weeks being required. Preference in employment is being given to men who live along the division.

Traffic on this division continues normal, Mr. Guthrie stated, in spite of the movement of potatoes being slower than last year.

POLICE WILL WAGE WAR ON RECKLESS CAR OPERATORS

WILL ASK LICENSES CANCELLED
IN FUTURE CASES; AGED
MAN INJURED.

A campaign against reckless motorists has been begun by the provincial police here, who have announced that in future they will press to have licenses cancelled in all cases where wanton disregard of the rights of others is shown. The announcement was made after Fred Cronkhite, an elderly one-armed man, had been brought to the Fisher Memorial Hospital suffering from a broken nose and severe bruises and shock after having been run down by a hit and run driver.

Cronkhite was working on the road near Waterville with a hand rake on Saturday morning. It is thought that a car struck the rake which dragged him with it from the force of the impact, but he was not able to tell exactly what happened. Old Queen Hotel Stables Are Destroyed By Flames

PAVING WORK WILL START IN FEW DAYS COUNCIL IS TOLD

8000 GALLONS TO BE SPREAD;
OTHER BUSINESS IS
TRANSACTED

Work of paving part of Main street, Lower Main street and Broadway with an asphalt emulsion known as colas will start late this week it was announced at a meeting of the town council held in the council chamber on Monday evening. As the streets are all part of the main trunk roads system the provincial government, will bear 50 per cent of the cost. 8000 gallons of the colas will be spread, just as large a surface being covered as the amount of material will allow.

Town manager G. M. McPhail reported seven alarms of fire during September and 2200 feet of hose used. There were 16 arrests for drunkenness, three for vagrancy, two for creating a disturbance and three on theft charges. 12 protectionists were sheltered.

It was reported to council that the demolition of the Vendome hotel had been completed in a satisfactory manner by the contractor, T. C. Churchill; also that the hill near Dunbar's foundry had been ditched and levelled and other routine street work done.

A report was received from the investigation into the alleged interference of a town retaining wall with a building owned by A. E. Jones, that Mr. Jones' claim for damages was \$65.

It was decided to install an electric light in the alley between Chapel and Emerald streets, and the town manager was instructed to have the burdocks cleared between the east side of Carleton (Continued on page eight.)

DAYS TO OVERSEE

Woodstock is to have a miniature golf course in the near future. For some time past rumors have been current that golf enthusiasts would have a chance to keep in practice during the coming winter, but nothing definite was known. Finally the promoters have been located and while not yet ready to make a full announcement regarding their plans, they have admitted that a suitable site has been secured and that an experienced engineer will arrive within a few days to lay off a course and to superintend its construction. The opening date as yet is indefinite as it will depend on the amount of time required to build a first class course, and this cannot be predicted until the arrival of the engineer.

SECOND BIG BLAZE IN FEW WEEKS

CLARENCE HARTLEY HAS NAR-
ROW ESCAPE; WAKES TO
FIND BED ON FIRE

Woodstock had its second serious fire in the business section within a few weeks when the old Queen Hotel stables in the rear of the Capitol Theatre were destroyed early Monday morning. The fire was very spectacular and gave rise to fears that it was more extensive than was actually the case as citizens awakened by the alarm looked from their windows and saw huge clouds of smoke and flame rising from the downtown district.

The stables belonged to the Norman McLean estate. A young man named Clarence Hartley who was sleeping in the central part of the buildings, used as an office, had a narrow escape from death in the flames, awakening to find the blankets on his bed on fire.

The stables were built in three sections along two sides of a square. One wing was built of concrete and the other two of wood. The buildings stood in the rear of the Capitol Theatre in the heart of the business section. The blaze was a spectacular one and owing to its central location fears were rife for a time that a much more serious fire was in progress than was actually the case. The origin is unknown. The fire started in the centre of the building which was a mass of flames before Hartley awakened and turned in as (Continued on page four.)

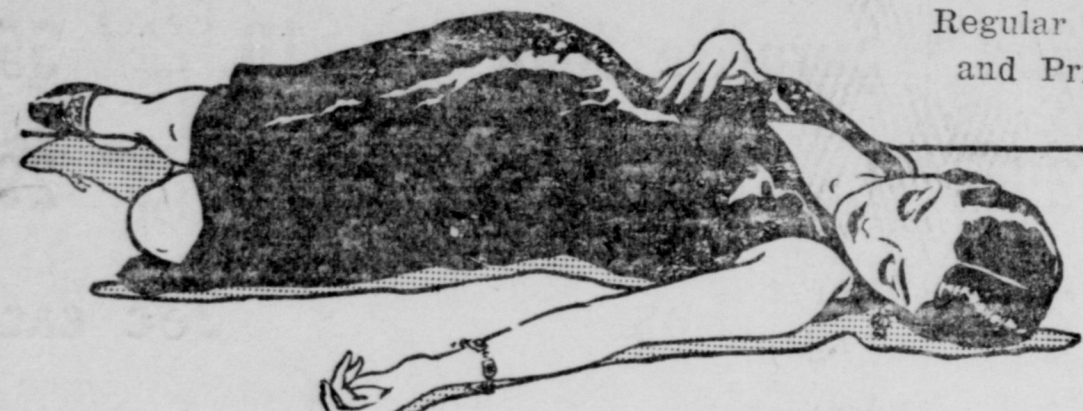
